**NATIONAL 4-H CLUB CONGRESS**  
Four huge 4-H's are formed by the 1,200 delegates to the National 4-H Club Congress during the 4-H Parade.

A dramatic highlight of the National 4-H Club Congress unfolds as delegates parade before a huge audience at the International Live Stock Show in Chicago.

The 4-H spotlight will again be on Chicago when the top 1,200 boys and girls from all 48 states, Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico join with guests from foreign countries for the 34th National 4-H Club Congress, Nov. 27 - Dec. 1.

The Congress program consists of discussions by the delegates, tours of the City, banquets and top-flight entertainment features, and highlighted with talks by leading speakers. The 4-Hers also part in press conferences, radio and TV appearances. Most of the day is spent visiting the International Live Stock Exposition where during the evening program the 4-Hers present their annual parade.

Congress delegates are selected from the Nation's 2,150,000 4-Hers through county, state and national competition. In Chicago, 180 will be named national winners in 29 award programs and will receive \$49,050 in college scholarships.

The Congress is made possible by civic-minded individuals, foundations and industries who in 1955 contributed over \$760,000 through the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work to support 4-H. This year, 110,000 4-H members will be honored through National 4-H Award Programs. The awards consist of trips, medals, watches, U. S. Savings Bonds and other merit awards. In addition, funds are provided for leader training with the grants made through the National Committee. The Committee is a citizens' group which has been helping the Cooperative Extension Service further the influence and membership of 4-H for 34 years.

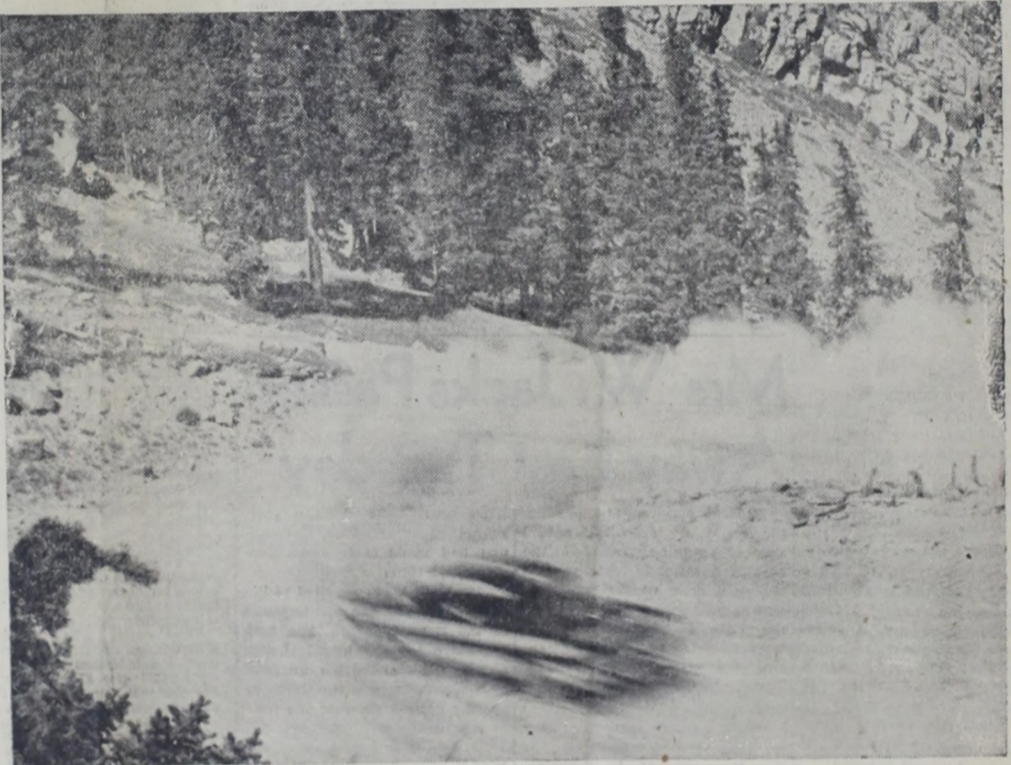

### FUMIGATE GARDENS NOW

Now is the time to fumigate garden soil in order to control root knot disease. Before fumigating, old plant trash and infected roots should be removed and a good seed bed prepared as if for planting. Soil moisture should be adequate to germinate seed.

Garden Dofume, D-D, Solfume 60-40, Iscobrome 40, and Bromofume 40, are effective as garden fumigants. Fumigate that part of the garden on which you intend to grow warm weather crops such as tomatoes, peas, cucumbers, okra because they are more susceptible to root knot damage.

Using a plow or hoe, make furrows in the soil 12 inches apart and 6 to 8 inches deep. Take a small-necked or standard fruit jar, puncture two holes in the cap with a nail, fill with fumigant, and recap the jar. One of the holes will let air into the jar. Apply the liquid fumigant by walking along the furrow and dribbling the fumigant in the bottom of the furrow. Immediately cover the furrow to prevent the escape of the fumigant gases. A pint of the fumigant should cover about 150 running feet of furrow. This would be about five pints for 1,000 square feet of garden. It may be advisable to test first with water to determine

how fast to walk to get this amount of material distributed in the furrow.

Take care not to use the fumigant closer than two feet of a growing plant, since severe injury may result. Do not get the fumigant into the eyes or mouth. If the material is accidentally spilled on hands or clothing, it should be immediately removed by washing with soap and water, or by using kerosene to remove it from the skin.

Soil may also be fumigated 10 days or more before planting later this winter or in the spring providing the same precautions are used as with fall fumigation. A cover crop planted in the

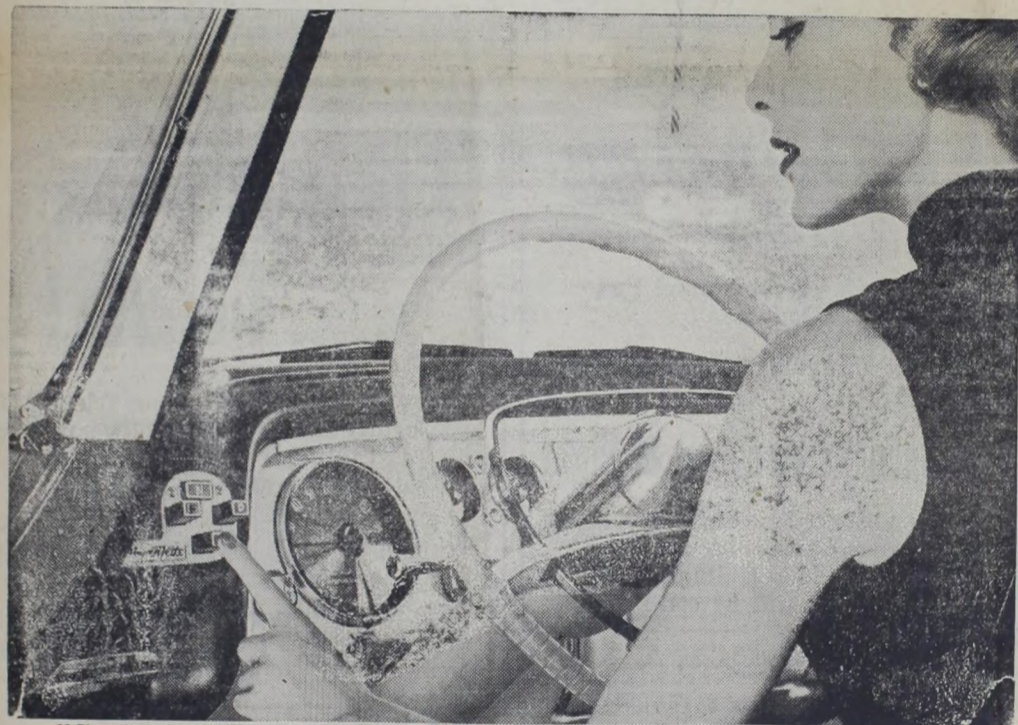

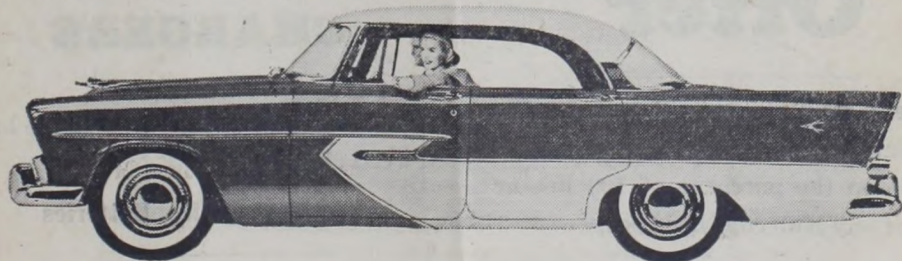

Soil fumigant may be applied in the furrow ahead of a flat-breaking operation; however, results will probably not be as satisfactory as when the fumigant is applied in a well-prepared seed bed. Care should be taken in order that unfumigated soil will not be mixed with the fumigated soil. Be sure to use disease-free transplants.
