## Counseling Available For Farmers In Crisis

Federal help is now available through the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service to provide financial counseling services to Texas Panhandle farmers who face financial distress, U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm announced today.

Through an \$84,000 grant from ACTION, which administers and coordinates the domestic volunteer programs sponsored by the Federal Government, Texas A&M will provide at least one trained counselor each to 41 Texas Panhandle counties on a full-time basis.

In addition, a toll-free telephone number will also be established that will be manned by professional counselors. The counselors will be trained in financial planning.

## CSWC Board To Elect Director October 15

An election for a director to serve in Zone 3 on the Caprock Soil and Water Conservation Board is scheduled for Thursday, October 15 at the Briscoe Coop Gin Office announced C. L. Sutton, chairman of the board. The election will be held at 8:30 a.m.

State law decrees that to be eligible to vote in a soil and water conservation district director's election, a person must own agricultural land within the district where the election is being held. The person must also live in a county all or any part of which is in the district and the voter must be 18 years old.

Legal qualifications state that a candidate for the office of a soil and water conservation district director must own land in the zone he represents, be 18 years of age and be actively engaged in farming or ranching. He must also live in a county all or part of which is in the district. Soil and water conservation district directors serve four-year terms of office.

Zone 3 of the district includes an area from Silvertown south of Highway 86 (Tulia highway) and west of FM 207 (Floydada highway).

Current members of the board of directors of the Caprock SWCD are C.L. Sutton, Chairman; Walter Henson, Vice Chairman; Jarus Flowers; and Robert McPherson.

The purpose of the Caprock SWCD, with headquarters in Briscoe county is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on farm and ranch lands within the district and to serve as a voice for farmers and

ranchers on conservation matters and other issues affecting private property rights of landowner.

The district board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has

authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator.

Mr. West has been an attorney in Lubbock, Texas since 1969. He graduated from Baylor Law School in 1969 and attended Texas Tech University prior to Baylor.

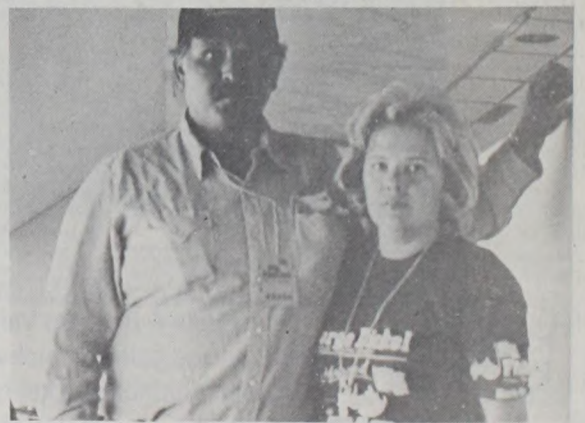

**As American as Apple Pie, 4-H Helps Youth, Adults**

4-H is as American as baseball or apple pie or the U. S. Constitution.

The week of October 4-10 is being celebrated throughout the nation as National 4-H Week. The almost eighty-year-old 4-H organization has some 4.5 million youth between the ages of 9 and 19 years of age, more than 305,000 are Texas 4-H'ers.

4-H is a youth development program and a people development program which depends on volunteers to provide leadership to the projects and activities conducted as learning experiences for youth. There are almost 620,000 4-H volunteers nationwide, and over 30,000 volunteers support the Texas 4-H program. Some 40 local adults provided leadership to 4-H in Briscoe County during the past year.

Began in 1908, primarily as a rural youth program, 4-H has since spread to urban areas. In Texas, about 66 percent of the 4-H youth now come from urban and suburban areas. Much of their

involvement is through 4-H curriculum enrichment projects conducted through the schools.

Young people are helped by 4-H to develop skills that will be useful in the real world. It helps them discover their strengths and weaknesses. 4-H'ers learn and have fun while doing it. In most cases, the more that families are involved in 4-H with their

child, the greater the benefit to the child and the family. Briscoe County has a strong 4-H program with continual growth and involvement in projects, activities, contests, leadership, and community service.

The volunteer leaders and parents who support the 4-H'ers and the Extension agents are to be commended for a job well done.

**OPEN LETTER TO THE TAXPAYERS OF THE CITY OF QUITAQUE**

This letter is written on behalf of the Quitaque City Council to address the issue of the tax rate increase adopted by the council and the petition being circulated to call for a rollback election. The City must have \$37,493.01 to fund the budget that has been approved by the city council. There are two ways for the city to raise rates charged for services. The following chart compares the effect the two methods would have on tax payers.

Column A shows the value of real and personal property. Column B shows what will happen if the rollback election passes. (\$18 tax rate plus \$10.00 per month service fee increase) Column C shows the amount due using the \$.43 tax rate adopted by the council.

This chart shows that if a rollback election is called and passes a taxpayer that owns a \$5,000.00 house will pay the same increase (\$120.00) each year as taxpayer that owns \$1,000,000.00 worth of property. The city council did not feel that this was a fair way to raise revenue for the city. It is the hope of the city council that this article explains the reasoning used while adopting this tax rate. Any questions concerning this issue will be welcomed and can be answered by the Mayor, any council member, or the city secretary.

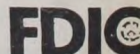

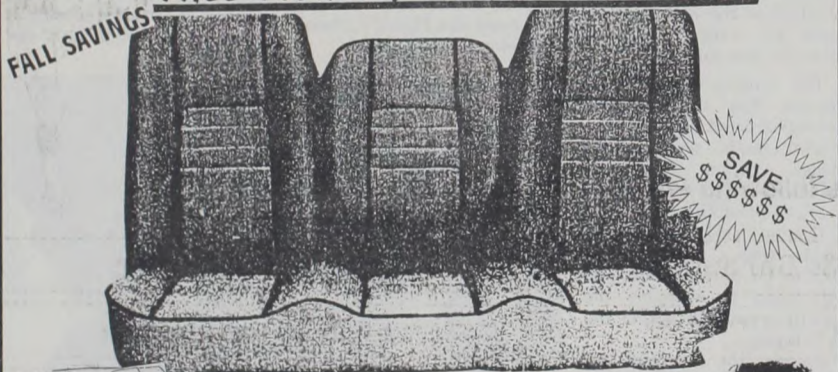

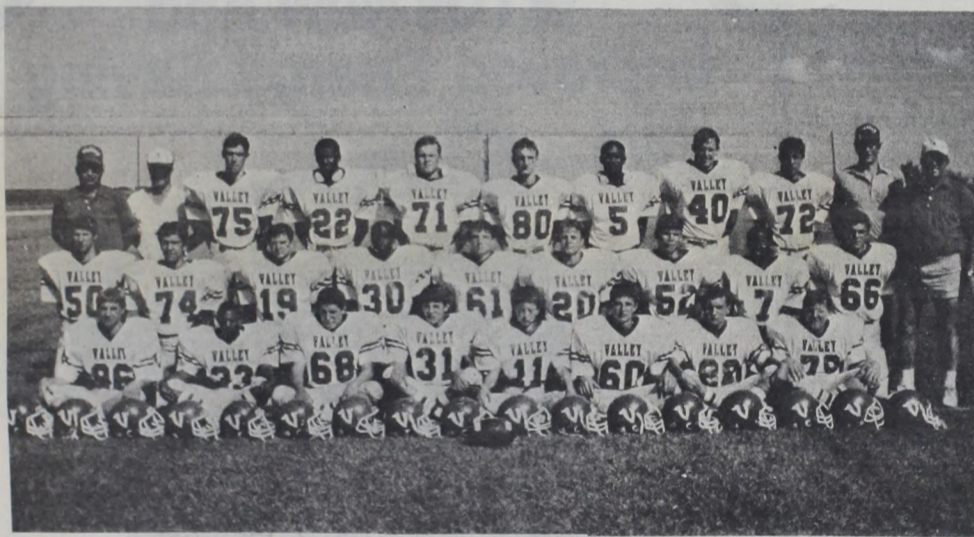

Jan Merrell will present a demonstration next Tuesday on "Making Picture Frames" when the organization meets at noon at the Methodist Church.

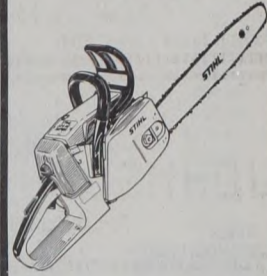

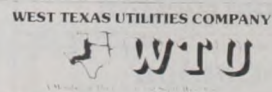
