Jesse K. Guest Buried At Paris

Jesse K. Guest of 590 Laurel Lane in Paris, president of Guest Paper Company in Paris, died at 10:54 p.m. Tuesday, March 16 at McCuiston Regional Medical Center in Paris.

Funeral services were held at 2 p.m. Thursday, March 18 at Fry & Gibbs Funeral Home Chapel with Dr. James Semple, pastor of First Baptist Church, officiating. Interment was in Evergreen Cemetery.

Active in civic affairs in Paris, Mr. Guest was serving on the boards of the Boys' Club of Paris, the Paris Bank of Texas and St. Joseph's Hospital at the time of his death.

He served two years as president of the Lamar County Chamber of Commerce and two years as president of the Paris Independent School District Board of Trustees. He served in numerous capacities on the Lamar County Unit Fund, including president, and had been president of the Paris Golf and Country Club and of the Southwest Paper Merchants Association. He had been active in Boy Scout work here.

He was named Optimist "Man of the Year" in 1964.

Mr. Guest was a member of the Paris Masonic Lodge, the Hella Temple Shrine and the Scottish Rite. He was a member of First Baptist Church and its Adult Sunday School class. He is a former member of the Paris Kiwanis and Rotary Clubs.

Saturday, April 3, is election day for Quitaque and Turkey to elect city officials for the two towns and also to elect two school trustees for the Turkey-Quitaque Consolidated School District.

TURKEY ELECTION

In Turkey the voters will vote to elect a new mayor to replace Leroy Stone, who is not a candidate this term, and to elect a Street Commissioner.

Voters will have three candidates on the ballot from which to select a new mayor. Those whose names are on the ballot as candidates for mayor are (in the order they appear on the ballot) Jay Eudy, Preston Jouett and B. D. Williams.

For Street Commissioner, David Guest is the only name on the ballot for that office.

QUITAQUE CITY ELECTION

Quitaque will elect a mayor and two Aldermen.

Jake Merrell, current mayor of Quitaque, is again on the ballot as a candidate and he is unopposed for that office. For the alderman posts, the terms of Joe Bedwell and A. B. Ramsey are expiring and they are again candidates for alderman and they are also unopposed.

SCHOOL TRUSTEE ELECTION

The Valley School Trustee elections are drawing more interest than the city elections. Two places on the Board of Trustees are being vacated this time and there are six names, three from Quitaque and three from Turkey, on the ballot as candidates for a spot on the Board of Trustees. These are very important jobs, and although they are thankless positions and at times the trustees are hassled pretty good, most everyone will serve when called upon by residents of the district. By the same token all residents of a school district should go to the polls and vote for the person that you feel is best qualified to take care of the business of the school district, for that is a concern that belongs to all of us.

Names were drawn for the position they have on the ballot. The candidates and the order in which they will appear on the ballots are: Jim Saul, Joe Edd Smith, Murry Wayne Morrison, Billy Joe Pinkerton, Doyle Proctor and David Settiff.

Turkey voters will go to the City Offices in the Bob Wills Memorial Center to vote in both City and School elections.

In Quitaque the voting will also be done at the City Hall for both City and School elections.

Every qualified voter is urged to go and vote Saturday.

Officers, Directors Elected for West Texas Utilities Co.

At the Annual Stockholders Meeting of West Texas Utilities Company, held at 11 a.m. Tuesday in the General Office in Abilene, directors were elected for the coming year.

Holman King was elected to the Board of Directors, filling the vacancy created by the retirement of John A. Hutchison, director, vice president and chief engineer, under the Company's mandatory retirement plan.

Members of the Board re-elected for the coming year were: Robert

H. Alvis, Durwood Chalker, Glen D. Churchill, Ralph N. Hooks, J. C. Hunter, Jr., R. E. Kennedy, C. R. Kinard, all of Abilene; W. K. Ramsey of San Angelo and Armistead D. Rust of Menard.

Immediately following the Stockholders Meeting, a meeting of the Board of Directors was held. At the Board meeting, R. E. (Bob) Kennedy, chairman and chief executive officer of West Texas Utilities Company was elected chairman of the Board and Durwood Chalker, president, was elected president and chief executive officer. Kennedy relinquished his responsibilities as chief executive officer because of two recent heart attacks.

Other changes in top management positions were approved at the Board meeting. Glen Churchill, formerly vice

president and treasurer, was re-elected vice president. He will have supervisory responsibility for the Accounting, Employee Affairs and Treasury Departments.

William P. Sayles, executive assistant and manager of the Area Development Department, was elected vice president and will be responsible for district operations.

Jerry Johnson, who was recently promoted to vice president, was elected vice president and assistant treasurer.

David R. Webb, controller and assistant treasurer, was elected treasurer and assistant secretary, and Glenn D. Rosilier, formerly assistant controller, was elected controller.

L. Verne Grace, assistant secretary, was elected assistant secretary and assistant treasurer, and Ann Hawk, secretary to R. E. Kennedy, was elected assistant secretary.

Otey H. Cannon was re-elected secretary and assistant treasurer.

Kennedy, a native Abilenian, came to work for WTU in 1934 as an employee in the Treasury Department. Beginning in 1947 he served for many years as advertising manager and in 1956 was promoted to manager of the Public Service Department. In 1961 he was elected vice president and supervised the Marketing Division and was elected a director in 1965. He was elected chairman and chief executive officer in October, 1974, effective January 1, 1975.

One of Abilene's civic leaders, Kennedy received an honorary degree, doctor of laws, from his alma mater, Hardin-Simmons University in Abilene in 1975. He has worked in many capacities with the West Texas Rehabilitation Center, the Abilene Chamber of Commerce, Abilene Industrial Foundation, the YWCA, Abilene United Way, the Abilene Library Board, the Parks and Recreation Board and the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. He was the first recipient of the Texas Easter Seal Society "Outstanding Volunteer" award.

He is a Lay Reader and a member of the Vestry at the Heavenly Rest Episcopal Church and has served in many business and professional organizations, including the Texas Manufacturers Association, the Texas Research League, and he is a past director and past president of the Texas Public Relations Association.

Mrs. Kennedy is the former Mrs. Jack Wheeler of Abilene. They were married in 1975 and live at 1190 Glenwood Drive, Abilene. Kennedy has one daughter, Mrs. Steve Delk of Camden, South Carolina.

Chalker was employed by the Company in 1950 as a junior engineer in the Transmission Department. He also worked on substation maintenance construction and design until October of that year when he was recalled to active duty in the U. S. Navy.

Following his discharge after the Korean War, Chalker returned to WTU's Transmission Department and two years later was transferred to the Abilene Distribution Department. In 1955 he moved to San Angelo as district distribution superintendent. He returned to Abilene in 1960 when he was promoted to assistant chief

engineer.

In 1967 Chalker was named executive assistant reporting to the president, and was elected a vice president for district operations in 1968, and in 1969 he was elected a director. He was elected WTU president in October, 1974, effective January 1, 1975.

He is now serving on the boards of Hendrick Memorial Hospital, West Texas Rehabilitation Center, Abilene Chamber of Commerce, YMCA and the Chisholm Trail Council, Boy Scouts of America.

He is a past president of the Abilene Exchange Club, past chairman of the Abilene Goodfellows and has served in various posts of the Abilene United Way.

Chalker is a senior member of the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers and is a member of both national and state organizations for engineers. He has served as president and director of the Abilene Chapter of the Texas Society for Professional Engineers.

Chalker and his wife, the former Vada Ray McAdams, live at 777 Elmwood in Abilene and have three sons. They are members of the First Baptist Church.

King is a native of Abilene. He joined WTU as an engineer in the Transmission Department after working several years for Allis-Chalmers as a graduate engineer trainee and application engineer. He was soon transferred to the Substation Department, and after two years returned to the Transmission Department. He was promoted to assistant transmission engineer in 1966, and a year later was named planning engineer in the Company's Engineering Division.

He was promoted to executive assistant in 1970, and in 1971 was made supervisor of both the Purchasing and Stores Department and the Rate and Contract Department. He was elected vice president in 1974.

King has held many civic responsibilities. He is a past president of the Key City Kiwanis Club, the West Texas Girl Scout Council, and the Abilene Philharmonic Association. He holds membership in various professional organizations, including the Texas Society of Professional Engineers. He is a past president of the Abilene Chapter of this organization. He was named Outstanding Young Engineer in 1966.

Mrs. King is the former Janie Evans of Brownwood. The Kings have three daughters and live at 40 Cobblestone Drive. They are members of St. Paul United Methodist Church.

Churchill's career with WTU began in 1964 when he was employed as an assistant to the controller. A certified public accountant, he was promoted to assistant controller in 1965 and was elected controller a year later. He was elected a director in 1972, and that same year was elected vice president and treasurer.

He graduated from Texas A&M University in 1956 with a BBA degree in accounting. He then worked for Arthur Andersen & Company in Houston until he joined WTU in 1964.

Churchill has been an active civic and church worker. He has served the United Way of Abilene in various posts for several years. He has served as president of the Abilene Chapter of CPA's, and on various committees in the Texas Society of CPA's. He is currently a member of the Board of Directors of West Texas Rehabilitation Center and serves as recording secretary.

Mrs. Churchill is the former Joy Hugo of Centralia, Illinois. They have three children and are members of Our Saviour Lutheran Church.

Sayles began working for WTU in 1955 as an industrial and community development representative. He was appointed the legislative representative for the Company in 1961, and in 1964 was promoted to manager of the Area Development Department. In September of 1975 he was named executive assistant, assisting with the supervision of district operations.

A native of Taylor County, he grew up in the Tuscola area. He graduated from Tuscola High School in 1942 and received a Bachelor of Science degree from Texas A&M in 1947.

Sayles married the former Gwendolyn Grisham of Abilene. They have two children and attended the Heavenly Rest Episcopal Church. He is a member of the Texas Industrial Council.

Legendary Cowboys Exploits Recalled By Daughter

J. Henry achieved legendary fame as a cowboy on the Lazy F Ranch which headquartered on Quitaque Creek located six miles south of where the town of Quitaque later was built. His daughter, Mrs. Jane Blair, lives in the old headquarters house which at one time also served as a stage coach stop.

"Dad came here in 1882 when this place was still owned by Mrs. John Adair, and when Charles Goodnight was ranch supervisor. The F's joined the JA's then. They were really one large ranch," Mrs. Blair explains. "My father

died in 1945," she adds. Mrs. Adair's foreman was looking for cowhands when he found J. Henry working in Fort Worth stock yards. The cowboys had come to Texas from Kentucky and had been working on a ranch herding the remuda. He was 16 years old when he came to the F's.

"He came by train to Wichita Falls then on the foreman's freight wagon to here. He was an ordinary cowboy at first, then became the windmill repair man for all the windmills on the Lazy F," she further states.

J. Henry's full name was J. Henry Hughes. Few people knew that. Everybody called him J. Henry.

"He had a span of little mules and a buckboard where he carried all his windmill tools, bedding and food. He never failed to take his horse along hitched beside the mules.

J. Henry trained those little mules to work. They pulled pipe, held pipe - "stopping, holding, backing." The working mules made it possible for one man to do the work on the windmills without the help of another man.

"When the windmill work meant that Dad had to camp, he made headquarters cook pack dried fruit for him to take along to make fried pies. Other cowboys made it a practice to stop by Dad's camp just for fried pies," his daughter remembers.

He always helped with round-ups, but if someone came in reporting a windmill out of order, he left to work on it.

"A story I heard him tell many times was the one of 1900 when L. R. Moore was to give possession of the Lazy F to Mr. Howard from New Orleans. They were making the final roundup to gather the cattle and horses, and had the cattle gathered and were holding them east of Turkey, working west across the ranch. A storm came up at night, Dad said, with thunder, lightning and hail. The cattle stampeded, of course, as in all such times. The men tried to stop them; however, the herd got into the breaks east of Turkey and went into the canyon. The cattle were stacked and killed and so were some of the men. "He had a span of little mules and a buckboard where he carried all his windmill tools, bedding and food. He never failed to take his horse along hitched beside the mules.

J. Henry trained those little mules to work. They pulled pipe, held pipe - "stopping, holding, backing." The working mules made it possible for one man to do the work on the windmills without the help of another man.

"When the windmill work meant that Dad had to camp, he made headquarters cook pack dried fruit for him to take along to make fried pies. Other cowboys made it a practice to stop by Dad's camp just for fried pies," his daughter remembers.

He always helped with round-ups, but if someone came in reporting a windmill out of order, he left to work on it.

"A story I heard him tell many times was the one of 1900 when L. R. Moore was to give possession of the Lazy F to Mr. Howard from New Orleans. They were making the final roundup to gather the cattle and horses, and had the cattle gathered and were holding them east of Turkey, working west across the ranch. A storm came up at night, Dad said, with thunder, lightning and hail. The cattle stampeded, of course, as in all such times. The men tried to stop them; however, the herd got into the breaks east of Turkey and went into the canyon. The cattle were stacked and killed and so were some of the men. Lake Mackenzie To Open May 1

Mackenzie Lake, located in Tule Canyon about nine miles northwest of Silverton in Briscoe County, will be opened to the public May 1 for fishing, camping, hiking and picnicking, according to Rod Hill of Tula, member of the Mackenzie Water Authority Board and publicity chairman for the opening.

"No boating will be allowed yet," Hill said, "because the water in the lake is not up to the boat ramp."

The Authority will provide some camping facilities and hook-ups for travel trailers. A few tables and canopies for picnicking and toilets will be available. No swimming facilities are provided.

Since the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department started stocking fish in the lake about a year and a half ago, 180,000 fish have been stocked, including rainbow and brown trout, black bass, channel and blue catfish, and crappie. Perch, sunfish and black bass are native to Tule Creek.

A fee for entering the lake grounds will be charged at the one entrance to the municipal water project. Hill said the fee had not been determined but probably will be \$1.00 per person. The money will be used for upkeep and future development of the recreational area.

Hill said the Water Authority Board will be extremely busy between now and opening date in order to get everything ready. "People have been wanting to get in for a long time," he stated. "We would like to have more water there, but decided we might as well go ahead and let people fish and if necessary we can restock." The water is 42 feet deep at the dam, Hill added.

Board members so far have made no definite plans for the opening day, but may have such events as tag fishing.

Lots at the lakeside are not yet ready for purchase. Carl E. Williams of Hale Center, Hale County Surveyor, was hired to survey lots south of the dam, but after the survey, the soil was found to be unsuitable for septic tanks, and therefore for cabins. Hill stated lots would now have to be surveyed north of the dam where the soil is suitable.

Jim Green, manager of Lake Mackenzie, his wife and two children moved the latter part of February into the new home built for them at the facility. The three-bedroom brick residence is connected by a breezeway to the office for Green and his assistant, Gary Martin, Silverton native. The house is located about 300 yards northwest of the gate entrance.

Although the \$2,600,000 project in its picturesque natural setting is expected someday to be a prime recreation area, it was built primarily to provide municipal water for Floydada, Lockney, Silverton and Tula.

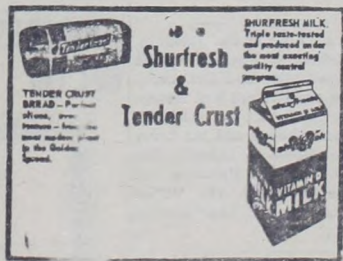
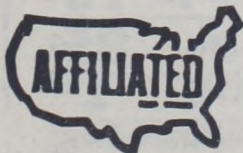
