#### FEED GRAIN PROGRAM ANNOUNCED

Producers who divert at least 20 percent of their feed grain base will be eligible for payments computed by multiplying

College Station. August 8—Major provisions of the 1964
Feed Grain Program have been announced by the U. S. Department of Agriculture and basically will be the same as in 1963.

The major change is an increase in the top limit on diversion from a farm's base acreage with an increase in the rate payment for maximum diversion. This, the USDA said, is intended to encourage producers to divert additional feed grain acres and to increase their income.

Under the 1964 program a produce may divert as much as 50 percent of his feed grain base acreage compared with a top of 40 percent in 1963. Those who divert from 40 to 50 percent will receive diversion payments at the maximum rate for all acres diverted. As before, the maximum acreage diversion will again be made in the form

for all acres diverted. As before, the maximum acreage diversion will be 25 acres if this is more than 50 percent of the base.

#### SPEED LIMITS TO BE RAISED ON MANY TEXAS HIGHWAYS

Austin, Texas — More than two-thirds of the Texas highway system will come under the new 70-miles-per-hour daytime marimum speed for passenger cars which becomes effective on August 23, the Texas Highway Commission revealed today.

Under the speed control law passed by the Legislature this spring, all highways not zoned down by the Commission will automatically go to the new 70-mph speed August 23. This means that some 41,500 miles of the state-maintained highway system will be allowed to come under the higher maximum speed.

The Commission today pass-ed a Minute Order which zoned ome 18,640 miles of the highway system at a maximum of 60 miles per hour daytime and 55 miles per hour at night for passenger dars, effective August 23. These highwys will be restricted to the lower speed limit because engineering studies indi-cate they are inadequate to ac-commodate a 70 - miles - per-

nour maximum.

The Commission's action fol lowed a series of engineering traffic studies which were conducted throughout the state by the Highway Department's 25

highway districts.
A large percentage of Texas' vast Farm to Market Road System will come under the 70mph maximum, although some these roads (and some of the older primary routes) will be restricted to the lower 60-mph maximum where conditions
