From Congressman WALTER ROGERS

**INTERNATIONAL BLACKMAIL**  
 "Blackmail" is a bad word and is no doubt deeply frowned upon in diplomatic circles. However, if we are to follow the logic that was advanced in arguing for passage of the foreign aid bill to the tune of 3 thousand million dollars (\$20 from every man, woman and child in the U. S.), we must reach the inevitable conclusion that Uncle Sam is being taken.

The bill provides for expenditures of 3 billion dollars to go to foreign countries. It is termed the "Mutual Security Act". But when on member tried to have some of his unemployed constituents included in the benefits, the amendment was ruled out of order because the constituents were United States citizens and the bill was confined to foreign aid. Many of us wonder why it is called the "MUTUAL" Security Act.

This expenditure is approximately the difference between a balanced budget and deficit spending. Only a few days ago, Treasury Secretary Humphrey asked for and received an extension of the debt limit ceiling for another year. The ceiling was formerly 275 billion dollars. Last year the administration asked for a 6 billion dollar temporary increase for one year, which was granted. This temporary increase was extended for another year just the other day. Like most temporary government matters, it appears that this increase will be with us for a long time. We have several temporary agencies that have been in existence for a number of years. In fact, the foreign aid program was supposed to be temporary. The only thing temporary has been the name. The name of the program and the name of the agency handling it have been

changed several times, but the expenditures go on and on. It was repeatedly argued that the measure was a defense measure and could not be justified on any other ground; that it was a defense measure against Russia and communism, and that if it was not for the threat of communism, the expenditures could not, under any circumstances, be justified. In other words, the proponents were saying that as long as Russia was a threat to this country, we should continue to pay money to the several countries mentioned in the foreign aid bill. It would logically follow that if Russia ceased to be a threat to this country, then these payments should cease. As all of you know, Nehru, of India, has frequently expressed contempt for our government and has recently completed a visit to Moscow and Belgrade. Tito, dictator of Yugoslavia, openly and flagrantly brags that he has a communist country that is more communist than Russia. He, too, has recently completed some visits to Moscow. Both India and Yugoslavia were included in the foreign aid bill for sizable sums. Many of the Members called the attention of the House to the actions of both Nehru and Tito. The proponents of the bill did not defend either of them, but took the position that we had to give them money to help them from jolting up with Russia. If this logic is correct, then it must follow that it would be to the best interests of Nehru and Tito to perpetuate a fuss and cold war between the Soviet and the United States, simply because any settlement of the differences would mean an end to the millions of dollars flowing to India and Yu-

goslavia out of the pockets of the taxpayers of this country. The same logic would lead us to the conclusion that we are paying tribute to these two governments because of the threat that they will go communistic if we fail to pay up. This might not be international blackmail, but it comes pretty close to it. It simply means that the grand old phrase "Millions for defense, but not one cent for tribute", that has long thrilled the crowd at the 4th of July gatherings, seems to be passe.

**DAMPENED POULTRY**

College Station. — Poultry raisers are finding it pays to dampen their birds on hot days. It helps keep feed conversion high, eggs rolling and profits up. Open up the house to provide maximum ventilation, Ben R. Wormell, extension poultry husbandman, suggests.

Many producers install sprinklers on the roof of their houses for use on the hottest days. Water on a roof helps reflect the sun and cools the hot surface through evaporation. Water dripping off

the house also serves as an evaporative cooler, lowering temperatures inside.

Add several more drinking troughs so water is handy to the birds at all times, Wormell adds. If a chicken must walk more than 10 feet to water, it may go thirsty rather than make the trip.

Change the water several times daily to keep it cool. Cool water means a cool chicken and paves the way to increased water and feed consumption and higher feed conversion.

Other poultrymen encourage a

high rate of feed intake with early morning or all-night lights. This way, birds eat while it's cool, before the sun starts heating down.

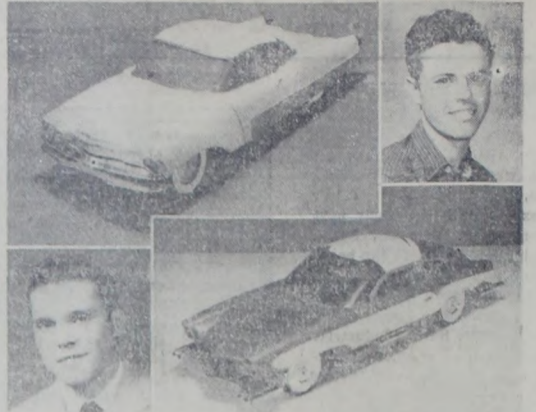

*The Southern Kingdom Overthrown.*  
Lesson for July 24: II Kings 24: 20-25: 12.  
Golden Text: Galatians 6: 7.

In preceding lessons there have been indications of the sad condition of Judah, with the greater part of the people exiled to Babylon and the poorer people left in the land. Now we think of the final ruin when Nebuchadnezzar's general came with a great army for the destruction of Jerusalem.

The occasion for this was the rebellion of Zedekiah, the last of the feeble kings of Judah following the reign of Josiah. Nebuchadnezzar, in the first overthrow of Jerusalem, carried the pick of the people into Babylon, as skilled laborers have been deported in recent tragic years to serve their conquerors.

The Jews who remained after the earlier captivity were made vassals of Babylon and this situation was continued for eleven years under Zedekiah, whom Nebuchadnezzar had made king. At the end of eleven years, the poor king tried to play politics, violated his oath to the Babylonian ruler, entering in an alliance with neighboring small nations and rebelling against their master.

The territory of Judah was soon overrun, but Jerusalem held out for a year and a half. Famine brought the end. Trying to escape by flight, Zedekiah was captured near Jericho. In Babylon his sons were slain before him, his eyes were put out, and he was kept in prison till his death.

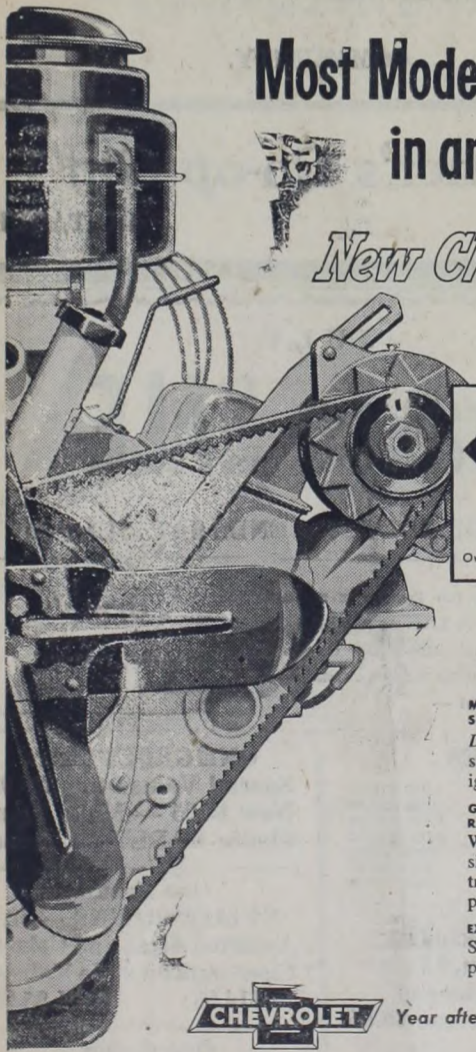

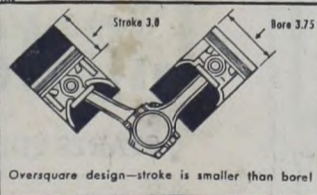

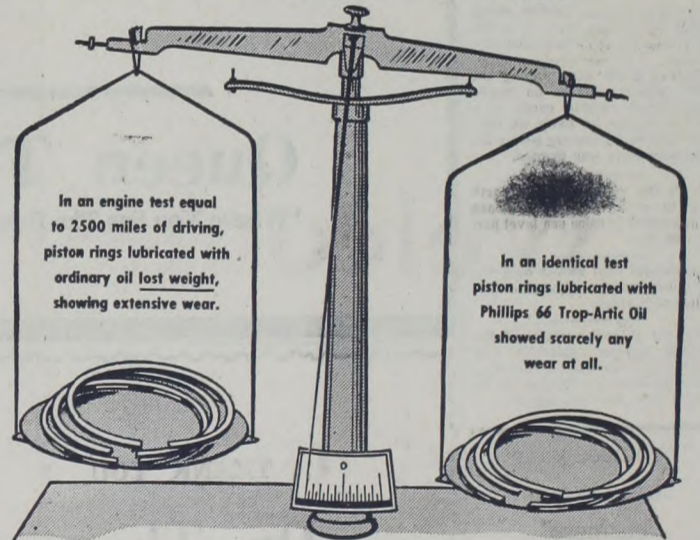
