Kansas City. April 13.-Freezing weather throughout this section did considerable damage to the fruit crop last night. Throughout northwest Missouri the mercury was eight degrees below the freezing point and fruit of all varities has been injured.

In eastern Kansas a heavy frost occurred and it is believed the loss to orchards will be very heavy. In northern and western Oklahoma fruit and gardens were injured.

At St. Louis a light snow fell and at Unionville, on the northern border of the state, the temperature registered 22 degrees. In the southern portion of Nebraska it is reported that the peach, pear and im crops are practically destroyed.

In parts of this district ice formed half an inch thick and the tem prature went below 20 degrees in most parts of Nebraska last night. It is the coldest April weather on record in this section


