Scouting the Valley

One of the reasons I have become a confirmed small town girl was very much in evidence Tuesday of last week. People may say what they will about the advantages of living in a larger city, but, I for one, have become harder to convince each day I live in this community.

Do you suppose the average person in a sizeable city can even name nineteen acquaintances, much less close friends? Yet, in this town week before last that exact number of men banded together to contribute several hard hours of work to aid a family who has suffered much grief the past months.

These men granted this service not for any personal recognition, praise or even thanks, but out of the sheer goodness of their hearts, which is as true as it sounds, and seems to be the only way of explaining the abstract quality of kindness.

These men, working side by side on tractors plowing the land, did so to assist a family in doing something that needed to be done, just because they wanted to. This is the kind of thing that can be found only in a small town.

Do you think the family to whose aid these men came could ever worry themselves with whether this community had a shopping center, or a beautiful big park? I'm sure they are convinced that it is the people who really make a town, and that the so-called "advantages" are comparatively unimportant. There is a unity—a oneness of purpose—in a small town that cannot be found in a big city. The unity is built on interest in the problems, and delight in the success of each other. Just as readily as citizens of this community come to the aid of one of us who may need help, do they appear to celebrate the success of another.

This is evident in the many housewarmings and showers given to those who have built new homes and made additions to their families. In all the "ups and downs" encountered in routine living, people of a small town will find friends ready to cheer, assist, rejoice or just plain talk things over.

I have lived in large cities where one scarcely knows the person next door; where close friends can be numbered on the fingers of one hand; and where a newcomer must make all the overtures, no matter how anti-etiquette it may seem, in order to meet people and make new friends.

Of course, it is important to be progressive, far-sighted, and civic minded. It would be nice to have all the conveniences of a larger city. But it seems to me these things aren't absolutely necessary.

Just as a home is not made by fine furniture and china, a town is not made by skyscrapers and bright lights. A town is known by the people who support it.

If the progressiveness of this community eventually promotes its growth into a sizeable city—more power to it. The majority of its citizens will be those who have lived here when it was a small town, and who will continue to encourage that abstract kindness and thoughtfulness that thrive only in a small town.

If our community should remain as it is, who will be the worse for it? Certainly not those citizens who can unhesitatingly come to the aid of friends in distress.

They have proved a town does not need big buildings to make it a wonderful place—it only needs big people.

This is as true in 1994 as it was in 1960!

Fire Destroys Big Barn, Contents at Whiteflat

 Disaster hit at the ranch of Mr. and Mrs. Morris Stephens, northwest of Whiteflat, early Thursday morning, April 28, when a metal barn with an adjacent office building and grain beds was destroyed by fire.

The cause of the fire was determined to have started in the interior of the building by bolts of lightning. It was discovered around 4:30 a.m. when the huge structure was a blazing inferno and the countryside became bright as day.

The Stephens' telephone, electrical outlets and television in their home were also damaged by the lightning. They were unable to call for help until reaching Tim Shannon's home north of them. Their home did

not suffer fire damage, and they welcomed the one inch of rain that started falling.

Among the extensive loss within the barn were a pickup, tractor, air compressor, new generator for RV trailer, welding and electrical equipment, windmill parts, office supplies and records, alfalfa hay, cow cubes, riding lawn mower, new lumber, ropes, bridles, and saddles, including a treasured silver-mounted one that Mr. Stephens was awarded in rodeo competition.

The destruction has been estimated at over \$50,000 in addition to the building. They had no insurance coverage.

Producers Need To Prepare Reports

After signing up for the 1994 farm programs, producers should now prepare to report their crop acreage, according to Earlyne Hutsell, ASCS County Executive Director. Farmers have until May 15th to file acreage reports on their wheat, oats, barley, and other fall seeded crops. Small grains not reported by this deadline will be ineligible for program benefits.

To assist farmers with crop reporting, ASCS offers measurement service at cost and guarantees the measurements for the crop year. Acreage reports are used to determine program compliance and also for history purposes.

Cold Front Brings Rain

A cold front moving through the area and warm air collided last week, creating thunderstorms, lightning, and light hail. A good rain, ranging from 2 and 1/2 to 3 inches, was general in the area, helping to refill stock tanks and putting good moisture into the farmland and pastures.

Light showers fell again on Thursday and Friday nights, with light drizzle intermittent during the days. Saturday and Sunday were partly cloudy to fair and pleasant, with light showers again falling during the night Sunday, Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday morning. Total rainfall has amounted to near 4 inches in the area, and farmers and ranchers are smiling from ear to ear.



National Trails Day Stamp Cancellation

A pictorial cancellation for National Trails Day in Quitaque has been authorized by the Fort Worth District office of the United States Postal Service.

Quitaque artist Ernestine Payne prepared the artwork for the special commemorative cancellation to be used during the National Trails Day celebration on June 4. The cancellation depicts a steam locomotive leaving a tunnel and merging into a horse with rider, hiker, and bicyclist along a trail with a backdrop of canyons. "Caprock Canyons Station" of the Quitaque Post Office will have a booth in the Quitaque Community Center on June 4, where the pictorial cancellation may be obtained. Postal cards, stamps, and stamped envelopes will be available for cancellation.

Those who cannot attend the event, but who wish to obtain the cancellation, may submit a mail order request. Pictorial cancellations are available only for the date of the event and requests must be postmarked no later than 30 days following the requested pictorial cancellation date. All requests must include a stamped envelope or postcard bearing at least the minimum First-Class Mail postage (29 cents per envelope or 19 cents per postcard). Items submitted for cancellation may not include postage issued after the date of the requested cancellation. Such items will be returned unserved.

Customers wishing to obtain a cancellation should affix stamps to any envelope or postcard of choice, address the envelope or postcard to one's self or others, insert a card of postcard thickness in envelopes for sturdiness, and tuck in the flap. Place the envelope or postcard in a larger envelope and address it to: Pictorial Cancellations, Caprock Canyons Station, Postmaster, P. O. Box 9998, Quitaque, Texas 79255-9998.

After applying the pictorial cancellation, the Postal Service returns the envelope or postcard through the mail. Customers who want their serviced item returned under protected cover should include a larger, stamped, self-addressed envelope.

This will be the first time that Quitaque has ever had a special cancellation, and it will be nice to collect or to send to friends, relatives or former residents of the area. Graduating seniors may wish to take advantage of this one-time cancellation to send their thank-you notes for graduation gifts.

Notices of pictorial cancellations are published in a Postal Bulletin which is sent nation-wide, so National Trails Day in Quitaque Texas will receive more publicity all over the United States due to this event.

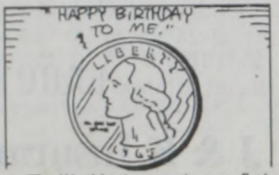
