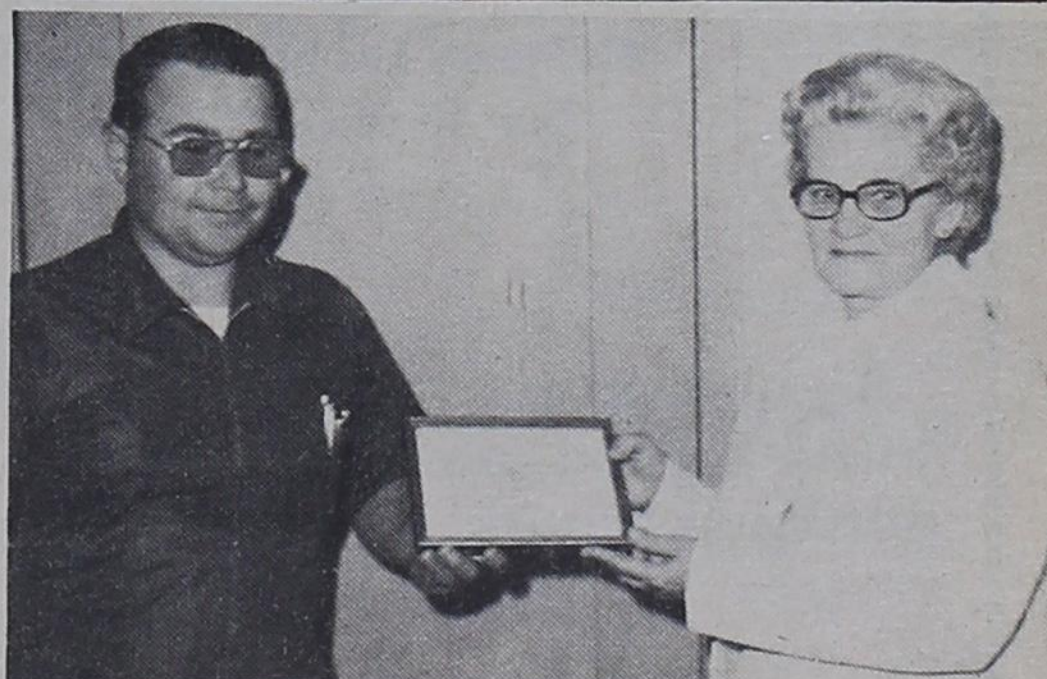

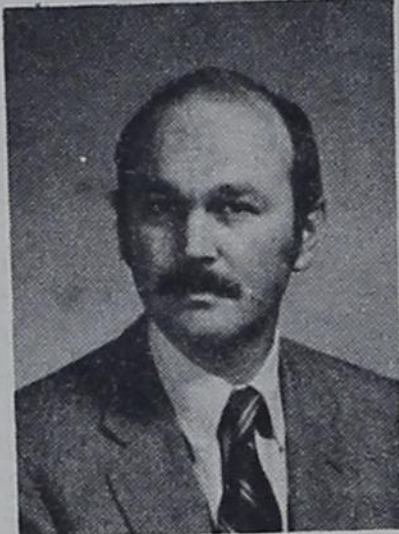

How, you say, could you call Sunday's hockey game between Boston and Chicago a great game when the score wound up 8-6? That's a good question.

Primarily, it was a good game because it had all the elements that make great hockey—sharp passing, fast forming formations, heavy, but clean, checking, great shooting, outstanding goalie work, fast and furious sweeps of the rink.

By all of the old, established standards, except the score, it was great hockey. Twenty years or so ago an 8-6 game would have been hooted out of existence. Scores normally were 1-0, 2-1 and only occasionally 3-2.

Fourteen goals in one game would have called for an examination of the players and the goalies would have been on their way to the outermost reaches of Saskatchewan.

What has made the big different probably is the slapshot, the slightly curved sticks. The puck takes off and, if the goalie is screened at all, it's almost impossible for him to stop a score.

Actually, the defense is as strong as it ever was and the goalies Sunday made some miraculous saves. Basically, hockey hasn't changed, and maybe the added scoring is good for the sport.

I was talking with Harry Walker, one of the city's premier sports buffs, Sunday morning. Harry was brought up on the Brooklyn Dodgers in the days when they played at Ebbets Field.

Slightly before that I was brought up on the old Giants, who used to play at the Polo Grounds. Both teams have fled New York for California and both ball parks have been razed, which is enough to stir some nostalgia.

My Dad used to take me to the Polo Grounds, now and then, to see the Giants. I became a Giant fan, thanks in no small measure to the fact that George Kelly (no kin) played first base.

Then one day I was taken to the Polo Grounds, but this time it was to see the Yankees, whose own stadium wasn't even in the building stage. That was when Babe Ruth was just coming into flower as an outfielder and home run hitter. One game and I was a Yankee fan.

In those days you took the subway in downtown New York until it became the elevated. It was a long ride through tenement areas and I well remember being thankful I didn't have to live as the families we saw.

Going to a game at the Polo Grounds was a great thrill, even though the ice cream and soda pop vendors may have been of more interest than the players a good part of the time. As time went on, the El went by Yankee Stadium and you could see the structure rising majestically.

Later I was to spend many afternoons in that stadium, marveling at the grace of Ruth, the stolidness of Lou Gehrig, the effortless ease with which Earl Combs patrolled centerfield, the power of Bob Meusel, the agility of Tony Lazzeri and the guts of Joe Dugan, one of the fine third basemen.

I wasn't to get back to the Polo Grounds until 1962, thanks to Texas Tech's playing Boston College in Boston. I went to the old stadium because E.J. Holub and the Dallas Texans were playing the New York Titans.

It was one of the last games in the storied old stadium, which was showing its age. Already the skeleton that was to become Shea Stadium was rising on the meadows.

It seems a shame, really, that places like Ebbets Field, the Polo Grounds and other stadia must give way to progress. There's even an unshed tear that Hubber Park had to give way to a mobile home parking lot, because those stadia tell the story of man's victories and defeats, the human foibles that are part of history.

I don't remember the last time I saw a baseball game in Yankee Stadium. It's been a good 13 or 14 years since I saw a football game there, something of an irony, because the football Giants played in Yankee Stadium.

In 1939 and 1940 I inhabited Griffith Stadium, also gone now, in Washington, where Sam West was the mainstay of a collection of players a cut above the initial Mets.

The Senators of those days always came home from spring training with high hopes and glowing press notices about such great young stars as Joe Krakauskas, Ken Chase, Buddy Kelly, Jake Early. Then summer would come and the spring flowers faded.

Walter Johnson, the "Big Train" and an immortal, did the radio broadcasts. Often he, the press, the grounds crew and the grandstand help outnumbered the spectators.

But it was major league baseball and you had a chance to see young Ted Williams, Joe DiMaggio and other future great stars. You even had the thrill of seeing the woebegone Nats rise up and blast the great Bob Feller into oblivion, led by Kelly, Cecil Travis, Lubbock's own Sam West and yes, by Zeke "Bananas" Bonura.

Zeke Bonura! I hadn't thought of him in years. He was a picture of grace around first base. I think he even led the league a year or two in fielding. Of course Zeke had a little trouble with ground balls hit to his right. Yep, and with ground balls hit to his left or even right at him. But he was graceful. And he could hit.

Those really were great days in Washington. In addition to seeing baseball, there was the opportunity to see the football games of Maryland, Catholic U, Georgetown and George Washington, to say nothing of the Redskins.

Later, pro basketball and hockey came in, although they never got the following that the Skins did. Still, it was a great time to be young, sportsminded and with few cares. It would be great to live those days over again.

And then there's the one about the sweet young thing who was accused of being a "kept" woman. "There's not a chinchilla of truth in it," she exclaimed!

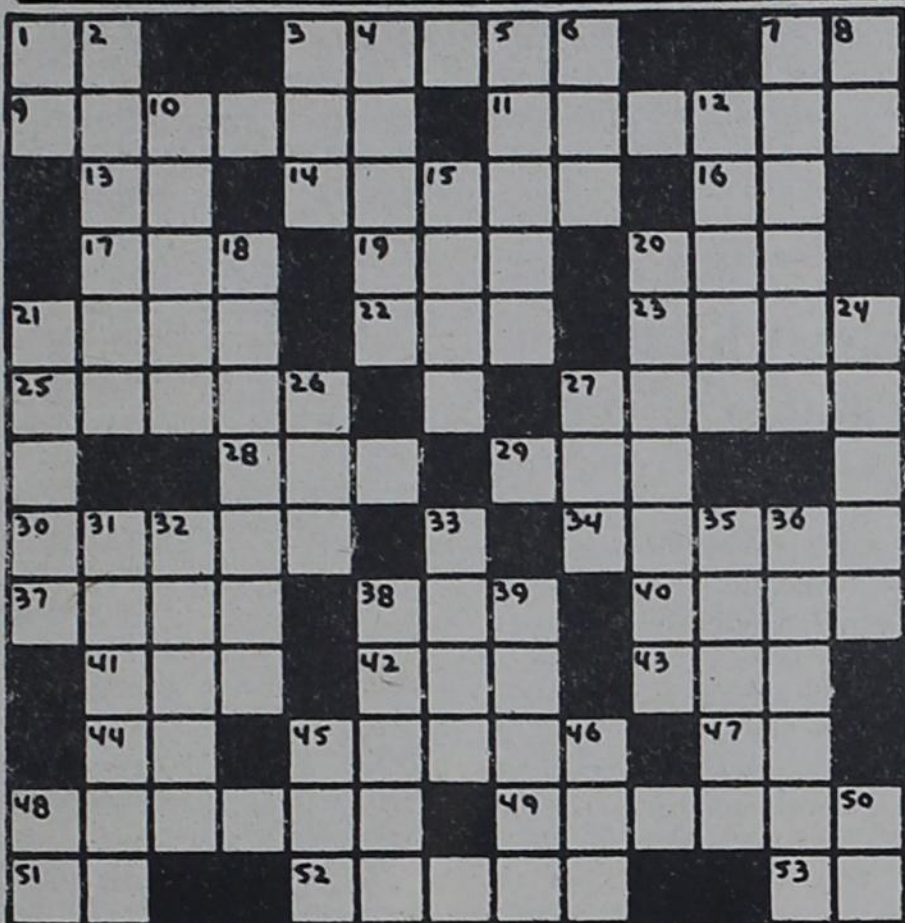

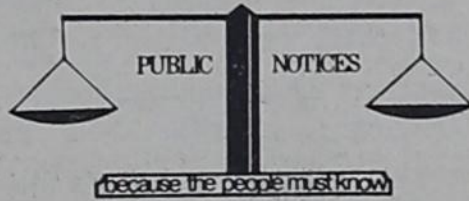

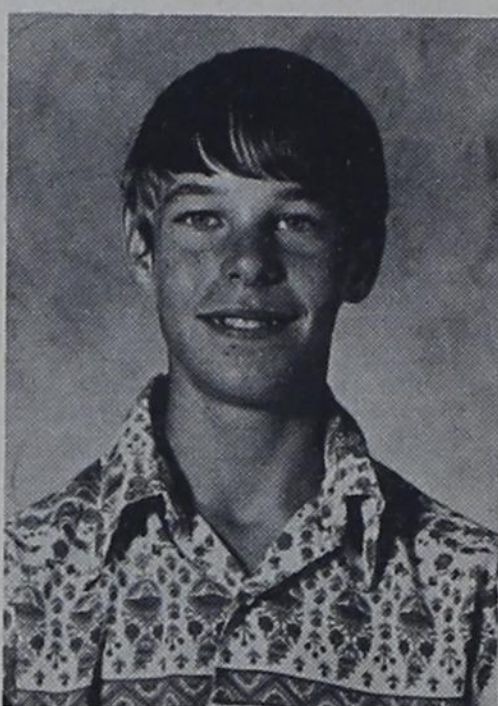
