The Agri-Mechanics Team placed second in the contest and second in Area I, and also advanced to the State Contest. These team members are Dan Meyer, Chuck Martin and Kirk Saul. Saul

Included in this historical newspaper are stories about some of the oldtimers; the construction of business buildings and homes, and the disasters that destroyed some of them; the fun times that brought the cheers and laughter, and the tragedies that gave the entire community heartaches and tears.

There is a part of it that is prepared in memory of the Turkey servicemen who made the supreme sacrifice for their country.

If you have ever lived in Turkey, you'll want a copy of this "scrapbook" which paints a picture of the settling of the territory and building of the town.

It tells about the fire that destroyed much of downtown Turkey, the organization of the Fire Department and Lions Club, the 18-hour great blizzard, who started Dreamland Cemetery, how Turkey and Mt. Nebo got their names, how people celebrated on the day the first train came to Turkey, about the first schools and some of the teachers, athletic teams, victories and athletic teams, victories and defeats.
