He is a 1958 graduate of Quitaque High School and a 1962 graduate of West Texas State College at Canyon.

Since his graduation from college, Jarrell has been teaching in the local elementary school and serving as Junior High School basketball coach. In addition to being a very fine history teacher, Jarrell has also had much success with his basketball teams. He had a good record in his first year as coach and the past season his Jr. Hi boys were undefeated for the season and the Jr. Hi girls lost only two games.

Supt. Mason has expressed regret at losing a good teacher of Jarrell's calibre, since they are hard to come by, but he wishes Jarrell good luck in his new job, of course. Coach Gene King regrets the loss of a coach who is feeding him basketball players who already have the winning habit and one or two of whom might be capable of breaking into the starting lineup as freshmen.

Citizens of Quitaque are pleased to be able to keep one of its own families and wish for their new postmaster a long and pleasant career.

Jarrell is married to the former Jean Sanders of Hedley and they have a son Mike and a daughter, Nadine.

1964 WHEAT CERTIFICATES AND DIVERSION PAYMENTS ARRIVING

Briscoe County's first certificate and diversion payment in the voluntary 1964 Wheat Program was made this week to Merle McMurtry in the Vigo Park community, one of thousands of wheat producers cooperating in the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Program.

Louie Kitchens, County ASC Chairman, stated the 1964 legislation was designed to help maintain wheat grower income while avoiding any increase in Government costs in the program.

Besides diversion payments, domestic and export marketing certificates are also issued with a domestic certificate having a value of 70 cents a bushel, and export value of 25 cents.

The cash value of certificates is in addition to the market price or local loan value. Market prices in Briscoe County have been ranging from \$1.48 to \$1.35. Loan values vary because of premiums and discounts for quality with the basic loan value for Briscoe County being \$1.29.

It is expected that payments totaling \$370,080.00 will be made to wheat producers in Briscoe County.

Any grower who stays within his 1964 wheat allotment is eligible for price support loans or purchase of the wheat from his individual farm.

All participants in the program signed up on a voluntary basis and diverted acres from wheat production.

Diverted acres are used for a variety of conservation practices applicable to individual counties.

Payments are now being made to those producers who signed up in the wheat program, but not in the Feed Grain Program. The payments on wheat and feed grain farms will be made after completion of measuring of feed grain and diverted acres.

Dr. James W. Graves, Texas A&M University professor of agricultural economics and sociology, whose topic will embrace "Locating or Establishing New Markets for Agricultural Products."

The Chillicothe station, established cooperatively in 1905 by the USDA and TAES to test sorghum introductions, serves the agriculture of the Rolling Plains, an area comprising 24 million acres.

The station is engaged in a wheat variety testing program, along with other Texas stations. Among varieties produced earlier from this kind of research and increased for distribution as foundation seed stocks here were Comanche, Concho, Westar and Wichita. Seed of the improved Crockett and Tascosa varieties are being increased and are available to certified growers.

Evaluation of cotton varieties at the Chillicothe station has been constant since 1917, and has enabled farmers in Motley County to determine those varieties best suited to their needs and which likely will show a profit, said the county agent.

Proposed **CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT**
NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 3, 1964.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 5 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas is amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The principal of all bonds and other funds, and the principal arising from the sale of the lands hereinbefore set apart to said school fund, shall be the permanent school fund, and all the interest derivable therefrom and the taxes herein authorized and levied shall be the available school fund. The available school fund shall be applied annually to the support of the public free schools. And no law shall ever be enacted appropriating any part of the permanent or available school fund to any other purpose whatever; nor shall the same, or any part thereof ever be appropriated to or used for the support of any sectarian school; and the available school fund herein provided shall be distributed to the several counties according to their scholastic population and applied in such manner as may be provided by law."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1964, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to remove the authorization to transfer not exceeding one per cent annually of the total value of the permanent school fund to the available school fund."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.
