Gears and Gadgets

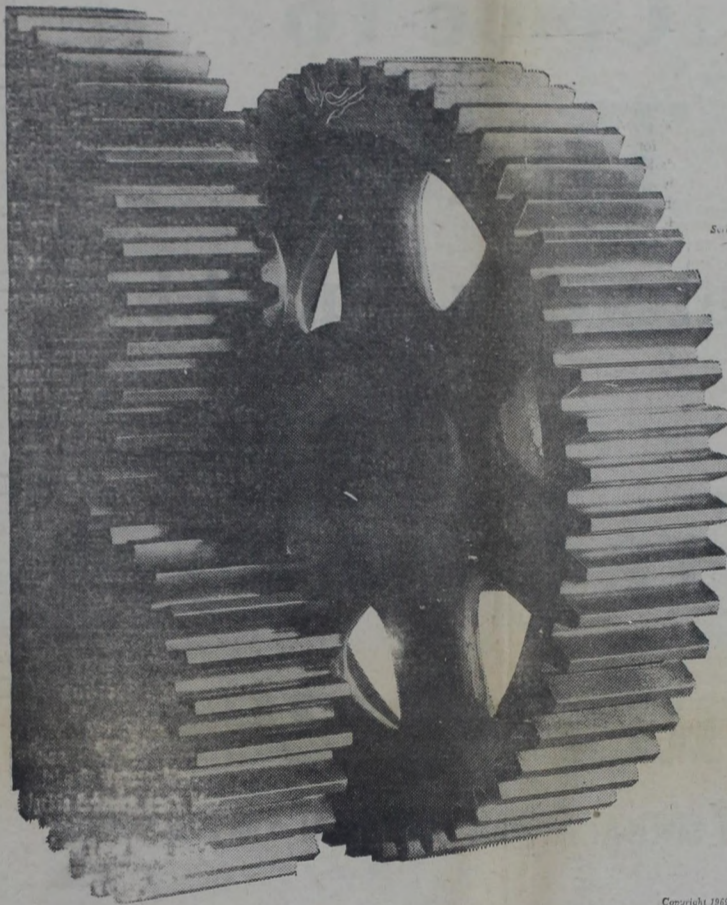
Huge gears turn ponderously—meshing with others which turn still others, and power is born, energy released.

PREGNANCY AND LEG BEAUTY

Does pregnancy mean goodbye to beautiful legs?

"In far too many cases, that is just what it means," said medical researcher William O. Elson, director of the research laboratories of the Bauer & Black Supports Division of the Kendall Company.

"Pregnancy normally adds a temporary 20 pounds to the weight of the mother-to-be, and often much more if she does not carefully follow the diet her doctor has given her.

"That extra weight places a severe strain on her legs," the scientist continued. "An added complication is that her extra weight exerts a pressure on the veins in the pelvic area which are returning the blood from the legs to the heart."

Weak Veins Break Down
The too-frequent result, according to Elson, is a breakdown of the circulatory system in the legs.

"Weak veins near the surface, where there is less support from muscle and tissue, tend to dilate; tiny valves within the veins, designed by nature to help the blood flow back to the heart, begin to break down — and the result is discolored, varicose veins. Such veins can never be restored to normal. The only sensible thing to do is to prevent their development in the first place," Elson said.

How is that done — how can a woman preserve the beauty of her legs in spite of pregnancy?

"Compression, through elastic or support stockings, is frequently the answer," the medical researcher says. "See your doctor, as early as possible in your pregnancy, and fol-

low his advice in all particulars. If you tell him you are worried about varicose veins — he will in all probability prescribe either support or elastic stockings, depending upon your age and general physical condition. The compression these stockings provide will give great support to leg veins throughout pregnancy — and afterward, when you are still carrying the baby — but then in your arms.

Elastic Twice as Strong
"And, if your doctor tells you to wear elastic stockings, follow his advice; don't second-guess him by wearing support stockings instead. Remember, elastic hosiery offers twice the compression that support stockings do; besides, modern ultra-sheer elastic hosiery now looks as much like ordinary hosiery as support stockings do."

"Finally," the scientist recommended, "if your doctor should prescribe support hosiery, because he knows it will give enough compression in your particular case, get several pairs immediately and wear a pair at all times. You can now buy support stockings which look exactly like regular stockings. Select those which assure correct support through patented, encircling fingers of spandex. It is important to wear the kind which is knitted to exact foot size and which gives greatest support where it is most needed — at the ankle."

These simple precautions, the scientist said, will go a long way towards preserving youthful leg beauty throughout pregnancy.
