Lane Involved In Collision

Last Saturday afternoon Robyn Lane, daughter of Frank and Cindy Lane, was involved in a head-on collision a few miles west of Quitauque. Robyn was traveling west when she met a pickup driven by a Silverton resident driving east in her lane.

The force of the impact broke her steering wheel and caused the dash to fall on her knees and legs. Her knees, legs and ankles were bruised and swollen. She hit her head on something and caused a concussion. Robyn was wearing her seat belt which probably saved her life.

The accident victims (Robyn, and two riding in the pickup) were transported to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo by Silverton ambulances. After x-rays and tests Robyn was released and returned to Turkey to recuperate. Her car will probably be totaled out.

Robyn was quite pleased that Lane (Fuston) Bursion rode in the ambulance with her to Amarillo.

Every since this stretch of highway has been under construction it has been extremely dangerous. Please be cautious as you travel this section of highway.

Crop Scouting Principles To Be Taught At Workshop

by Scott Straun

Training of scouts who survey crops to assess pest infestations in integrated pest management (IPM) programs across the area will be held June 1 at the Ollie Liner Agricultural Center, on South U.S. Hwy. 87 (Business 87).

The workshop is open to summer scouts of private consultants and aerial applicators as well as farmers who scout their own fields. It is conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Training begins at 8:30 a.m. and ends at 4:30 p.m.

It has been accredited by the Texas Department of Agriculture for five continuing education units (CEUs) toward recertification requirements for private, commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicators.

This year's workshop will provide instruction on scouting cotton and grains, identification of plant disease and nutrient deficiency symptoms, use of herbicides and safe handling of pesticides, said Dr. James F. Leser, Extension Service entomologist at Lubbock.

IPM is a coordinated approach to management decisions based on pest infestation levels and economic thresholds. The goal of IPM is to effectively control weeds, insects and diseases and maximize net profit while creating minimal harm to the crop or environment.

Scouts examine fields in a systematic pattern at regular intervals each week. Producer treatments for pests are based on economic threat to the crop, presence of beneficial insects, which are enemies of the pests, and proper timing of pesticide applications for maximum returns with the least chemical input.

Topics for the workshop, and the instructors, all of whom are Extension Service specialists or pest management agents, are:

CEU training and instructions, Leser. Principles of IPM and sampling, Greg Cronholm, Haleswisher pest management agent, Plainview. Cotton growth and development, Dr. Kater Hake, agronomist and cotton specialist, Lubbock.

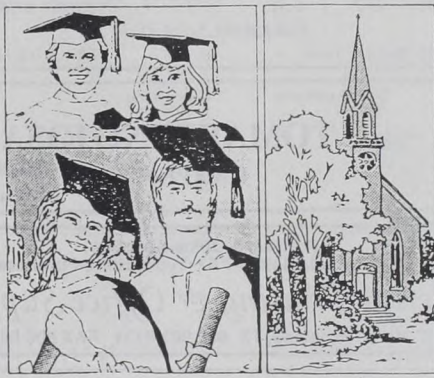

At graduation time, we tend to visualize a bevy of bright-eyed young people barely on the threshold of adulthood. However, this is not a realistic picture of any graduating class of today, as your presence at the commencement exercise would attest. At a typical community college, nearly half of a recent graduating class consisted of students ranging in age from 30 to 50. This reinforces what your faith teaches you: that the learning process should continue throughout your lifetime, including the study of your creed and its origin, which helps you to adapt it to the problems of everyday living. This is a never-ending curriculum at your House of Worship, where there is no graduating ceremony; but the lessons take place there every Sabbath Day and the homework assignment is the honest and ethical way in which you conduct your life all seven days of the week.

Chicken Primavera

Yield: 4 servings
Preparation Time: 10 minutes
Cooking Time: 20 minutes
2 teaspoons butter or margarine
4 (4 oz.) boneless, skinless chicken breast halves
1 (14 1/2 oz.) can SWEET SUE Chicken Broth
1/2 cup water
1/4 teaspoon dried thyme leaves, crushed
