Quail Comes To Valley Friday Night For The Big Shootout

District 4-B first half round robin leader Quail and second-place Valley who lost only one game the first go-round, that a three-point loss to Quail, square off for the second-half championship of District 4-B here at Valley Friday night in the top-rated game in the district among the boys in the race for district honors. Quail caught the two toughies at home the first go-round during which they won over the Patriots in a squeaker, then finally outlasted defending champion Hedley only after three overtimes. Valley won over Hedley at Hedley in the first district game of the season. Valley also catches Hedley here this time, and Quail must also go to Hedley this time, so the schedule would appear to favor the Patriots during the second half of play. However, Ron Eudy, one of the Patriot starting five, suffered a severe sprain of one of his ankles during workouts on Monday of last week and he has not been able to play since that time, although he has begun working out some and was suited up at Samnorwood Tuesday night. It is not known whether he will be able to play against Quail Friday night. Several of the younger members of the squad have been getting into action the past few games and will be of help when called upon. Another thing that is worrying everyone is the fact that Pepper Jones, one of the top scorers and rebounders for the Patriots, seems to have caught a bad case of "foulitis" the past several games. Pepper has fouled out of several of the close ones here of late and had to sit out the waning minutes of the game. Pepper is a real competitor and gives it his all and an aggressive, hustling player has to be very careful to keep from getting into foul trouble. Perhaps he will be able to shake off the bug for the shootout. One thing you can be sure of, Pepper will be giving his best effort.

The Patriots finally subdued a hustling bunch of youngsters at Samnorwood, 67-47, at Samnorwood Tuesday night. The Patriots were not at all impressive in the early going. The Patriots built up an 8-point lead in the first four minutes of the first period but saw it vanish to a 1-point 17-16 margin at the end of the first quarter. The young Eagles tied it at 20 and again at 22 early in the second quarter. Coach Bill Hulsey pulled his starters and sent in his freshman five and they extended the lead to five points, 34-29, at the half-way point.

Coach Hulsey gave his starting five another shot at it beginning the second half and they settled down and started to pull away and led 52-39 at the three-quarter mark. The Patriots shot themselves into a 65-41 lead and at that point the coach called off the starters and the reserves played it out from there.

Joey Barefield led the scorers with 23; Ernie Lucero hit 13; Pepper Jones 12. Brian Wheeler and Kenny Chandler 6 each; Danny Mayfield, 3 points; Jesse Ferguson and Dave Patrick, 2 each.

The Valley girls just about put the lid on the district championship Tuesday night, taking a 68-48 win over the Eaglettes. The

Eaglettes gave the Patriots a run for their money for a quarter and just a few minutes more. The first period saw the lead change hands a couple of times and Valley was ahead 13-12 at the first stop. In the first couple of minutes of the second quarter the score stayed close but with the Patriots leading 22-20, Valley hit an unbelievable hot streak and sparked by some deadeye outshooting by Joanie Turner, filling in for sister Janna who is injured, the Patriots ran the score to 36-20 before Norwood scored a free shot just before the halftime buzzer. The remainder of the game was a bit more even but the Patriots played fine basketball. These girls are getting better with every outing and if they play in the same manner as they did Tuesday night there could be some surprises down the way. Mitchie Lipscomb scored 30 points for the Valley girls, Sherice Price hit 20 and Joanie Turner turned in a fine performance as she scored 18 points.

Tuesday night of next week the Valley teams will play Lakeview in a pair of district games beginning at 7 o'clock and Friday night of next week the varsity teams will go to Estelline for the next-to-last regular season games.

Last weekend the Valley girls were entered in the Tournament of Champions at Mangum, Oklahoma. The Valley girls, the only Class B team playing in the tournament, won one game and lost two. In the first game the Patriots lost to the Mangum girls, 42-50. In the second round of action the Patriots won over Walters 49-47 in a good game and in the third game the Patriots lost to Hollis 32-44.

In the first game, against Mangum, Janna Turner, a Valley senior, injured her knee that has been injured several times before, and it has ended her high school basketball career. Janna has earned four letters in basketball playing for Valley and has scored a lot of points in the process, especially foul shooting. We wish we knew what her free shooting percentage is for the four years. This reporter remembers one free throw in particular during her career. It happened during her freshman year when Valley was playing in Class A. This particular game was the first playoff game between the Patriots and Claude for the District Championship and was played at Silverton. As rememember, it was near half-time and a technical foul had been called on Claude. Janna was not in the game at the time but the coach called in Janna to shoot the technical foul shot (she was a freshman) and Janna very calmly walked to the line and popped the net for one point. Now it turned out that Valley won by a single point and this reporter has always said that that was the shot that won the war. It always hurts to see a youngster hurt, all the more so when his or her career is almost over and has to sit out the remaining few games.

It would be taught two nights a week, probably from 7:00 until 10:00 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays, for fourteen weeks beginning in March. While the course is expensive, funding is to be provided for all of the firemen and ambulance service personnel, including books which each individual will retain at the completion of the course. The cost for those other than firemen and ambulance service personnel will be \$88.17.

Roy Rogers' New Movie Premieres Here February 6-11

For many years, Saturday afternoon and evening meant attending a movie and that was most surely a cowboy movie. During the 1940's and 1950's, a cowboy movie nearly always meant a singing cowboy with a funny sidekick. The king of them all at that time was Roy Rogers and his sidekick Gaby Hayes, with the pretty Dale Evans as icing on the cake. Besides being a lovely lady she could also sing and before too long she became Mrs. Roy Rogers in real life. Roy and Dale and Gaby, plus Trigger, proved to be an unbeatable combination for several years. Roy made his 89th movie in 1954 and although he had been offered many other chances to make another film he had turned them down.

Rogers finally agreed to do his 90th film finally, "Mackintosh and T. J.," which was filmed in the Matador-Dickens-Guthrie area.

When questioned by the press last summer as to why he had not been making any films for the past 20 years, he replied that "Some of the movies they make today — heck, I wouldn't take Trigger to see them."

The world premiere for the film will be held in Lubbock on February 5. On the next day, February 6, "Mackintosh and T. J." will open at the Midway Theatre, Quitaque-Turkey, and will run through February 11.

People will wonder just what kind of a movie "Mackintosh and T. J." will be and if he will follow the trend of most of today's movies. The story will go something like this:

Rogers is a cowhand in today's world, an oldtimer, an obviously self-sufficient drifter, who moves with a great deal of pride and self-confidence. Instead of riding the range atop the sleek, prancing Trigger, he now rides in a blue pickup. Instead of the likeable Gaby Hayes for a sidekick, he now has a likeable 14-year-old sidekick, T. J., played by Clay O'Brien. Instead of that musical comedy costume he now wears battered blue jeans. And instead of pulling out his guitar and singing as we go into a bar, there is a jukebox playing Willie Nelson and David Allen Coe Records, with a song soundtrack with the voice of Waylon Jennings. As a matter of fact, Rogers never sings a note in the film.

Area fans will surely want to see this film for they are likely to spot a friend or neighbor somewhere in the film for there are a number of local area people used in the film, including Ronnie Christian, Bennie Brown, Pat Seigler, Dorothy Webb, Nell Brotherton, Mr. and Mrs. Bob Stanley, Charlie Johnson and others.

ACCEPTING CHRIST'S CALL
WHAT'S WRONG? The king was so anxious to have his banquet hall filled! (Matt. 22) The invited guests scorned his invitation, so he sent out into the streets and invited everyone to come. But when he comes to greet his guests and sees one man without a wedding garment he throws him out. Why?
The man had no excuse. He had been given a wedding garment along with the other guests. It was the custom. The host always provided festive robes for such occasions. Behold a man who accepted the king's invitation but refused to wear the robe of the occasion! Ungrateful, discourteous, rebellious! No wonder he was thrown out!
There are two ways of despising our Lord's invitation: (1) Simply refuse it. (2) Accept it but treat it so lightly that you insult him more than if you had refused it.
The feast is God's grace; wearing the wedding garment is our response to that grace. Salvation is free and offered to all. But woe to me if I let that be an excuse for treating it lightly!
I will not despise God's gift! I will put on the robe of a new life in Christ and wear it to his glory!
