

was to move traffic, not to help pedestrians, sighted or blind. Bailey, who has been active in the movement to get better transportation for the disabled, has found that a person has five seconds to get across the street after the "walk" sign slashes on. To him, that is very little time.

When Bailey recalled the day his doctor told him he would be-come blind, he said that the news shocked and devastated him.

"I got in my car and started driving east, heading for Arkansas or Missouri," he said. "I didn't know where I was going. I didn't want to tell my wife." Pailue uhe head elecadulet the

Bailey, who had already lost the sight in one eye, finally asked himself, "What am I afraid of? I had a supportive wife and family. So I turned around and wenthome.

After a few years, Bailey had to give up his job at American Air-lines because he could no longer see well enough to do inspections. He had acquired a real estate license and plans to use it had to be canceled. He also had to give up his hobby of flying light planes.

When his sight finally failed, Bailey lost contact with the world he had known. He no longer par-ticipated in the Shriners' and Masons' groups because he could not drive. He had been an elder in his church, but said, "I lost touch with a lot of activities I formerly had been involved with. I lost my voice, I couldn't participate." Unicare Health Facilities, All Bailey did was putter around

with his tools. "My wife was afraid I'd cut my fingers off using the skill saw," he said.

About that time he decided to go to school, so he enrolled at the University of Tulsa. In the begin-ning, Bailey struggled because he couldn't take notes. But persis-tence paid off and he became interested in anthropology and litera-ture. He credits Dr. Manley Johnson, an English professor at TU with giving him a lot of encour-

Since then, Bailey has attended Tulsa Junior College and has taken creative writing courses from Suzan Jarvis, an English instructor on the Metro Campus. Learning to use a computer gave him more power to find his voice. He finally began to write about a character named Sonny Riley and found his voice again.

Q. Why is electronic filing faster than filing my return on paper?

When IRS receives your electronically filed return, many of the processing steps, such as sort-ing, batching and numbering of returns, as well as checking for math errors, are done by com-puters. This allows IRS to process your refund faster.

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

#### Brunson Speaks To Eighth Grade

The Eighth Grade Reading Class at Valley School had an interesting and informative speaker visit on Thursday, February 14th. David Brunson, city administrator of Quitaque, spoke on the subject of Landfills in relation to disposal of trash and the effect on our community in the future. Topics such as recycling of paper, aluminum cans, and oil were discussed.

Since Americans generate a total of 625,000 tons of trash each day, Brunson challenged the students to begin thinking of ways to solve the problem of trash disposal in our own community.

Brunson said, "If 70 million American households bought a half-gallon container of milk a week instead of two quarts, they would reduce paper discards by 41.6 million pounds a year. If readers recycled the print run of one Sunday edition of "The New York Times", 75,000 trees would be left standing." The topic of Landfills was the

culmination of a unit the class had studied called "Helping Hands."

These youth used their "helping hands" to clean up trash around the Valley School to beautify the campus. The visit from Mr. Brun-son was enjoyed by Mrs. Chadwick's and Mrs. Cochran's classes. Thanks to David Brunson for

taking time from his busy schedule to be such a valuable community resource.


#### Nuevo Study Club


