Gina Conner Earns Paderewski Gold

The American Guild of Musicians, the largest music organization in the United States, recently bestowed one of its highest honors upon a local piano student. Gina Conner was the recipient of the Paderewski Gold Medal, an honor only 143 students received nationwide, and only 20 from Texas.

To qualify for this award, Gina was required to memorize ten piano pieces each year, of advancing difficulty for ten consecutive years to be performed in National Guild Auditions, earning high ratings from Guild adjudicators.

Gina has studied piano for eleven years, and is the fourth student of Mrs. Ross Herrington to receive this honor--the others being Melissa Maupin, Joe

Morrison, and Amy Maupin. She was honored with a

special plaque at the spring recital. Gina is also a State UIL piano participant, and has received high ratings at WTSU Music Festival, and other music competitions for her proficiency at the piano.

Gina is an honor student, and a senior at Valley High next year. She is actively involved in basketball and all phases of school activities. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elgin Conner.



Father And Son Injured In Accident

Trent and Coy McKay of Quitaque were both injured in an accident last Wednesday as they were working with a piece of dirt moving equipment at their home.

Trent was driving the heavy machinery when the pin holding the blade on fell out. Coy, age 10, was attempting to hold up the tongue when it slipped, severely injuring his right hand.

As McKay was taking his young son for medical

treatment, his daughter Hollie noticed blood on her dad's pants leg. Unknowing to McKay, he had received a severe tear to his leg as he was getting off the machinery when Coy was injured.

Coy received twenty stitches and one broken finger on his hand. Trent's injury required twenty-three stitches to close up his leg.

They are both reported doing fine now.

Appraisal Board Meets In Silverton

The Briscoe County Appraisal District Board of Directors met in regular session Thursday, June 8, 1989, at 9 a.m.

The meeting was called to order by chairman L.B. Garvin, with all members present. Carlye Fleming was also present.

Minutes of the May 15 called meeting were read by secretary McPherson. These were approved as read.

Carlye presented the financial report.

1988 tax roll collections through the month of May were as follows:

Briscoe County 95.3%
Silverton ISD 96.6%
City of Silverton 94.0%
City of Quitaque 86.7%
Mackenzie Water Authority 93.5%

This represents over-all collections of 95.0%.

Carlye noted that she is

going to meet with Rita Mosely, C.P.A., on Monday, June 19, 1989, for assistance in planning the appraisal district's 1990 budget. 1990 is the year for the next reappraisal, and this may influence the budget somewhat. The law states that each appraisal district must conduct a reappraisal every four years. Board members agreed to have a called meeting on Tuesday, June 27, 1989, at 8 a.m. to further discuss the budget.

Following examination of the current month's bills, the motion was made by Mercer and seconded by Bowman to pay all bills presented at this meeting, including \$125 to the U.S. Post Office for postage. The motion carried.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

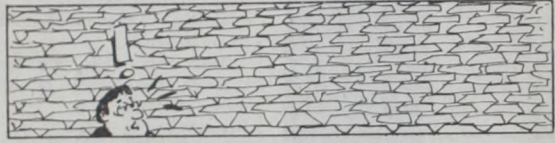
BROWNIE NEWS



The all-night "lock-in" which begins at 10:30 p.m. will feature sports tournaments, pool-side dancing, and "rap" sessions on teen sexuality, teen suicide, peer counseling, self-esteem, substance abuse, crisis problem solving and leadership.

Guest speakers during the all-night seminar are Dawnn Lewis, a TV star of "A Different World" and David Davis, author of *Surviving As A Teenager*, who will talk on "Making Your Dreams Come True."

Sports celebrities will also participate in the games and activities.

The College of Home Economics at Texas Tech University, Lubbock, was cited for outstanding support of the Texas 4-H program at the 1989 State 4-H Roundup at Texas A&M University June 6.

Mary Reeves, director of external relations with the college, was presented a special plaque by the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation, the service organization of 4-H, in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the parent organization of the 4-H program.

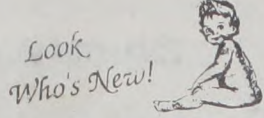

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

People who are developmentally disabled may qualify for monthly benefits under either the social security or the supplemental security income (SSI) program, sometimes both. The medical requirements for eligibility so far as disability is concerned are the same for both programs. However, other eligibility rules differ.

Barrym Cash Lane

A mentally retarded person can get social security payments when a parent starts getting social security retirement or disability payments, or when an insured parent dies. It doesn't matter how old the child is, but he or she must have become disabled before age 22. A retarded person who has worked long enough under social security can also get benefits on his or her own work record.

SSI payments are paid to disabled people of any age, as well as the blind, and people 65 and over. However, SSI payments are based on financial need, and are made to people who have limited income and resources.

In deciding if a child under 18 and living at home can get SSI payments, part of the parents' income and resources are considered to be that of the child. After applying allowances for work and living expenses, and for other children living in the home, the remaining amount of the parents' income is used to decide if a child meets the income and resource limits.

The 4-H'ers and their sponsors, Patsy Towe and Lynda Fogerson, reported having a great time in spite of their lack of sleep during the four-day excursion.

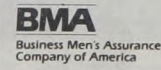
