Cemetery Dues For Upkeep Needed Badly


The Quitaque Cemetery dues cards have been sent out by the Cemetery Association. Dues can be paid at the First National Bank or to Johnnie Morrison.

Historic Texas Forts

since the 17th century when the beth Street, near the International Spanish first built them as protection Bridge. Brownsville Chamber of against Indian attacks. Later, forts Commerce; 512/546-3721. were used by the French, the Mexi-cans, the Republic of Texas, the Confederacy, the United States and several private citizens on the frontier who wanted to protect their

property from raiding Indians. Below are just some of the forts that are intact and open to the public. **Fort Bliss** - Established opposite El Paso del Norte (Juarez) in 1848, this fort guarded lands gained from Mexico and fended off Indian attacks. Troops were removed in 1851, but returned in 1853 after 23 Indian raids. From here, soldiers fought Apache Chief Geronimo. Two remaining adobe structures, privately

owned, are national historic places. From the current site, Gen. John Pershing's troops chased Pancho Villa into Mexico. A replica on post of the original adobe fort is a frontier military museum, open daily from 9 a.m to 4:30 p.m. Located five miles northeast of El Paso off U.S. Hwy 54, on Pershing Drive. Free admis

Fort Brown - Zachary Taylor and U.S. troops held Texas' boundary at the Rio Grande during the Mexican War, but a permanent post was not built until 1848. When troops were removed, the notorious Juan Cortinas occupied the fort in 1859 and took over Brownsville. U.S. troops returned and skirmished with Corti-nas through the 1870s. The work of William C. Gorgas, later U.S. Army Surgeon General, during a yellow fever epidemic in 1882 led to control of the disease. Texas Southmost College now occupies the fort's pic-turesque brick buildings. Located in

Forts in Texas have been common Brownsville at the south end of Eliza-

Fort Concho - Established in 1867

at the iunction of the south and main Concho rivers, Fort Concho's troops guarded stagecoaches, wagon trains and the U.S. mail. The City of San Angelo now owns the fort and calls it the largest restored Indian Wars fort in the nation with the most original structures. Twenty original and three reconstructed buildings staffed by docents are open Mondays-Fridays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Located in downtown San Angelo at Oakes and Avenue D. 915/657-4441.

Cancer Service To Offer HOPELINE

Cancer patients and their families now have a new resource

that is only a phone call away. From 8:30 a.m.4 p.m., Monday through Friday, the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center in Amarillo will offer HOPELINE, a toll-free telephone information service. By dialing 1-800-274-HOPE, callers will access the service which links residents of the Texas Panhandle and surrounding states with information and resources on cancer care.

After 4 p.m., an answering machine will record caller in-quiries during other hours.

Kelly Hilton, cancer in-formation specialist, will direct HOPELINE and answer most of

the inquiries personally. Hilton said the HOPELINE awill also answer questions about advances in cancer treatment, research updates, cancer pre-vention and early detection. The service is tied to national information sources.

Literature from the National Cancer Institute and the American Cancer Society is provided free of charge. The focus of HOPELINE vever, is on resources available locally

"The HOPELINE will bring a greater awareness of where cancer information is available. So many times cancer patients don't know where to go for help, especially if they have just been diagnosed," said Hilton, cancer information specialist.

'Above and beyond information, the HOPELINE also provides resources in the local and outlying areas for a number of needs the cancer patient or family may have.'

Hilton has spent months Filton has spent months gathering resource information locally and throughout the the region which may assist cancer patients and their families. Any organization or group which has not been contacted, but has services available, is urged to contact Hilton at the HOPELINE.

"The real strength of HOPELINE is support from staff and physicians at the Cancer Center. Because the staff is involved, callers get the most current information," said Hilton.

Cooking Corner Ton To Help You

- 4 slices (3-1/2 x 3-1/2 x 1/8-inches) Swiss cheese
 - 1/4 cup unsalted butter, melted

1/4 cup unsaited butter, melted Place 2 ham slices on cutting board. Spread one side of each with mustard. Top each ham slice with 2 slices cheese, cutting to fit. Spread one side of remaining 2 ham slices with mustard; place mustard side down on top of cheese-covered slices. Cut each stack in half; cut into 3/4 inch wide strips. Cover and chill several hours or overnight. Combine cracker crumbs, parsley and nutmeg in shallow dish. Beat eggs in second shallow dish. Dip each ham stack into flour, then into egg, then into crumb mixture to coat completely. Transfer to lightly greased baking sheet. Cover and refrigerate until ready to bake. Drizzle with butter. Bake at 425% for 10 to 12 minutes or until golden brown. Drain briefly on paper towels. Serve hot with additional mustard for dipping. Makes 30 appetizers/snacks.
