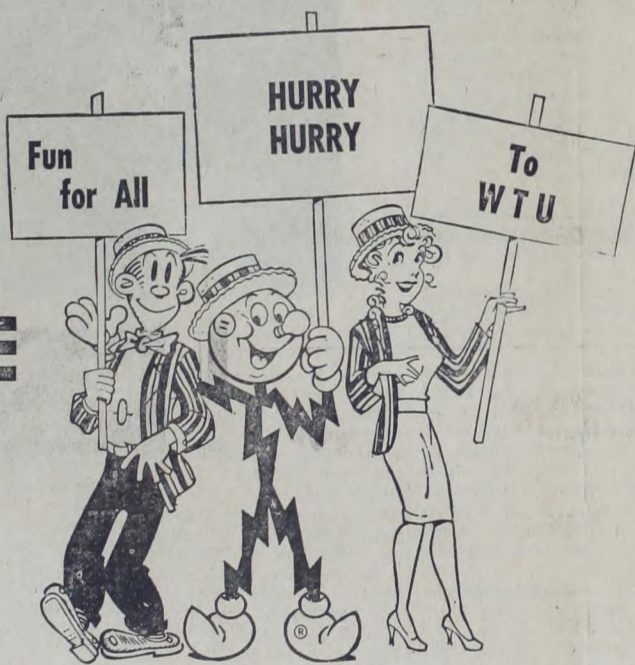

- 2 A lump or thickening in the breast or elsewhere
- 3 A sore that does not heal
- 4 Change in bowel or bladder habits
- 5 Hoarseness or cough
- 6 Indigestion or difficulty in swallowing
- 7 Change in a wart or mole

These signals do not usually mean cancer, but they are warnings; if one lasts more than two weeks, it is important to go to your doctor.
