Greetings from Turkey, Texas!

It's almost as isolated as Capachica, Peru, but there are some remarkable lifferences: electric heating, running hot and cold wat-er, indoor bathroom, paved roads, and television that works.

Before going on to Maryknoll, New York in January for a sixweek renewal program, my time in Texas with both Protestant and Catholic friends and relatives has been and is a very rich rewarding naring experience.

The place I have been working for the past year—the Capachica Peninsula in Lake Titicaca, Peru-is much on my mind these days as I talk and show slides about the life, the people, and the work.

One evening two years ago in the Puno Peru government hospital, where a little 12-year-old girl died in my arms with a lung hemmorrhage due to tuberculosis, I determined to work in health edu-cation out in the country if at all possible I had seen too many In-dians die, slaves to ignorance, to

custom, to poverty. The Jefferson City, Missouri Diocese sponsors a mission from which one can work with these il-Maryknoll Sisters to work with them and accepted the idea of one. Sister who would work in health education, and one Sister in cate-

Working with this excellent group, I was able to contribute home help in nutrition, homemaking, school hygeine, first-air in-struction, a vaccination program. and a tuberculosis case-finding instruction and treatment program.

These people can understand the suffering Christ because suffering is a reality in their lives—the joy of the Child-Savior born is shadowed by the Cross. The poor must be free to respect themselves, to be concerned for others, to have reason for living; only then can they be truly happy; only then does the full meaning of the Cross of Calvary burst into the joy Christmas and the sunshine
