Last Sunday night, October 28, marked the end of 40-plus years of service for the Owens family in the Quitaque First Baptist Church. It all started back in February of 1930 when George Owens came to Quitaque and became music director for the church. It ended October 28, 1973, when Gaston Owens resigned as music director.

What it all adds up to is that for the past 43½ years, with the exception of about one year when David Hill from Wayland College served as music director, the congregation of the First Baptist Church of Quitaque has had an Owens leading their singing on Sundays and in quite a number of revival meetings. ## Trends In Panhandle Agriculture To Be Spotlighted At Meeting

Trends in Texas Panhandle agriculture will be spotlighted at the annual meeting of the Panhandle Economic Program at Canyon November 16, 1973, according to County Extension Agent Jimmy Vanstory.

Governor Dolph Briscoe and Senator Max Sherman, along with specialists and local producers in beef cattle, grain marketing, and family living-youth will headline the event which begins at 9:00 a.m. at the Activities Center on the West Texas State University Campus.

Vanstory said that people from across the 25-county PEP area (Upper Panhandle) will be on hand, along with key leaders from each county, who will be welcomed by the WTSU President.

Crops, livestock and family living and youth will be singled out for specific discussions during task force meetings in the morning session. Leading the discussions on beef will be Dr. Ed Uvacek, Live-

stock Marketing Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station, and Mr. Jack Carrothers of Friona Industries, Inc. of Friona. Dr. Roland Smith, Grain Marketing Specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station, and Mr. Carl Jahnel, farmer from Hemphill County, will examine the world and local grain situation. The Family Living Youth Task Force will discuss what the future holds for the family in health, family economics as they relate to health programs, and foods and nutrition. Dr. Barbara Sears, Lynn Bourland, and Sally Springer, Extension Specialists in health, home management and foods and nutrition, will be featured speakers.

Senator Max Sherman of senatorial district 31, said Vanstory, will be the first speaker, addressing the group on activities of the recently created Regional Water Council.

Following his speech, the agricultural task force and the family living youth task force of PEP will meet.

The governor's address comes at 1:30 p.m. with a business meeting scheduled at 2:30, said Vanstory.

Governor Briscoe's address, he said, is expected to center around the role that Texas will play in the nation's agricultural future.

Included in the business meeting, the agent noted, will be an outline of task force goals, the introduction of the executive committee, the chairman's report, and election of officers.

### CONSOLIDATION LOANS

Sometimes a person's credit is just too "good."

When good credit goes sour because of too much use, there is a remedy—a consolidation loan.

These loans have saved many debtors from a bad credit record.

Nevertheless, they can mean disaster unless handled with utmost care.

For instance, a person might be paying \$200 each month on five different loans. If he gets a consolidation loan, and the payments are lowered to \$100, that sounds like a good deal—but it could be more costly.

Credit unions, banks and small loan companies make consolidation loans—but check the interest rate. You could move up to a higher rate than you're paying now.

To reduce payment amounts, the loan is spread over a longer period of time. And the longer it takes to pay off a loan, the more interest is paid. As a result, consolidation may be more expensive

than the original loans. Consolidation can—and does—work. However, sincerity in getting out of debt is a "must" for success.

If after consolidation the person doesn't exercise self-control over new charges and loans, it could spell disaster.

People are tempted to make more down payments and run up accounts because they feel less strained with the new lowered payment.

This feeling of false security spells the downfall for many with consolidation loans. Once their payment decreases, they start spending all over again.

Creditors who encourage spending again—after they're paid, add to the problem. This time, pay cash.

Additional debts can lead to bankruptcy.

Once a credit rating is darkened, the individual finds himself paying higher interest rates on loans.

## Triticale Planting Finished at High Plains Foundation

First plantings on the second season of a continuing triticale study have been completed at the High Plains Research Foundation.

According to J. Joe Wright, associate agronomist in charge of new crops research, the triticale study has been expanded this season to include studies on row spacings and seeding rates. Last year, studies included dates of plantings, irrigation methods and fertilizer rates and some variety studies.

Wright reported that arrangements had also been made to start a triticale selection and introductions program this year. In cooperation with CIMMYT in Mexico, and the University of Manitoba in Canada, triticale selections are being made available for testing in this area. "What we will be looking for are new spring types exhibiting winter hardiness," Wright said.

He said that the triticale symposium conducted recently in Lubbock was very successful. "It is expected that in 1975, the international symposium will be conducted jointly here at the Foundation and in Lubbock," he stated.

The contract for the triticale work is with Triticale Foods Corporation of Muleshoe.
