Program Payments

according to Louie Kitchens, chairman of the Briscoe County ASC Committee.

The first payments were made beginning July 1, 1970. Additional payments will continue to be made as rapidly as farmers certify program requirements and as fast as individual farm records can be processed and checks returned to ASCS county offices for distribution to farmers.

I most doubled in the past 20 years, but farmers' markets take only about a third of this increase. This means we need new markets. Farm programs help us hold down farm income until new markets are developed and old ones expanded. Huge surpluses must be avoided. They are costly in tax dollars and are wasteful of food and fiber. "Because of the excellent co-operation of farmers, about 10% of the participating producers in Briscoe County will receive their

payments on or about July 7, 1970," Mr. Kitchens said.

Most payments should be completed by mid-August, if farmers who signed up will complete the necessary certification indicating that they have complied with all


