Hall County CED Formed; Orders Election August 10

The Hall County Education District was recently formed with Bobby J. Wiggins, Dick Hutcherson and Brian Wheeler of Valley as trustees, and one of the first official acts has been the signing of an Order of Election.

The newly formed County Education District (CED) has called for an election to be held in Memphis I. S. D., Lakeview I. S. D. and Turkey-Quitaque I. S. D. for August 10, 1991, for the purposes of voting on issues pursuant to House Bill 2885, 72nd Legislature.

The first proposition for school district patrons who have valid voter registration certificates to decide on the CED ballot is: "The taxation of all tangible personal property, other than manufactured homes in Hall County Education District that is not held or used for the production of income."

The second proposition votes must check either for or against is: "The exemption of 20 percent of the market value of the residence homestead from ad valorem taxation in Hall County Education District."

The third proposition on the ballot states: The exemption of \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of an individual who is disabled and of \$10,000 of the market value of the residence homestead of an individual who is 65 or older

from ad valorem taxation in Hall County Education District."

Memphis I. S. D., Lakeview I. S. D. and Turkey-Quitaque I. S. D. voters living in Hall County will cast their Hall County Education District ballots in balloting boxes at the same polling locations as used for General Elections. Hall County is holding Election August 10 on the two Constitutional Amendments to be voted upon by Texas voters which must be approved statewide.

On the County ballot as Proposition No. 1 voters will be asked to mark a ballot for or against: "The constitutional amendment to allow the voters of a county education district to adopt certain exemptions from district's

ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads and to provide for the taxation of certain tangible personal property."

The other Proposition, No. 2, reads: "the constitutional amendment providing for issuance of general obligation bonds to provide educational loans to students." Voters of Turkey-Quitaque I. S. D. residing in Briscoe County will vote in a box at City Hall in Quitaque and Turkey City Hall for voters residing in Hall County.

Absentee voting Turkey-Quitaque I.S.D. will be held at Valley School from 9 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday-Friday. Absentee voting will begin July 22, 1991 until August 6, 1991.

BCAA Sponsored Contest To Name Miss Briscoe County

The BCAA is sponsoring a Miss Briscoe County Contest for the Briscoe County Birthday Celebration this year. Any young lady from the age of 13 to a 1991 Senior that attended Silvertown or Valley School is eligible to enter. There will be no entrance fee or any sponsors needed.

The girls will be required to model at 12 noon on August 10 at the courthouse shelter. They will then be interviewed at City Hall by a panel of three judges.

There will be a place provided for the young ladies to change clothing.

The candidates will also be required to sell rodeo and saddle tickets. The winner will be determined by her modeling ability, poise, etc at the interview, and tickets sold.

A one day modeling school will be provided by the BCAA. Lida Reynolds of Lake Tanglewood, who is a former model and makeup expert of Sakiwitz of Fifth Avenue will hold the school for the candidates.

The girls entering the contest will need to be at the rodeo each night. They will not be required to ride a horse. A vehicle will take them around the arena. The BCAA will furnish a float in the parade for the contestants to ride on.

Quitaque City Council Passes 91-92 Budget

The City Council for the City of Quitaque adopted the FY91-92 budget for the City at a regular meeting held on Monday, July 1, 1991. This budget represented a four percent increase in spending over the FY90-91 budget. Surplus revenues from the previous budget will adequately cover this increase in spending with no increase in fees for services.

Other action taken by the Council included the adoption of the Mission Statements and Roles for Caprock Public Library as presented by the Library Advisory Board, and the intent to file a joint application with the City of Silvertown for grant funds from the Texas Community Development Program for the development of a solid waste transfer station.

Troy Phillips was added as Coordinator and Sandra Braddock to the Safety Loss Control Committee.

The adoption of the Safety Policy State with TAC was ordered; the County Clerk was named Record Management

Keeper, and the Drug Free Policy was adopted. A discussion on 9-1-1 Program was held.

County Judge Kenneth Dale presented a proposed budget to the commissioners and upon a vote on the budget, the vote was split, two for, two against and Judge Dale withdrew from voting so the proposed budget was rejected.
