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USDA officials are in the process of considering views from interested parties concerning the 1973 Commodity Credit Corporation cotton loan program, including a proposal that the 50 point penalty on barks cotton be removed.

Responding to the Federal Register invitation for comment, PCG Executive Vice President Donald Johnson, in a letter to Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Administrator Kenneth Frick, said "In our opinion this argument won't hold water."

The only real controversy revolves around the barky issue. Producers across the belt are unanimous in support of eliminating the penalty. But certain members of the trade are voicing strong opposition.

"(1) Both producers and buyers knew when contracts were signed that there might be, and likely would be, some differences between 1972 and 1973 loan values.

Earlier this year officials of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., Lubbock, recommended that the 50 point penalty on barky cotton, which is now applied in addition to a reduction of one full grade, be dropped. It was pointed out that an Agricultural Marketing Service study and other research work at Texas Tech University's Textile Research Center failed to justify the "double penalty" in terms of such cotton's loss of spinning and finishing performance.

"(2) If the argument is followed to its logical conclusion, then (a) USDA would be barred from making ANY change in premiums and discounts for micronaire, staple or grade in the 1973 loan schedule, and (b) since some cotton is already contracted for 1974-75 delivery, the same argument could be used to prevent a change for the next two years if not indefinitely.

Apparently based on the evidence presented by PCG, USDA in its Federal Register notice of April 9 said "there is reason to conclude that the presence of extraneous matter doesn't affect the ultimate value of such cotton beyond that reflected in the grade reduction."

"(3) Even if you assume that merchants would be unfairly treated on contracted cotton in 1973, only about 59,600 bales on the Plains (10 year average of 14.9 percent barks) times the estimated 400,000 bales contracted) would be affected, while the alternative is to penalize producers, certainly more unfairly, on 298,000 bales (14.9 percent of an expected 2 million bale crop)."

Those in the cotton trade who are objecting are basing their opposition primarily on the grounds that some cotton already has been contracted for Fall 1973 delivery at prices based on points over loan value and that removal of the penalty now would be "changing the rules in the middle of the game."

Johnson's letter concluded by saying "I think you will agree that the objections to your proposal are far outweighed by the merit of the proposal itself and by the necessity for correcting a long-standing inequity in the loan program. We greatly appreciate your understanding of the basic issue in this matter, and again we urge you not to abandon your efforts to give producers a 'fair deal' and a stronger support price for their cotton."

Grain Stocks Decline... San Saba and Gillespie Leading Counties... Egg Production Has Ups and Downs...

Stocks of the four feed grains—corn, oats, barley and grain sorghum—in Texas and throughout the nation continue to show declines, with wheat at the lowest level since 1968.

In Texas, a decrease of 47,000,000 bushels of the four feed grains was reported with grain sorghum declines being responsible for most of the downturn. Only oat stocks are above those of a year ago.

Wheat stocks in Texas stored in all positions as of April 1 are 15 percent below a year ago. Disappearance during the January-April quarter is estimated at 37,700,000 bushels, up sharply from the 3,000,000 bushels disappearance for the same period last year.

Grain sorghum stocks are estimated at 145,400,000 bushels; this is 25 percent below a year ago. Corn stocks are estimated at 15,800,000 bushels, down four percent a year ago.

Soybean stocks are estimated at 5,900,000 bushels, 44 percent below a year ago.

THE TOP counties in Texas in production of fruits and nuts are San Saba and Gillespie. San Saba takes the 1972 honor in pecan production, and Gillespie County is the state's number one peach producing county for 1972.

Texas for 1972 was the nation's leading state in pecan production. The state ranked seventh in 1972 in peach production.

Total pecan production for Texas during 1972 was 65,000,000 pounds. Most of the production was in the south central and cross timbers areas.

Other top counties in pecan production in Texas during 1972 were Gonzales, Comanche, Hood, Guadalupe, Colorado, Lavaca, DeWitt, Bell and El Paso.

Other top counties in peach production in Texas during 1972 were Upshur, Camp, Parker, Montague, Eastland, Clay, Comanche, Limestone and Lampasas.

This year, the peach crop will be produced mostly in Central Texas and East Texas as the late freeze has either damaged or destroyed the crop in north Texas and on the High Plains.

Pecan trees are blooming in many areas of the state. Some damage is expected due to the late freeze which will reduce the crop in some northern sections of the state.

EGG production in Texas continues to have its ups and downs, the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service notes.

Egg production during March was 11 percent below a year ago but 20 percent above last month. Nationwide, egg production was down six percent from the past year.

GROSS income from dairying in Texas during 1972 was up eight percent from the previous year. Texas farmers received a gross income from dairy products of \$243,000,000. A total of 3,300,000,000 pounds of milk was produced in the state during 1972.

Total milk production was up four percent from 1971.

CONTINUE to submit screwworm samples to the fly laboratory at Mission, authorities request.

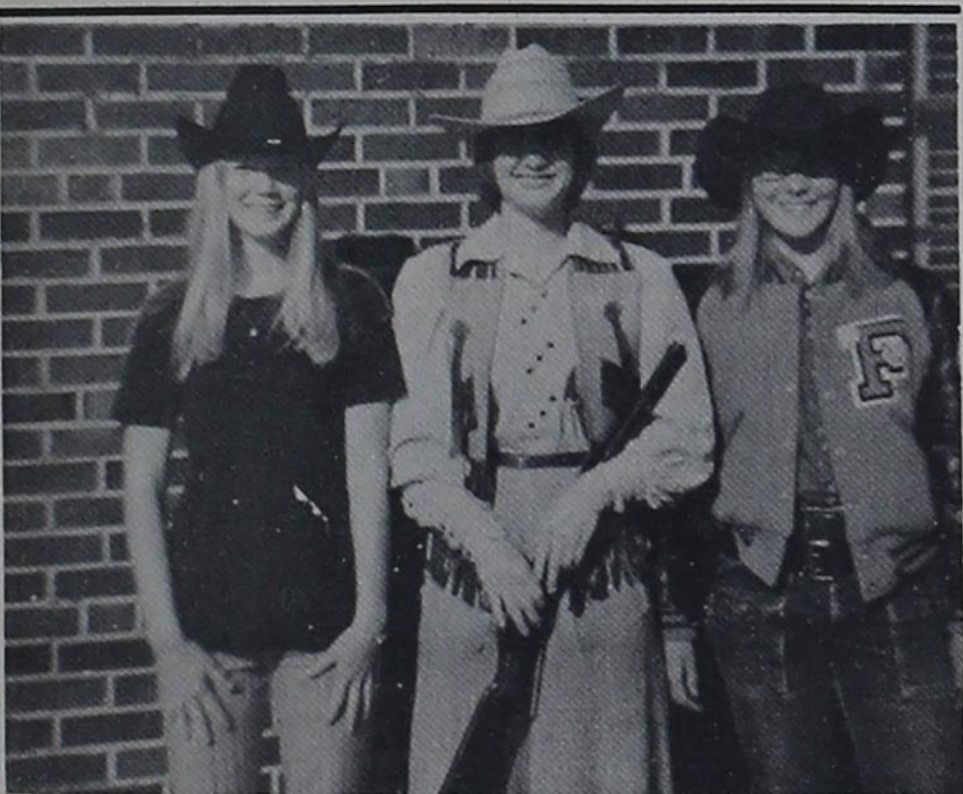
Ropesville City Council Resolution
