Valley FFA Members Win at Texas Tech Judging Contests Saturday

The Valley Future Farmers of America were represented Saturday at the Area Judging Contests at Texas Tech University in Lubbock by six teams.

The Livestock Team, whose members were Scott Saul, Wes Farley and Jess Little, competed in a field of 105 teams and performed extremely well.

The Meats Team competed with 32 other teams and placed tenth in the Area. The team consisted of Jeff Fuston, Gary Brannon, Robert Patrick and Joe

Morrison.

The Range and Pasture Plant Identification Team consisted of Shane House, Randy Pointer, John Harmon and Jessie Chavira. This team competed in a field of 21 teams and placed fourth in the contest and second in Area I.

The Dairy Products Team consisted of Jamie Cox, Roby Beavers, Derek Mullin and Billy Robison. These young men placed third in a field of 30 teams, and took second place in Area I,

which advanced them to the State Judging Contest at Texas A&M University on April 26. Lubbock Monterey won the Area Contest in Dairy Products.

The Agri-Mechanics Team placed second in the contest and second in Area I, and also advanced to the State Contest. These team members are Dan Meyer, Chuck Martin and Kirk Saul.

The Dairy Cattle Team, consisting of Kelly Patrick, Suzie Farley, Craig Setliff and Kirk Martin, was the winning team in a field of 77 teams in Saturday's contest which definitely is one of the greatest accomplishments ever for the Valley FFA. These four team members won the contest by a 20-point margin out of over 800 points which is an extremely high score and advanced them to the State Contest. Nazareth FFA was second in the contest. Overall, Valley teams won 13 Texas Tech, Area I and Greenbelt District banners, nine individual honor caps, and a winning trophy.

The menu will consist of enchiladas, pinto beans, salad, Mexican cornbread, cobbler and iced tea.

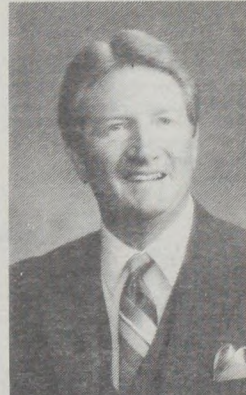

Historical Newspaper Goes on Sale Monday

A 64-page collection of clippings from The Turkey Enterprise (1925-1960) published under the name "Old Filings," goes

on sale in Turkey Monday, April 21, San Jacinto Day. Copies will be available from Sybil Young, Box 415, Turkey, Tx. 79261, or from the Turkey Public Library, c/o Nadine Baisden, Route 1, Turkey, Tx. 79261, for \$5.00 per copy. (Copies cost \$6.00 each if

they are to be mailed.) Proceeds of this sesquicentennial project will go toward cemetery improvement.

Included in this historical newspaper are stories about some of the oldtimers; the construction of business buildings and homes, and the disasters that destroyed some of them; the fun times that brought the cheers and laughter, and the tragedies that gave the entire community heartaches and tears.

There is a part of it that is prepared in memory of the Turkey servicemen who made the supreme sacrifice for their country.

If you have ever lived in Turkey, you'll want a copy of this "scrapbook" which paints a picture of the settling of the territory and building of the town.

"Old Filings" includes several historical drawings by Otho Stubbs and a few reproductions of pictures as they appeared in The Enterprise.

It tells about the fire that destroyed much of downtown Turkey, the organization of the Fire Department and Lions Club, the 18-hour great blizzard, who started Dreamland Cemetery, how Turkey and Mt. Nebo got their names, how people celebrated on the day the first train came to Turkey, about the first schools and some of the teachers, athletic teams, victories and defeats.

It is a terrific project of the Turkey Sesquicentennial Committee, and if you wait to look at someone else's copy, the first thousand will be gone and you'll have to wait for the second printing to get one.

Briscoe County Leaders to Identify Most Critical Issues

County leaders will convene tonight (Thursday) in the Pioneer Room of First State Bank in Silverton at 7:00 o'clock to identify critical issues facing Briscoe County citizens in agriculture, family living, community development and youth.

These leaders were selected by the Extension Program Build-

ing Executive Committee for their interest and expertise in one of the four areas of concern. The leaders will be divided into the four major areas for discussion of county concerns that could be addressed through Extension educational programs.

A second meeting in June will bring back the group to prioritize issues identified in each task force group into the most critical concerns facing the county during the next four years.

Moderator for the study group meeting is Jimmy Burson, chairman of the Program Building Executive Committee. He will also be the leader for the agriculture task force, with James Griffin serving as recorder.

The massive fireworks show "is unquestionably the largest and most extensive ever attempted anywhere," according to the show's executive producer, Gary Caimano from Pyro-Spectaculars.

Other cities included in the "simulblast" include Lubbock at Buddy Holly Park, KSEL-FM 93.7.

Fireworks will be choreographed to patriotic music developed specifically for the events and simulcast on radio stations in each city. With an 18-minute display, the fireworks will conclude a two-day festival—the "Texas 150 Celebration"—hosted by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department at San Jacinto Battleground State Historical Park, a 756-acre site located 17 miles east of downtown Houston on Highway 234, LaPorte. The commemoration of the epic battle in Texas' struggle for independence is expected to attract some of the country's highest elected officials and as many as 75,000 spectators.

More than eight million Texans will be able to see the fireworks show throughout the state. This simultaneous event over thousands of square miles will symbolically link Texans as they commemorate the historic moment.

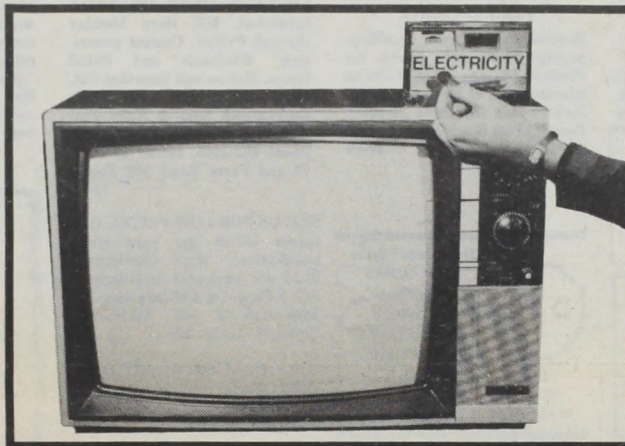

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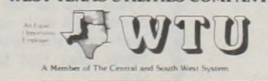
