



Wash cucumbers: Do not peed, should Slice paper thin. You will have approximately 16 cups. Slice and shred green peopers from which all seeds and pith have been removed. Slice onions. Pack vegetables in a large crock or bowl with salt sprinkled through and cover with ice. Weight vegetables down with beavy lid or plate and let stand for three hours.

Drain, rinse quickly, and drain eain thoroughly. Too much water-linging to the vegetables will make the pickling syrup weak and you will have too much liquid. Make pickling syrup of white sugar and vinegar. Add spices and boil for five minutes.
