The Quitaque Volunteer Fire Department answered two calls last week.

On Tuesday, June 21, fire destroyed a pickup owned by Bennie D. Brown of Quitaque. According to report, a tire blew out and ignited material in the back of the pickup. The accident happened on Highway 86, ap-

proximately six miles west of Quitaque.

Friday morning, a fire on the Gerald Smith farm west of Quitaque destroyed a barn and approximately 100 bales of hay. The Fire Department contained the blaze to the barn and was able to save an adjacent building and shop.

"Best of Thoughts For Thursday Now On Sale In Tulia

The Valley Tribune editor was delightfully surprised Thursday morning of last week when she received a copy of H. M. Baggarly's newest book, "The Best of Thoughts For Thursday," through the mail. Mr. Baggarly recently was honored with an autograph party in Tulia, which the editor was unable to attend. This book is a compilation of the poetry and prose by his mother and himself. He was editor of the Tulia Herald from 1950 to 1979 when he retired. He has written several books.

Mr. Baggarly is a well-educated man. He is a Yale graduate, well-read, and had the chance to work in Washington, D. C. for Lyndon Johnson at one time. He wrote the column, "The Country Editor," for many years in the Tulia Herald. He has received many honors, including the degree of Doctor of Humane Letters issued by the National Christian University of Missouri in 1981. West Texas State University presented him the Mary Kate Tripp Award for distinguished service in professional journalism in 1979. (Mrs. Tripp compiled the new book for Mr. Baggarly and wrote the Foreword). Texas Tech University awarded him its second Southwest Journalist Award in 1982.

Mr. Baggarly taught school in Tulia. He spent time in the U. S. Navy during World War II where he was a junior officer aide to Adm. Chester W. Nimitz, Commander-in-Chief of the Pacific Fleet. After his tour of duty, he spent a brief time to complete his work on his master's degree, then taught one more year

before beginning his long period as editor of the Tulia Herald.

The late Gaston Owens consulted Mr. Baggarly on numerous occasions for political opinions. He had great respect for Mr. Baggarly.

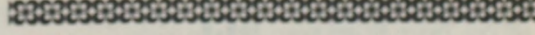

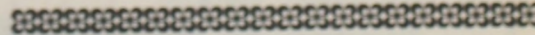
