The Quitaque Panthers opened the 1956 football campaign Monday afternoon with 16 light but spirited players. Coach Grundy started the workouts with light drill and much needed work on play timing. The improved Panther team moved through fundamental blocking and tackling drills with tremendous spirit in preparation for the first game with Kress Sept. 7.

In the line for the Panthers at center is veteran Freddie Stockton, a returning regular from last season's team. At the guard posts is concerted half-back Teddy Bedwell. Teddy has showed much desire to play

and has been working well at this position. At right guard is Freddie Davidson, who was out most of last season with a knee injury. Sophomores Bennie Reagan and Bulch Hamilton are the other guards.

At tackles are Morris Crabtree, a sophomore, and Junior Dale Smith. These two big boys can prove a tremendous asset to the ball club if they continue to show the spirit that has been shown thus far. At ends are Billie Mac Farley, Verlon Hamilton, John King and Raymond Lewis. Farley and Hamilton are returning lettermen from last year's squad, and King & Lewis are up from grade school team.

At quarter-back for his 4th campaign is Bill Mayfield who was last year's team captain and showed much promise in his signal calling. Mayfield is also a fine defensive player. Lucas Lucero is alternate quarter-back.

At full-back is Richard Pittman and Hubert Price. Pittman was a regular on last year's team and Price is out for the first time.

At right-half is converted Felix Johnson and Thomas Phelps up from grade school team.

The wing-back position is filled by Murray Wise, a converted tackle from last year's starting eleven.

Boys expected out next Monday are Jim Fred Foster, Robert Tackett and Jarrel Rice.

The Panthers go to Groom Saturday morning for a post season scrimmage and end this first week of workouts.

Pioneer Drug Store Has Been Remodeled

Pioneer Drug has been receiving a new face-lifting off and on during the past two weeks. Work is nearly finished with just a few minor changes left before it is entirely completed.

Electricians made a number of changes throughout the building, centralizing the switch controls & installing new conduits.

From there work moved to the removal and relocation of the air conditioning system, allowing the front entrance to be torn out and window panes removed. A new modern design resulted when two large plate glass windows were installed. The glass front door is located to the right hand side of the building upon entering.

New light fixtures directly above the front windows were installed both inside and outside. These, plus the extra amount of sunlight which enters, all provide much more light to the interior.

Aluminum casing surrounds the entire frontage and adds much to the appearance of the building.

While the work was being done patrons found themselves a little confused at times as to the proper procedure of entrance and exit, what with workmen here and there, and sometimes everywhere. But they aren't ones to complain (seriously) as the majority were anxious to view the results.

Pop and Mrs Clark's private entrance leading to their apartment was also remodeled. Instead of entering from the south, as before, the Clarks now enter from the west - just one step away from the store entrance. Convenience - plus!

Supt. Scott stated that the public was cordially invited to attend General Assembly in the school auditorium on opening day - Monday, Sept. 3. The Assembly will be held at 9 o'clock; the buses will run in time to get the students to the school building at that time.

Registration will follow the Assembly, students will be enrolled, assigned to their classes, books issued, etc.

Supt. Scott said that school would hold through the day with classes being dismissed at 3:45 p.m. and the buses will deliver the students to their homes in the afternoon.

First grade students are asked to bring their birth certificates when they come for enrollment.

Mr Scott said that his plans for the school year included the continuation of Assembly programs which are presented by the School Assembly Association. The public is invited to attend the programs which are scheduled to be held in the auditorium at 9:00 a.m. on the following dates: Sept. 12, Oct. 17, Nov. 8, Jan. 22, Feb. 15, and Feb. 27.

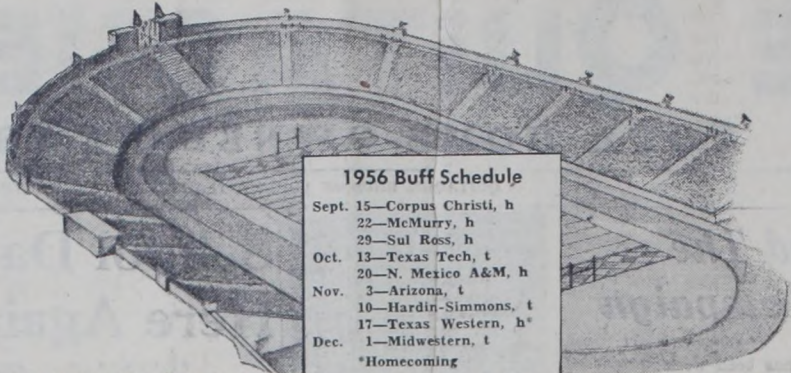

Allard Appointed Committee Member of County Loan Office

W. O. Allard of Silverton, Texas is the new member of the County Loan Office. The committee on which he will serve determines the eligibility of local farmers who apply for Farmers Home Administration loans. The new committee member has been farming and carrying on a livestock program in the vicinity of Silverton for the past several years. At the present time he is also operating the Allard's Butane Company in Silverton.

Mr. Allard succeeds Mr. Wade H. Steele of Silverton, Texas whose term expired this year. The other two members are Mr. George Martin, Silverton, and Mr. Bill Helms, Quitaque.

Each agricultural county in the country has a similar committee of three members who are responsible for determining loan applicants eligibility, certifying the value of farms being purchased or improved through Farmers Home Administration loans, and making recommendations on loan approvals and loan servicing actions.

Each member is named for a 3-year term and one appointment expires each year. A member completing his 3-year term cannot succeed himself. At least two of the members must be farmers.

The committee works with the County Supervisor in connection with all types of loans. These include farm operating loans and loans to buy, improve, or enlarge efficient family-type farms in this area. They also include loans to farmers or their nonprofit associations to establish and carry on approved soil and water conservation practices including improving permanent pastures, terracing, soil erosion measures, farmstead water systems, irrigation, drainage, and many other conservation practices.

Most of the soil and water

conservation loans and loans to buy or improve farms are made from funds advanced by private lenders and insured by the agency. Some of these loans, however, and all loans for operating farms, are from annually appropriated funds.

The agency makes emergency loans in areas designated for that purpose by the Secretary of Agriculture. Swisher and Briscoe Counties are designated for Great Plains Emergency loans.

No loan of any type can be approved for an applicant whose credit needs can be handled adequately by other credit sources.

The regular office staff of the Farmers Home Administration serving Briscoe County consists of the County Supervisor, Ralph E. Griffiths; Frank L. King, Emergency loan Supervisor; Una Loard, County Office Clerk; and Mrs. Lou Rose Cosby, Assistant County Office Clerk for Emergency loans. The office is located in the building with the ASC Office, SCS Office and County Agent and serves Swisher and Briscoe Counties Office day for Briscoe County is Tuesday of each week.

Hello there. This is R. J. Harmon of the Panhandle Compress and Warehouse Co. baling out to meet everyone. I came to Quitaque on September 1, 1953 to serve as Superintendent for Panhandle. Prior to that I was employed by them at Roaring Springs where I was superintendent from 1944 until it moved here in '53. Odell, Texas was where I was born, back on the 27th of Febru-

ary, 1914. Lolla Belle, my wife, and I were married February 11, 1941 at Guthrie, Texas. We have one daughter and two sons, (the three "R's", Rhonda, Robin and Rex. They are students in our local school, learning the three "R's" of education. I am also a Mason of the Quitaque Masonic Lodge.
