Patriots Ready For Bulldogs

The patriots of Valley High School traveled to Jayton Thursday night to take on the Hermleigh Cardinals. The Patriots used an "intense" defensive effort to upend the cardinals 8 touchdowns to one. This was the last scrimmage for both teams.

Hermleigh came out on offense in a spread offense but this week the Patriots were ready. Forcing the Cardinals to lose yardage on their first ten plays. When the Patriots had the ball it took only one play before they were on the scoreboard. Kirk Garner took a handoff up the middle and raced 60 yards for the first touchdown. The fireworks were just getting started as the Patriots were able to score seven more times. Bubba Clardy scored three times, Garner once more and Clay Edwards scored twice. Edwards also hit Warren Merrell on a 22 yard pass for another touchdown.

The boys are really adjusting well to 6-man football. They had a tough week after the Lazbuddie scrimmage but they seemed to have turned it around. Coach Bob Rapp has done a great job with the defense. They have had to work against the spread offense two weeks in a row but the boys had adjusted well to it. Against Hermleigh Kirk Garner and Bubba Clardy did a great job putting pressure on

the Cardinal's backfield. Bengie Hughes, Warren Merrell and Cory Pointer each had good nights on defense. On offense the line of Chad Isbell, Jason Little and Jon Pigg seemed to open up holes at will. It was good to have this kind of effort going into the season opener against Mullins.

The Valley Patriots travel to Rochester Saturday night against Mullin. Game time at 7:30.

1987 Agriculture Census Released

The 1987 Census of Agriculture was released last week from the Bureau of the Census in Washington, DC.

Cattle and calves accounted for \$6 billion or 57 percent of Texas' agricultural sales in 1987, figures from the Commerce Department's Census Bureau show. The cattle and calf inventory on the 142,244 farms reporting such stock totaled 13,020,910, up from 1982. Some 12,120,310 cattle and calves were sold in 1987. The heifer and heifer calf inventory totaled 3,230,691. The inventory of steers, steer calves, bulls, and bull calves totaled 4,295,123.

The 1987 Census of Agriculture shows that Texas' agricultural sales totaled \$10.5 billion. Livestock, poultry, and their products accounted for \$7.6 billion or 72 percent of total agricultural sales. Crops, including nursery and greenhouse products, accounted for \$2.9 billion or 28 percent of total agricultural sales.

The 188,788 farms counted in 1987 were 2 percent more than in 1982, when the last agriculture census was taken. Some 36 percent had 1987 sales of \$10,000 or more, and 9 percent had sales of \$100,000 or more.

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Predator Hunting Laws Changed

It is now legal, with the proper permit, to hunt predator animals: feral hogs, bobcats, foxes, coyotes and cross breeds of coyotes and dogs, from airplanes or helicopters.

The bill, sponsored by Senator Steve Carriker, Democrat of Roby, became one of the new laws effective Friday.

Written specifically to eliminate feral hogs, the law allows the management of wildlife, including counting, photographing, relocating or capturing, by use of aircraft, according to Capt. Harold Oates of Texas Parks and Wildlife Department law enforcement division.

Applicants for the permits must file affidavits with the department stating the kind and number animals to be taken, a list of counties and landholdings involved and reasons why the permit should be issued.

In addition, permit holders, within 30 days of the end of each calendar quarter or on termination of the permit, must file a report showing the permit holder's name and address, the number and description of animals involved, a description of the area and dates of flights taken.

There is no limit to the number of permits landowners may obtain. "Probably, the pilot of the helicopter and a designated shooter, will do the shooting," Oates said.

Matt Curry, a spokesman for Carriker, said that their office would assist anyone with the application process who may want to organize an aircraft hog hunt.

He further said that the Texas Department of Agriculture maintains a clearinghouse of hunters for landowners who do not want to hunt the animals themselves.

"If you want hunters to go in, they'll come in on a fee basis and hunt your hogs," he said.

SUPERINTENDENT'S CORNER

Something new and exciting has been provided for Valley Kindergarten and first grade students this year. For some time the school district has searched for ways to strengthen its instructional program in the reading and writing content areas, especially for lower grade students. 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
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
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
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
