IT'S TIME TO GET OVERSEAS PACKAGES READY TO MAIL

Tone of St. Nick's gifts will be going to members of the Armed Forces in Vietnam by special ship this year, thanks to a joint Pentagon-Post Office venture.

A fast U. S. cargo ship will be designated the "1968 SANTA CLAUS SPECIAL" sailing from Oakland, California next month with Christmas parcels.

To meet the sailing deadline and assure pre-holiday delivery of gift sent with surface postage, items should be mailed during the October 14-November 9 period. They should be marked "Santa Claus Special" just below the stamp.

The "SANTA CLAUS SPECIAL" will sail during the latter half of November and stop at Da Nang, Qui Nhom, Cam Rhan Bay and Saigon, Vietnam. It takes approximately three weeks for a fast ship to cross the ocean.

All gifts should be packed in strong containers with adequate cushioning and correctly addressed, including APO and FPO numbers.

There are several options available for mailing to the military which can save money. Post offices across the nation have free pamphlets which outline the mailing programs for servicemen and women overseas.

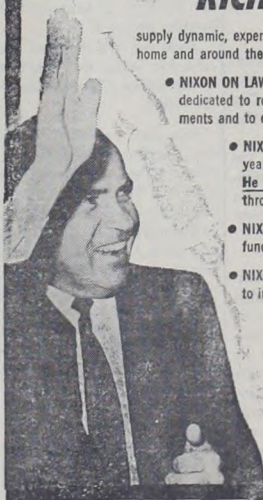

Shirttail Sermon

The story of the Prodigal Son, found in Luke 15:11-23, is an old story that is familiar to all Christians. Though it be familiar, we can still learn from it. Three lessons are particularly important to us.

First, the son was sick of home.

Frequently today we hear a Christian remark that he is "sick of hearing the same old thing, Sunday after Sunday. If you do this or that you are lost and need to stop doing it." The preacher is usually concerned with one thing—the welfare of his church members. And those church members are usually not perfect, being human beings. Being imperfect, they are prone to sin and thus they offend God. It is this offense that the preacher tries to warn his flock against. The church member who is sick of hearing about sin is usually the one who is most guilty.

Second, the son became homesick. Every church has on its list of members those who have become careless about their church attendance. They are often unhappy about their relationship to

God but are not aware of the reason for their unhappiness. Actually, all they need to do is to reestablish their relationship to the church and to God to become happy again. In other words, they are homesick for the fold of God in which they were once so happy.

Third, the son came home. When he came home, he was happy again. The world outside his home was not what he had expected it to be and he felt insecure and alone. As soon as he came in sight of home, he regained his feeling of security and lost the feeling of being alone.

The Christian who has left his "home"—the Church of the Living Christ—needs to examine his feelings and acknowledge the fact that his unhappiness is due to his leaving "home."

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3-day convention planned by Jehovah's Witnesses in Levelland, November 8-10, with more than 500 expected to attend. The Levelland High School Auditorium will be the scene of three days of intensive Bible education for the local witnesses who are planning to attend the Christian gathering with many from this area already making preparations to share in all of the sessions.

More than fifteen congregations will participate in the training that will be designed to encourage the witnesses to continue their ministry in the home towns that will be represented. Delegates from some 30 communities in the area will attend according to convention officials.

"Twice a year congregations tied together as a 'Circuit' meet for a 3-day circuit assembly," stated Von Tiffin, local presiding minister who will have a prominent role in the gathering. Election Ballot Change May Confuse Some Voters

Two factors may cause some balloting confusion in the November 5 general election, election officials in Texas forecast this week.

The two factors are:
1. A new State law has inserted a new top line on the paper ballots so that persons desiring to vote a "straight party ticket" may do so by making one mark. This new line is expected to confuse not only the "straight ticket" voters, but also the "split ticket" voters.
2. "Split ticket" voters are expected to be more numerous than ever before, especially since there is a third party, the American Party, and it has candidates for only President and Vice-President and no other offices.

The "scratch" method of voting, which some people prefer, is still permitted. However, voters using this method are cautioned to be certain to mark through all names in all three party columns for which they do not wish to vote.

There are 19 counties in Texas that use voting machines. As in the past, one lever can be pulled to vote a "straight ticket." To vote a "split ticket," individual levers should be pulled for each candidate of the voter's choice. Persons who are uncertain as to how to operate a machine should contact one of the election officials before entering the voting booth.

Voting machines are scheduled to be used in the following counties: Bell, Bexar, Brazoria, Cameron, Dallas, Ector, El Paso, Galveston, Gregg, Harris, Hidalgo, Jefferson, Midland, Nueces, Potter, Randall, Rusk, Smith and Tarrant.
