Medicare Doctors/Suppliers List Now Available To Area Elderly

Each medicare carrier publishes a Physician /Supcarrier Assignment Rate List for the area it serves. All Social Security offices in the carrier's service area receive a copy of the list for people to use as a reference source.

Medicare carriers are the insurance organizations selected by the Government to claims under the medical insurance part of

The list shows the name, address, and assignment rate of each doctor and supplier in the preceding calendar year. Names are listed in alphabetical order. The assignment rate is shown in a range of 10 percentage points -that is, 0-10 percent, 11-20 percent, 91-100 percent. If a doctor practices as part of a group, the

But, people should keep in mind that just because a doctor accepted assignment on a certain percentage of claims last year does not mean he or she will accept assignment on their claims. Doctors choose whether to

accept assignment on a case rate are shown.

A person can come into the Social Security office and look at the list to find out which doctors accepted assign-In general, hospital-based docaccept assignment of medical insurance claims.

Farmers To Keep Tax Formerly Charged on Animal Feed

Austin, Tex. - - State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that sales tax will no longer be charged on feed normally eaten by farm and ranch and ranch animals that is also used to feed Texas game animals.

'It doesn't make sense to tax feed that farmers and ranchers

use to support the native wildlife population when other farm animals get to eat the same stuff tax-free," Bullock said. Bullock said removal of the

sales tax on hay, corn, oats and other feeds that can be eaten by

animals will promote progressive wildlife and conservation prac-

According to Bullock, Texas

farmers and ranchers who lease hunting acreage will benefit by able to provide supple l feed during drough feed conditions or when animal habi-

tats have been reduced. Land owners will find it easier to buy feed under the proposed rule, since they will no longer have to declare the type and location of the animal eating the

'We've had some confusing situations because of the current rule - - for example, corn bought to feed deer is taxable, but corn bought to feed cows isn't,"Bullock

Feed for domestic farm animals and work animals will remain exempt from the state sales tax, but feed bought for pets such as cats and dogs is still taxable, he added.


