Dimmitt Man Drowns At Lake Mackenzie

Billy Marquez, 18, of Dimmitt became the latest drowning victim at Lake Mackenzie late Sunday, July 8, 1990. Justice of the Peace James Edwards ruled the death accidental.

The man is thought to have jumped into the water on the south side of the boat ramp, began swimming, then went under. He struggled to the surface, but was pulled under again, and then disappeared.

Emergency personnel responded to the call about 5:30 p.m., after members of his family reported him drowned. Divers from the Amarillo Police

Department arrived on the scene and entered the waters about 9:55 p.m. The body was removed from the water on the second attempted rescue dive at 10:15 p.m. and taken to Schooler-Gordon Funeral Home in Silver-

It is speculated the victim may have become entangled in a tree beneath the surface of the water. One of the APD divers became tangled in a tree and had to have his diving partner to help free him, causing more anxiety at the scene.

# Food Diary Health Help

According to Cindy Rowell, R. D., outpatient dietitian at Methodist Hospital, carrying a diary and recording what you eat for one week can demonstrate some hidden, bad eating habits.

Keeping a detailed food diary for a week is a simple way to learn if what, when, how and why you eat are the reasons you feel sluggish or can't lose a few extra pounds.

Make a six-column chart with headings noting the time, what you're doing and where, what and how much you eat, what your mood is, the time you spend eating and how many calories you consume. At the end of the week, interpret and study your notes.



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

# SOCIAL SECURITY

NOT ALL FARM WORK IS COV-ERED BY SOCIAL SECURITY

Farmers and farm workers need to know when farm work is covered by Social Security.

Farmers must pay Social Security taxes for any worker who is paid at least \$150 in cash during the year. If the farmer's total expense for agricultural labor is \$2,500 or more, all workers are covered by Social Security, even if they earn less than \$150. An exception is made for some piece-work laborers.

The exception applies to laborers who live at home and commute to ally during harvest season pick fruit or vegetables by hand. If the work is paid on a piece rate basis, it is only covered by Social Security if the worker is paid at least \$150 in cash.

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
