

Plane Crashes Outside Shallowater City Limits

Shallowater Citizen, Kim McMenemy, Receives Top 4-H Honor Recently

Kim McMenemy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Louis McMenemy of Shallowater, was presented the Gold Star Boy Award at the annual Lubbock County 4-H Achievement Banquet in Lubbock Tuesday night. This is the highest award given at the county level. The banquet was sponsored by the South Plains Electric Co-op.

An eight year 4-H club member, Kim was recently named the 1974 state winner in the Field Crops Science program and will attend the National 4-H Club Congress at Chicago in December.

He presently is the president of the Shallowater Club and also has served as vice president, treasurer, and county council delegate. Kim has conducted projects in field crops, swine, entomology, money management, dog care, electricity, foods, and photography. He was the state winner of the 1972 Cotton Production award contest sponsored by the Texas Cotton



Ginners' Association and a winner in the Lubbock County Soil Conservation district contest. Kim is a junior in Shallowater High School and is active in football, basketball, track, and band. He also is a member of the National Honor Society.

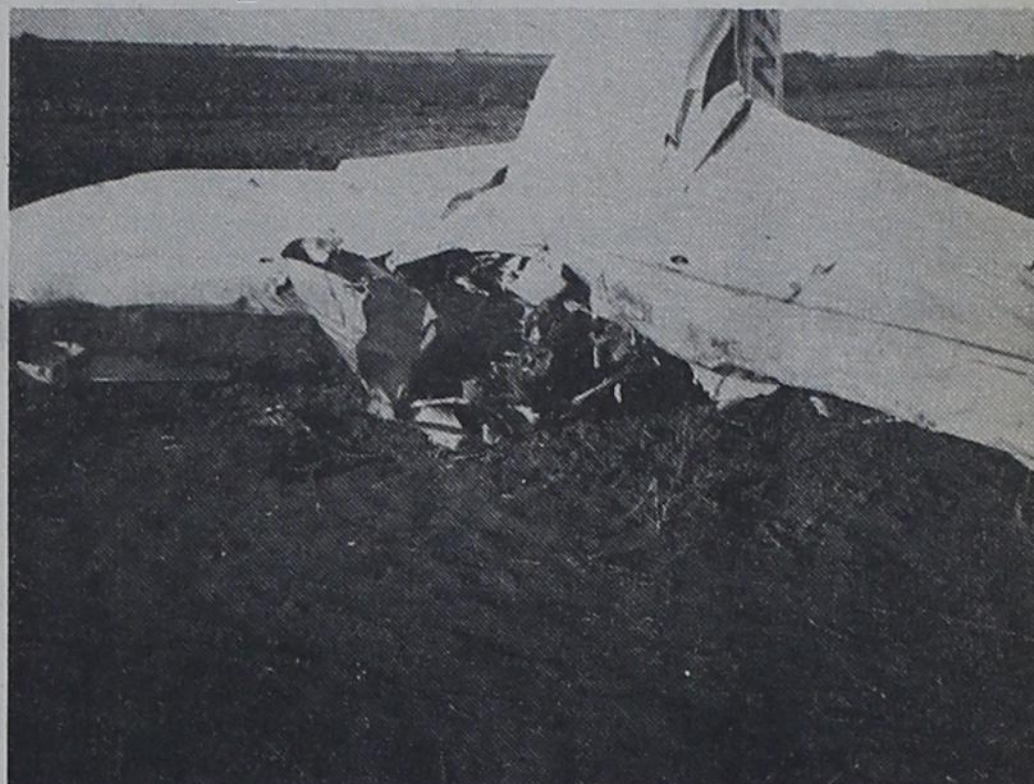
Sunday after 12:05 p.m., four Littlefield residents were killed when their single engine plane crashed in a muddy field near the Shallowater Airport.

The pilot, Bobby Wayne Crittendon, 23, had only two weeks ago become a licensed pilot. His brother-in-law, Larry E. Wiginton, 24; Chipper Lee Joyner, 24, and his wife, Amy Vaughn Joyner, 19, were all pronounced dead at the scene.

Investigators theorized Crittendon was attempting a second landing when the plane stalled and crashed. Both fuel tanks ruptured on impact and the propeller dug into the mud.

Joyner and his wife were seated in the rear, Wiginton sat in the right front seat. All victims were still strapped to their seats when investigators arrived.

With the exception of Crittendon, for whom an autopsy has been



ordered, All deaths were ruled by investigation by the National accident. The crash is under Transportation Safety Board.

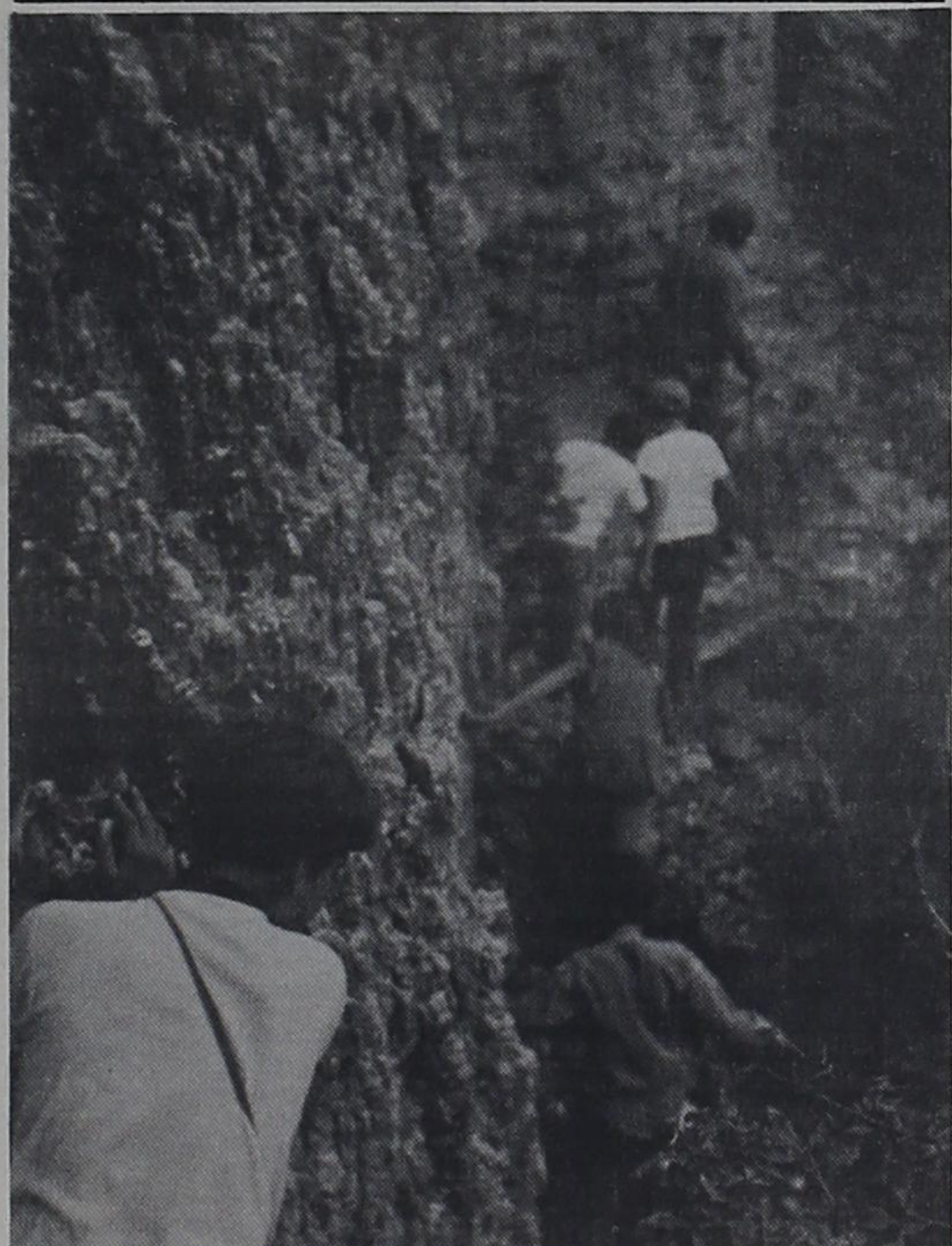
Muscular Dystrophy Drive Slated in Shallowater Monday, November 18th

Rays of Hope

What is true repentance before God? The answer for this is given in 2 Chronicles 7:14. There are four basic points listed in order to find forgiveness and healing.

Listen with your heart to the words from this verse: "If my people, which are called by my name, shall humble themselves, and pray, and seek my face, and

turn from their wicked ways; then will I hear from heaven, and will forgive their sin, and will heal their land."

Sounds simple enough, doesn't it? But when you examine each step in the light of Jesus' teachings, it isn't such a small matter.

Humbleness doesn't mean that you wear old shoes or that you never speak out, humbleness is an attitude of the heart toward God and others.

If you stay humble, you will never hatefully attack another person. Actually, it takes a very strong person to control their inner emotions. Anyone that lashes out at another is showing how weak and troubled he is.

Reverence for God is the beginning of all wisdom and humility. Psalm 34:7-10 tells the success story of a man that humbles himself before God.

There are seven steps to true repentance and humility. These are listed below.

1. fear God
2. Confess sins to God
3. praise God continually
4. submit to and obey God
5. submit to others
6. be a servant
7. confess faults to others.

These steps are the basic teachings of the New Testament.

Texas Tech finally put it altogether last Saturday—only in reverse. For the first time this season, BOTH the offense and defense turned in poor games. As a result, wait 'til next year.

The offense could do little. In fact, 48 yards total offense the first half pretty well tells the story. The Raiders weren't able to complete a pass, had only two first downs. They were impotent beyond belief. It sounded worse than the A&M game.

As for defense, the Raiders had one bright spot—the goal line stand. That was the mark of a championship ball club. Unfortunately, it was almost the last championship type defense in the game.

Rice, with an offense that was rated among the lowest in the league, picked the Raiders apart. They made first downs on both third and fourth down efforts. They ripped holes in the line, swept the ends. They completed passes with too much authority.

It would be easy to nitpick and ask trite questions about the lack of offense, why the need to continually throw the bomb, why pass deep in your own territory.

It would be easy to second guess—as a lot of persons were doing Sunday. Why toss a freshman quarterback into the fray deep in your own end of the field? Why hasn't the offensive line developed eight games deep into the season? Why is the trap block up the middle still so effective? Why... oh, shoot. Forget it, the season's over.

Yes, friends, the Cotton Bowl dream is being put in moth balls—to be resurrected next year when Tech wins two games back to back. A conference title also has been laid to rest for 1974.

What's ahead? Well, for one thing, three games that could give Tech a respectable 8-2-1 season. Bows? Chances that would have to rate in Dizzy Dean's category of slim and none. Aside from the Texas game, the Raider offense has been less than impressive.

Leave out the Texas game and the offense has sputtered this season. There was a long drive against SMU, then touchdown opportunities on which Tech couldn't capitalize.

Looking back on it, the New Mexico game could well have been the clue to the Tech season. The Raiders have not had the killer instinct. The Raiders also have not been a good road team with a 1-2-1 record. Apparently the two go hand in glove.

Now, with the title and Cotton Bowl out of the picture, it might be a good time to play a lot of young players. Give these youngsters some good game experience and have them ready for next year.

Of course, make an honest effort to win with the proven players, but work some of the younger players longer. It's obvious that the offensive line needs the most work. And have at least one man ready to replace Ecomet Burley.

The fight for the league crown settles down, once again, to the monotonous quest of Texas, along with A&M and Baylor, which still has an outside chance of winning.

But now it looks more and more as the A&M-Texas tilt the day after Thanksgiving will decide the crown. The Aggies would appear to have the best chance of toppling the Horns for the first time in seven years. But don't go out and bet the family groceries on it.

Texas came back from the adversity of the Tech loss to play impressively and with the same formula it has used for years. The wishbone still is alive and well in Austin, and Texas runs it well.

The Aggies have size and speed. They have a tough defensive line. Their pass defense has been good. They don't throw much, but they throw pretty well. And, obviously, they have a tough ground game that eats up yardage and controls the clock. It should be a heckuva game.

Baylor has only one loss, to A&M, and maybe only one more tough game—against Texas this Saturday. No, I'm not forgetting Tech, but Jim Carlen says his team is so beaten up by injuries that it's a miracle he can put 11 players on the field. Ergo, Baylor should win.

Anyway, Grant Teaff has done a great job bringing the Bears along and they definitely are in contention. And he's done a superlative task of bringing his young players along following a disastrous 1973 season.

Muhammed Ali, just as he said he would, returned the heavyweight crown to his head and demolished George Foreman. It would be interesting to know if he was that good, or whether he psyched Foreman with all his prefight mouthing.

At any event, there was no question about the decision. Foreman received a boxing lesson and it should help him in the future when he fights, as you know he will, Ali again.

Some of the baseball trades recently were almost unbelievable. Bobby Murcer, for instance, was the probable successor to Mickey Mantle. But the Yankees finally gave up on the Oklahoma phenom. In Bobby Bonds they may well have bought a pennant.

And Hank Aaron's departure as a designated hitter to Milwaukee was not unexpected. Aaron, although a tremendous star, couldn't win a pennant in Atlanta, nor could he draw out the fans. The trade gives him a chance to prolong his career and add to the gate in the Beer City.

Together with my friends, I can walk down the street without

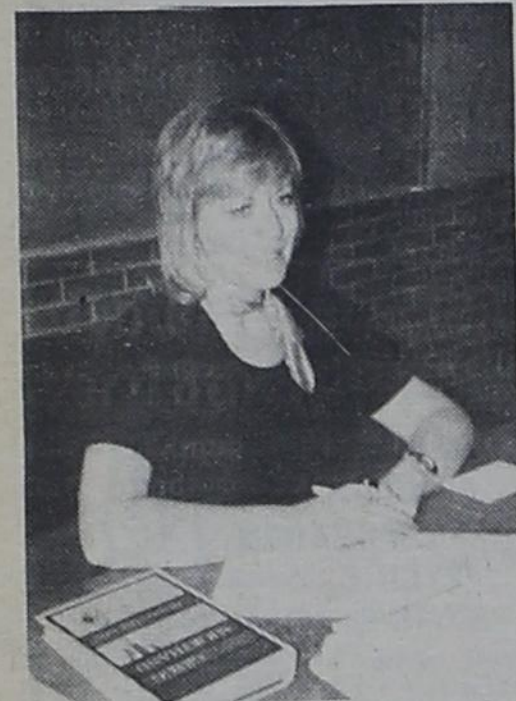
being afraid of being kicked out of my home and on to the street.

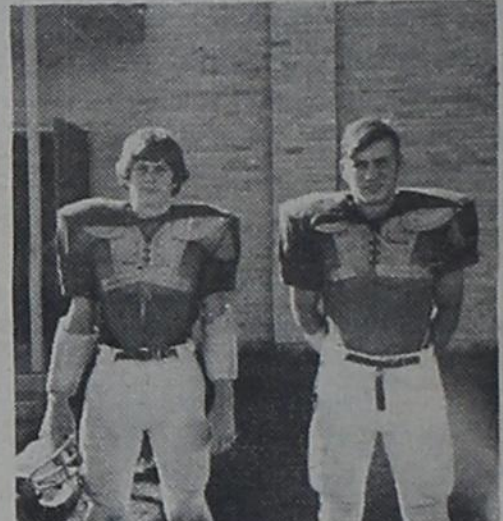
