Hamilton Wins Trip To

Experimental Aircraft Academy

This week, as other out-of-school teens lay around soaking up rays, seeing Ghostbusters again or feeding the ducks at Bear Creek Park, Sammy Hamilton will be learning to assemble a

small sport aircraft, gaining flight experience and visiting aviation centers. And in August, as a climax to three weeks of these activities plus mechanical workshops and

classroom studies, he will attend the world's largest aviation event, the 32nd annual FAA International Fly-in Convention and Sport Aviation Exhibition.

For those of you who aren't airplane nuts, didn't see the Confederate Air Force in Denton this past weekend and aren't feeling the slightest twinge of envy for the 17-year-old Keller senior by this time, consider that he's doing these things in a climate that is perhaps 20

degrees cooler than our own.

After making application this January, Hamilton heard in May he had been selected as one of 30 youths ages 15-17 from across the United States and elsewhere to participate in the Experimental Aircraft Association Air Academy.

Two other students are also coming from England, one from Israel and one from Portugal.

The Academy offers young people an opportunity to rub elbows with aviation professionals as well as learn the arts, science and lore of aviation through a variety of hands-on and academic experience.

Prime considerations for acceptance are interest and enthusiasm.

The tall dark-haired Hamilton has both, some of it probably genetic. Having lived on a private air strip in Stagecoach Hills most of his life with a Dad who flies for American Airlines and is a private pilot as well, some of it probably rubbed off, too.

As he grew, so did his interest in flying machines, he said; June 22 he received his private pilot's license.

"The more I'm around them, the more I like them," he explained.

Meeting people and learning more about aviation will be the high points of the Oshkosh trip, Hamilton said. He attended the famous air show for the first time last year.

"I wanted to get out of the house and do something interesting this summer," he said, "and I'm interested in a career in aviation."

Hamilton also said the experience building a sport aircraft would be helpful to him in trying to finish building a small just-purchased home built.

The airplane, a 70 percent complete two place open cockpit biplane called a Skybolt, was purchased about a month ago by his father.

The Hamiltons are also partners in the ownership of several planes, including a Cessna 182 and a Champ.

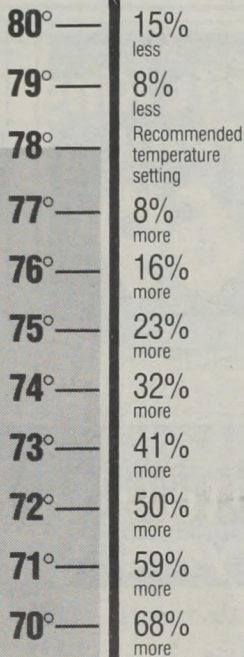

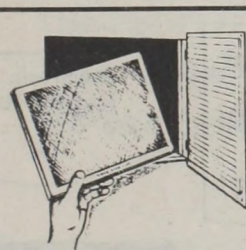

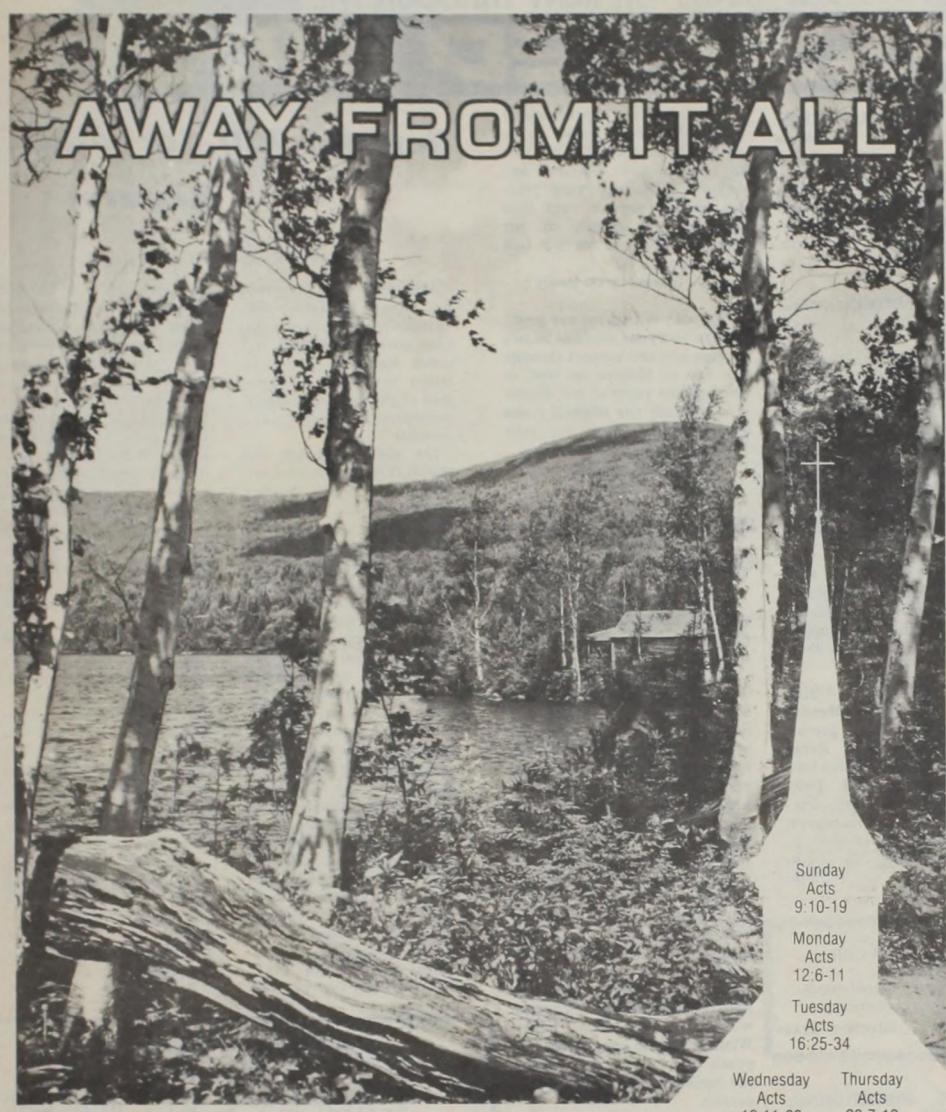

FARMWORKERS GET COVERAGE

AUSTIN — The Governor has signed legislation that extends workers' compensation coverage to farm and ranch workers. The legislation marks the culmination of the work of a special committee of which I was a member.

The compromise bill was the work of the Joint Committee on Farm Worker Insurance and represented more than two years of effort. It was passed during the Special Legislative Session this summer along with school reform and a tax bill.

The new legislation removes the current exemption for farm and ranch laborers and now provides workers' compensation for laborers who are migrant workers, seasonal workers employed on a truck farm, orchard or vineyard or employed by an employer whose gross annual payroll for the preceding year exceeds \$25,000, adjustable each year for inflation.

The coverage also extends to farm or ranch laborers employed by an employer whose gross annual payroll for the preceding year exceeded \$75,000 for 1985-87; \$50,000 for 1988-90

and after 1991 at \$25,000 as adjusted by inflation, or those who employ three or more farm laborers other than migrant or seasonal workers.

The primary responsibility for workers' compensation coverage is with the labor agent. If the labor agent — or crew chief — does not provide coverage, then the person with whom the labor agent contracts is jointly and severally liable with the labor agent in an action to recover damages for personal injuries or death suffered by a worker.

If migrant or seasonal workers are covered by a workers' compensation insurance policy, the owner or operator of the property on which the workers perform farm or ranch labor is not liable in a separate action for injury compensable under that policy, except in instances of gross negligence.

A labor agent must notify each person with whom he contracts of whether he subscribes to workers' compensation insurance and must provide evidence of any coverage.

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
