

Shallowater Band Students to Perform In All Region Band

Services Read Here Wednesday For Margaret Teague Jenkins

Services for Margaret Anita Teague Jenkins, 54-year-old Shallowater resident, were held at 10 a.m. Wednesday in the First Baptist Church. Burial was in City of Lubbock Cemetery afterwards, with Rev. Clyde Cook, pastor, officiating. He was assisted by the Rev. Boyd Pearce of Shallowater.

Mrs. Jenkins died Sunday evening in Methodist Hospital as the result of a gunshot wound she received earlier from her husband, Fred M. Jenkins.

Both Jenkins, the victim of a self-inflicted gunshot wound, and Mrs. Jenkins, were found early Saturday morning in their apartment by acquaintances who



became concerned when she failed to report to work.

Justice of the Peace, Jessie Lee Vance, pronounced the deaths a murder-suicide Sunday evening.

Friends described Mrs. Jenkins as happy-go-lucky, very likeable, and jolly.

"She never met a stranger," one said. "She was friendly and outgoing."

Margaret Teague was born January 7, 1922, in Newport, Texas. She attended grade school at County Line, and finished her high schooling in Shallowater. She later received a degree from Draughon's Business College.

While in high school, she was a member of the basketball team and was named the most popular girl of her class. During the second World War, Mrs. Jenkins worked on the draft board in Lubbock.

For the past 17 years, Mrs. Jenkins had been an employee of the Postal Service in Shallowater. Other employees described her as hard-working and efficient.

"She was always very prompt, very fair," one said.

Survivors include her four daughters, Mrs. David LaGeese of Seattle, Washington; Ms. Theres Newton and Ms. Tana Hunter, both from Lubbock; and Ms. Anita Self of Shallowater; two brothers, Lowell Teague of Fresno, California; and B.N. Teague of Shallowater; a sister, Ms. L.W. Utley of Lubbock; her father, Mr. Earl Teague of Lubbock; and four grandchildren.

Margaret Anita Teague Jenkins had lived in the Shallowater area since 1925.

"The way a person lives is more important than the way she dies," an acquaintance said.

"She's going to be missed."

Terri is the daughter of Mr. Glen Martin of Spur and Esther Martin of Lubbock. She is 18 years old and was born on November 28, 1957.

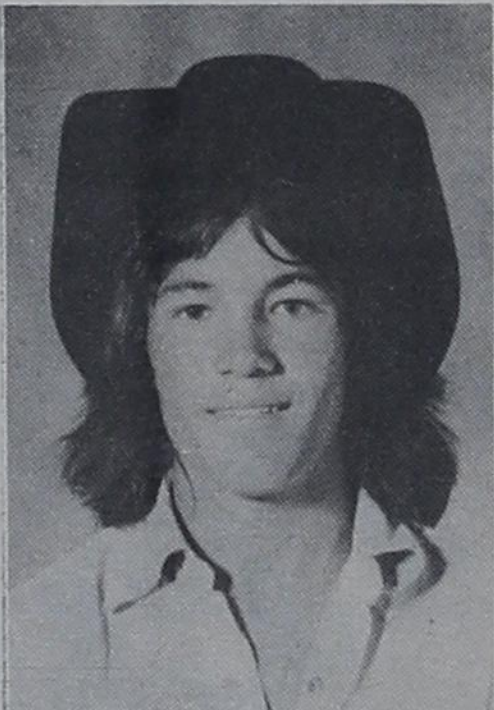
