City Of Quitaque Election Scheduled For August 11

The City of Quitaque will be conducting an election on Sat-urday, August 11, 1990, at the Community Center to vote on two Sales Tax propositions.

Proposition one is for the adoption of an additional onehalf of one percent sales and use tax within the City to be used to reduce the property tax.

This sales and use tax is designed specifically to reduce property taxes. If this proposition is passed the City will reduce its effective and rollback tax rates to offset the expected sales tax revenue.

adoption of an additional one half of one percent sales and use tax within the City to be used for cconomic development.

This notice concerns 1990 property tax rates for City of Turkey. It presents information about three tax rates. Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of the property with adjustments as required by state law. The rates are given per \$100 of property value.

'HATS OFF TO PARENTS'

Parents, you are the most important people in your child's life! You are their first teacher. You can most effectively build up or tear down their self-esteem. You are the ones from whom your child should know that he/she can receive un-

conditional love--no matter how
"bad" or "good" they may behave.
Your child should feel that you
will always be there for him no matter what. Have you ever thought how it would feel to be a child who is unsure about whether his parents will come home, or if they have an argument whether they will walk out on him? Parents are the only real stability a child has. If he feels this stability is threatened, it is a frightening feeling. So, you see, you are your child's rock of safety, security and support. 


