Lady Patriots End Season With 20-Win Record

The Lady Patriots took on the third ranked Lady Swift, in a bi-district game played in the "Box" last Thursday night. With dreams of a major upset, the Lady Patriots scrapped and fought throughout the game but came up on the short end of a 57-31 score.

The Lady Swifts came out strong from the onset but could only manage a 15-9 first quarter lead against a scrappy Lady Patriot team. The second quarter found the Lady Patriots struggling from the field with Nazareth increasing its lead to 29-15 as they held the Lady Patriots to only 6 points. In the

third period, Nazareth showed its muscle inside with Peggy Huseman scoring 9 of Nazareth's 14 points as the Lady Swifts stretched their lead after 3 quarters to 43-22. The Lady Patriots fought on in the fourth quarter, but as time grew shorter, they had to foul the Lady Swifts to try and regain the ball. The Lady Swifts took advantage of their foul shots as they sank 8 points in the final quarter to seal the bi-district championship 57-31. The Lady Patriots were led by Katy Browning with 10 points. Coach Rapp said that the final score was not indicative of how hard the girls played

against Nazareth. With several shots just dripping off the edge of the rim, the Lady Patriots just couldn't mount a serious threat to the Lady Swifts.

Coach Rapp stated that he was extremely proud of the Lady Patriots and the loss could not dampen the success the Lady Patriots enjoyed this season as they won a second consecutive district championship, going undefeated in district play, and established a 20 win season as they finished with a 20-8 record. Coach Rapp said he would like to especially thank this years senior girls for their leadership. He said they would be sorely missed next season. Quitauque Fire Department Receives New Equipment

The Quitauque Volunteer Fire department recently strengthened their department's fire fighting capabilities with the acquisition of a truck, thanks in part to assistance from the Texas Forest Service and the Rural Community fire Protection (RCFP) program.

The Fire Department was able to stretch its funds by obtaining aid through the RCFP program, which is administered by the state forestry service. It obtained the federal excess property truck free of charge.

This truck, a 1977 Dodge 1 1/4 ton 4 wheel drive, will be equipped as an auxiliary unit designed for grass fires and

rural fire protection. Application has been made with the Texas Forest Service for fifty-percent cost-share aid for a slip-on compressed air foam system. This system has proven to be very beneficial as a water "extender" for rural fires.

Grass Burned At John Pigg's

The Quitauque Volunteer Fire Department was called to the John Pigg place around ten miles southwest of Quitauque last week because of a grass fire.

Cause of the fire is unknown. No damage was done to any buildings but about three acres of grassland was destroyed.

Albert Castillo, fire marshal, warns, "Grass is very dry at this time and easy to catch fire. Be cautious with all instruments of fire so as not to inadvertently start a blaze."

Ex-Quitauque Man Celebrates One Hundredth Birthday

On February 5, 1991 Mr. Z. V. Barker celebrated his 100th birthday in Sherman, Texas.

Mr. Barker will be remembered here as the first rural mail carrier. In 1925, Barker bought a farm northeast of Quitauque from Mr. Jim Preston who moved to Arkansas. This farm is now owned by Jake Merrell.

Before moving to Quitauque to farm, Barker was a bank president in Venus, Texas for 13 years. Barker carried the mail on a Quitauque route from 1930 until 1935 when he moved his family to Sadler, Texas. He continued to carry the mail there until 1961 when he retired.

Z.V. Barker married Elizabeth Melton of Allen, Texas in

1916 in Auburne, Alabama. she died in January of 1965. Five children were born to this union, Melton, Bartlesville, Oklahoma; Bruce, Quitauque; Jabus, Uitca, N.Y.; Perry, Napa Valley, California; and Mary Elizabeth New, Jackson, Tennessee.

Sid Bogan, long time Quitauque postmaster, and Z.V. were life long friends. Barker has maintained excellent health until recently, able to live alone and even care for his yard. Mr. Barker recently had a stay in the hospital but is now back home at 1000 South Vaden, Sherman, Texas 75090.

Everyday Living:

A Problem For The Blind

Everyday living: a problem for the blind by *Loretta Carlson of The TJC Connection*

Getting across the street is no problem to most people, but to Henry Bailey, a part time student on the Metro Campus, it is sometimes life threatening. Bailey has lost sight in both eyes, but still sees light. He can use his binoculars to see the "walk" sign, but some drivers don't seem to want to give up their right-of-way. Bailey thinks that either some people don't know that the white cane he carries signifies that he is blind, or they don't pay attention. He thinks some are rude, and said that he has been cussed by drivers who think he is in their way.

"Sometimes I can hear drivers accelerate their engines just before they turn," Bailey can recall many incidents of having cars try to turn on his light. He said he has felt the swish of vehicles that barely missed him.

One time when he was nearly run down, a lady got out of her Cadillac and cussed out the driver of a car that was barreling toward Bailey. "She saved my life. I was right in the middle of the street."

Crossing the street is not the only problem Bailey faces. For someone who cannot drive, bus transportation is vital, but getting to and from bus stops has given Bailey a lot of problems. While attending classes at the University of Tulsa, Bailey had to cross 11th street after getting off the bus. Frequently the light didn't work. Bailey finally decided to get some action so he called city hall. The

official he spoke to listened to Bailey's complaint, and then said that the purpose of traffic lights was to move traffic, not to help pedestrians, sighted or blind.

Bailey, who has been active in the movement to get better transportation for the disabled, has found that a person has five seconds to get across the street after the "walk" sign slashes on. To him, that is very little time.

When Bailey recalled the day his doctor told him he would become blind, he said that the news shocked and devastated him.

"I got in my car and started driving east, heading for Arkansas or Missouri," he said. "I didn't know where I was going. I didn't want to tell my wife."

Bailey, who had already lost the sight in one eye, finally asked himself, "What am I afraid of? I had a supportive wife and family. So I turned around and went home."

After a few years, Bailey had to give up his job at American Airlines because he could no longer see well enough to do inspections. He had acquired a real estate license and plans to use it had to be canceled. He also had to give up his hobby of flying light planes.

When his sight finally failed, Bailey lost contact with the world he had known. He no longer participated in the Shriners' and Masons' groups because he could not drive. He had been an elder in his church, but said, "I lost touch with a lot of activities I formerly had been involved with. I lost my voice, I couldn't participate."

All Bailey did was putter around

with his tools. "My wife was afraid I'd cut my fingers off using the skill saw," he said.

About that time he decided to go to school, so he enrolled at the University of Tulsa. In the beginning, Bailey struggled because he couldn't take notes. But persistence paid off and he became interested in anthropology and literature. He credits Dr. Manley Johnson, an English professor at TU with giving him a lot of encouragement.

Since then, Bailey has attended Tulsa Junior College and has taken creative writing courses from Suzan Jarvis, an English instructor on the Metro Campus. Learning to use a computer gave him more power to find his voice. He finally began to write about a character named Sonny Riley and found his voice again.

For several years he wrote about this character who lives a fictionalized version of Bailey's own childhood in West Texas. The book is titled *Nature's Nearest-The Children*. He finished that book last summer, and is now at work on a sequel.

Bailey is the brother of the late James F. Bailey of Quitaque.

Taxpayers Ask IRS

These are typical of questions asked by taxpayers and are presented as a public service of this publication and the IRS.

- Q. What qualifies a person to be claimed as a dependent on my tax return?
A. Five tests are used to determine dependency in order to claim an exemption on your tax return. They are: member of household or relationship test, citizenship test, joint return test, gross income test and support test. Each of these rules has its own criteria. If you have a question as to whether or not to claim a dependent, consult the instructions in your tax package.
- Q. Even though my dependent did not live with me the entire year, does he or she still qualify as a dependent on my tax return?
A. Yes, if he or she meets all of the tests mentioned above, he or she may still qualify as a dependent.
- Q. How much is each exemption for a dependent worth?
A. For tax year 1990, each exemption, including yourself, is \$2,050.
- Q. Is there any kind of income that is not taxable?
A. Yes. Some of the most common forms of nontaxable income include child support, life insurance proceeds, accident and health insurance proceeds, welfare benefits, worker's compensation and similar benefits for sickness and injury, gifts and inheritances, and, under certain conditions, gain on the sale of your home if you are 55 or older.

Q. Why is electronic filing faster than filing my return on paper?

A. When IRS receives your electronically filed return, many of the processing steps, such as sorting, batching and numbering of returns, as well as checking for math errors, are done by computers. This allows IRS to process your refund faster.

Taxpayers Ask IRS

Q. Does electronic filing mean IRS can audit my return faster?

A. No. Once your return is processed, it is treated the same as any other tax return for examination considerations.

Q. What do I do if I need more time to file?

A. You must apply for an extension of time to file using Form 4868, Application for Automatic Extension of Time To File U.S. Individual Income Tax Return. You must file Form 4868 by the regular due date of your return, and you must enclose payment of any tax you estimate you will owe. You will then be allowed four more months to file your return. You cannot file Form 1040EZ if you get an extension.

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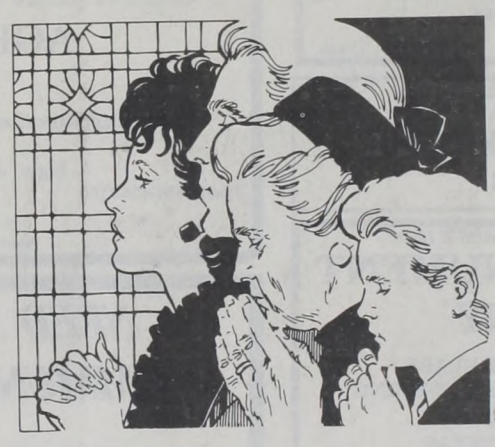
