Shallowater School Bond Election to Be Held Saturday, September 8th

A \$350,000 bond issue will be decided upon Saturday, September 8, 1973, by the Shallowater voters. The election will be held in the Club House with Mrs. Jack Reed as the presiding judge.

Everyone 18 years old and over who lives in the Shallowater School District and who registered to vote in 1972 or who has registered to vote since then, up to 30 days prior to this election, is eligible to vote. There will be two voting boxes, one for taxpaying eligible voters and one for voters who are not on the tax roll. The combined vote of both boxes will have to carry in order for the bond issue to pass. Also, the taxpayer vote alone must approve the issue.

Two propositions will be on the ballot:

Proposition No. 1—Will be for

the voters to vote for or against a Maintenance Tax. This vote is necessary due to a recent change in school law which sets the Maintenance Tax a school can levy according to the bonded indebtedness. The passage or failure of this proposition would not affect the bond issue but would allow the school to levy a Maintenance Tax up to \$1.50 per \$100 evaluation, regardless of the debt ratio, should it be necessary.

Proposition No. 2—Is for the vote for or against the issuance of bonds and the levying of the tax to pay for them.

The bond issue will be for the purpose of construction of new athletic dressing rooms, a band hall, and 10 classrooms.

A sample ballot is included here for your consideration.

The women's organizations of the First Christian Church will sponsor a rummage sale Friday and Saturday with proceeds to go to Tina Naron, a two year old suffering from an incurable congenital disease.

The sale will be held at 4406 53rd St. at 8 a.m. Friday and Saturday, from 1 p.m. on Sunday.

Tina Naron cannot live without blood and frequent medical attention. But the financial expenses are overwhelming.

The child must make trips to Dallas every two to two and a half weeks for a complete blood transfusion.

Hemolytic anemia is an incurable blood disease which destroys red blood cells at an abnormal rate forcing Tina's life to hinge on the red blood cell packets.

Tina received a birthday present Wednesday from residents of Camelot Village, a mobile home park. A fund raising event was held which resulted in a \$200 check being presented Tina and her family Wednesday at the home of Mr. and Mrs. E.L. Davis of Rt. 1,

Levelland, grandparents of the child.

A fund was established by a Lubbock resident at Lubbock's First National Bank (P.O. Box 1241) to help the Levelland residents.

Hopefully, said Mrs. Davis, the funds will enable Tina to undergo an operation to remove her spleen, which, if successful, would only partially correct Tina's condition.

Documentary Film Rio Grande to Be Shown on KLBK-TV, Channel 13

A massive wave of mercy that has drawn more than 50,000 volunteers to meet human need along the 900 mile Texas-Mexico border will be aired in a 30-minute documentary on television stations throughout the state in early September.

"Although the mission effort called the 'River Ministry' has been quietly expanding at our doorway to Mexico for about five years, many Texans have probably never heard of it," said Dr. T.A. Patterson, Dallas, executive secretary of the Baptist General Convention of Texas. "This is largely because it hasn't, until now, been widely covered in television or newspapers."

The film, "Rio Grande," shows Texans, including teenagers, doctors, farmers, ministers and others giving their time and talents to improve the lot of the 2 1/2 million people along the River.

During the past five years more

than 50,000 people of all ages from upstate Texas have spent vacations and other times doing everything from digging wells in desert areas to building churches where there were none.

Many doctors, dentists and other medical personnel travel to the Rio Grande regularly to give their time and talents to heal people's bodies and spirits, said Dr. Patterson. Several mobile clinics fashioned from old trucks and buses carry the doctors and their equipment and supplies into isolated areas where people wouldn't otherwise get the medical care they need.

About two years ago, Baptists launched an agricultural mission program to make isolated desert areas between Big Bend and El Paso-Juarez "blossom like a rose." Already many residents of Los Fresnos and El Comedor, Mex., downriver from El Paso have

Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Directors Election Deadline Nears

The September 15 deadline for mailing TGSPB ballots in the biennial election is approaching. Over 29,000 ballots have been mailed to potential voters in the 29-county Texas High Plains area and additional ballots have been mailed to county agents for those farmers who may qualify to vote but do not receive a ballot by mail.

Running for six year terms in the election are incumbents: A.W. Anthony, Jr., of Friona, John Gilbreath of Hart, Don Marble of South Plains, and E.C. Whitten of Edmonson. Also seeking terms are candidates: John Dunlap of Floydada, Don Nelson of Tulia, and

Troy Sloan of Spearman.

To qualify as a voter, one must farm or cause to be farmed grain sorghum in the counties served by the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board. Those counties are: Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Carson, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Dallam, Dawson, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Gaines, Hale, Hansford, Hartley, Hockley, Hutchinson, Lamb, Lubbock, Lynn, Moore, Oldham, Parmer, Potter, Randall, Sherman, Swisher, Terry and Yoakum.

The sealed ballots will be tallied by a committee of people not associated with the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board. The committee will be sworn in by county judge Roderick Shaw and the operation of counting the ballots will be conducted under the observation of the judge, a Texas Department of Agriculture official, a representative from the extension service and an officer of TGSPC.

Ballots can be disqualified for the following reasons: (1) if more than one ballot is signed by the same person; (2) if the voter fails to sign the ballot in the spaces provided and does not write his full address; or (3) if the ballot is postmarked later than September 15, 1973.

A large turnout of voters is expected. At last check with the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board office, located at 1212 14th Street, Lubbock, Texas, ballots were arriving at about 100 or more each day. They will be opened and counted September 18.

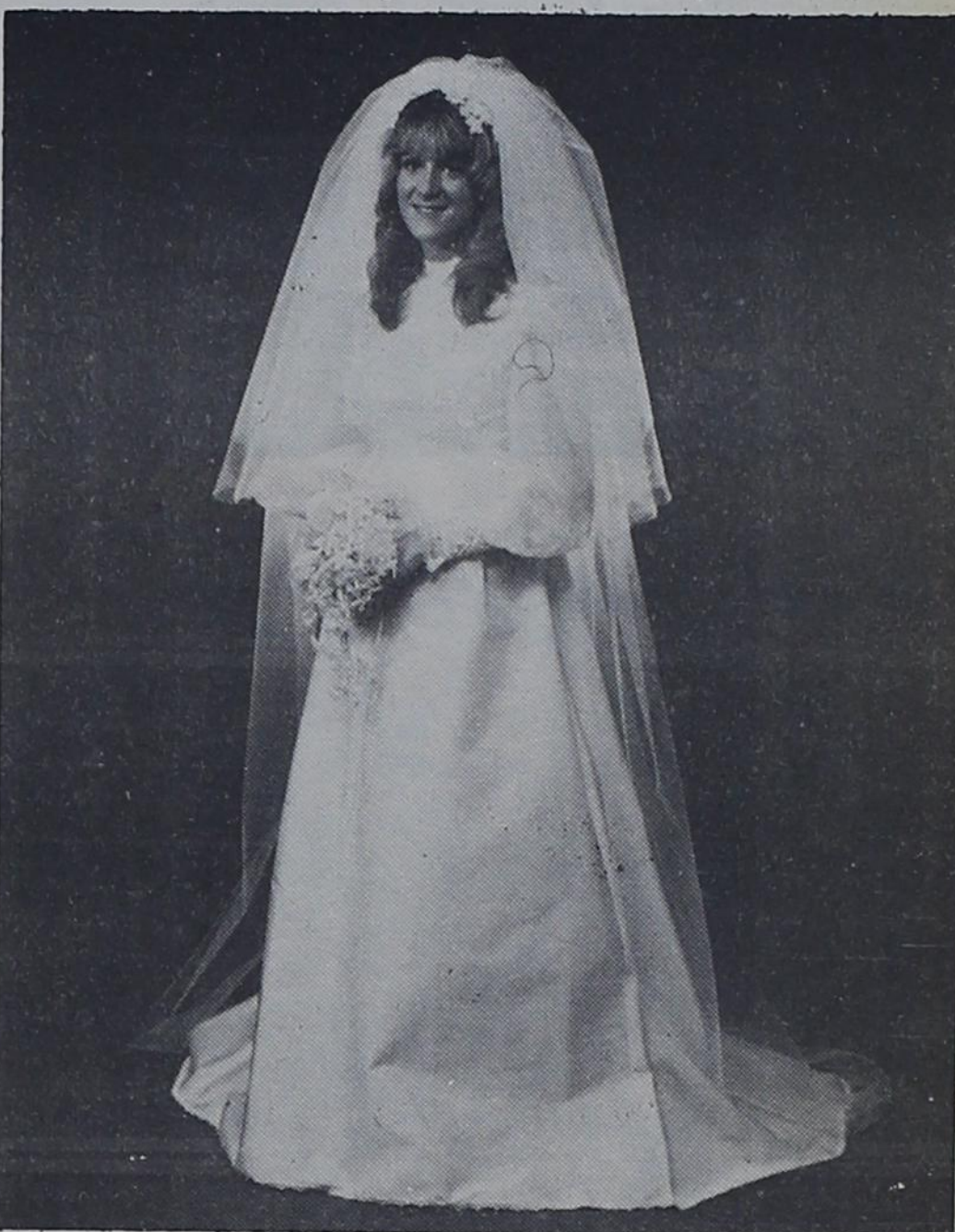
A native of Renter, Mrs. Gentry has lived in Lubbock County for 52 years. She was a member of the Evangelical Methodist Church.

Mr. C. R. Hohertz is New Principal for Shallowater High School this Year

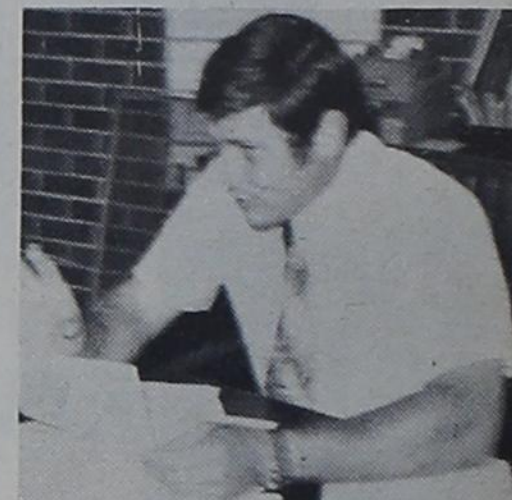

Soundtrack 16

To Shake A Faith

How do you shake the faith of millions of rock fans in the world? Simple, have four of the world's biggest rock stars die in a three year period.

With today's battle between hard rock and bubble gum music, it is hard to tell who are today's rock star heroes. The only one I can think of off hand, is America's own (and the world's) Alice Cooper.

Before 1972, it was easy to tell because four people had a real domination on the rock world. They were, Brian Jones of the Rolling Stones; Jimi Hendrix, Janis Joplin, and Jim Morrison of the Doors.

Brian Jones, perhaps, was the saddest of deaths. He helped form the original Rolling Stones and dominated the limelight with his musicianship and flair. He was busted (arrested) for smoking and possessing Marijuana in 1967, thus starting his downhill slide into drugs.

His break with the Rolling Stones in 1969 was spectacular as everyone expected the Stones to come apart after he left. They didn't, but he did. In July, a month after his split, Jones was found dead in his swimming pool, drowned. The year was 1969.

In 1970, the fall, two of the biggest stars ever to emerge died and put the rock world into a state of shock, yet to be recovered from. Jimi Hendrix, guitarist, song

writer, and vocalist died in September from a drug overdose.

Many rock critics (excluding yours truly) believe one thing that triggered Hendrix's death, was that a swell of his fans were turning to other entertainers for excitement. Maybe so, and if it's true, it's very sad.

In October, Janis Joplin died in a motel room from a drug overdose. One difference though was that she had made a last desperate cry for help. Help, however, arrived too late.

Janis hurricaned her way from the Texas coast to super stardom in 1968. Her scratchy, strong but beautiful voice made her one of America's greatest white blues singers.

The Doors were America's first true superstar bands. When I hear a song by the Doors, the thought of Jim Morrison's death saddens me.

To me, Morrison was the Doors. He didn't play an instrument, but with his voice he cut to the true heart of his songs. Morrison was struck down in the summer of 1971 with a heart attack in Paris, France.

To me, these deaths are very tragic to the work world. I guess, though, that Heaven had a purpose for them. The question is what was it?

What if the deaths had nver occurred? Would we be in the middle of our tug-of-war between hard rock and bubble gum music?

Interesting questions that have interesting answers as possibilities.
