Heavy Traffic During Holiday Season

The Christmas holidays are the most heavily travelled of holidays. Trooper L. B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety Cautions drivers, Whether driving around the block or across the state to use their best driving skills due to an increase of alcoholic drinks and the ever present possibility of wintry weather.'

Trooper Snider encourages drivers to make route decisions before traveling or while stopped for a break. "Please, do not fumble with maps while driving," emphasizes Snider. When traveling through unfamiliar towns be alert for all traffic signs. While driving, let your eyes scan the road ahead and all about for potential dangers. This will often give us the needed extra time to make a safe response. Snider advises, "While traveling, take frequent breaks. Ten to fifteen minute breaks work well for most people. If conditions permit, you may opt to get out of your vehicle, walk, stretch, have a cup of coffee or a soft drink for stimulation. If possible, change drivers.

Trooper Snider advises that last year Texas experienced 19 deaths during a 78 hour period. With a shorter time period this year of 48 hours, we are concerned that too many people will try to plan too much travel in the shorter time thus increasing the likelihood of a traffic mishap. Snider continued, "Of the 15 vehicle occupant deaths with safety belts available, only two (2) were using them and the two were in high impact collisions.

Remember, obey all traffic signs and laws, allow plenty of travel time, buckle up, be alert, and please, don't drink and drive.

New Information Needed For Drivers License

The Texas Department of Public Safety will require drivers to furnish their social security number in order to process their driver license application or renewal beginning January 1, 1997, the DPS announced to-

The Texas Transportation Code requires the DPS to collect the social security number of any person who applies for a driver license in this state. "The law has been in effect since 1993 and we have been collecting the number on a voluntary basis," said Jimmy Tillinghast, Driver License Captain, Lubbock. However, to be in compliance with state law, we will require this information after January

Tillinghast also stated that proper documentation of the number will be necessary. Ac ceptable documentation would include your social security card, payroll or employment records, income tax documents and certain identification cards where the social security number is used and proper identification can be made. Facsimiles and employer lists will not s Without proper documentation of the number, no license will be sued," Tillinghast said

While state and federal law allows for the use of social security numbers for driver licensing purposes, driver license personnel will not require the number of department issued
