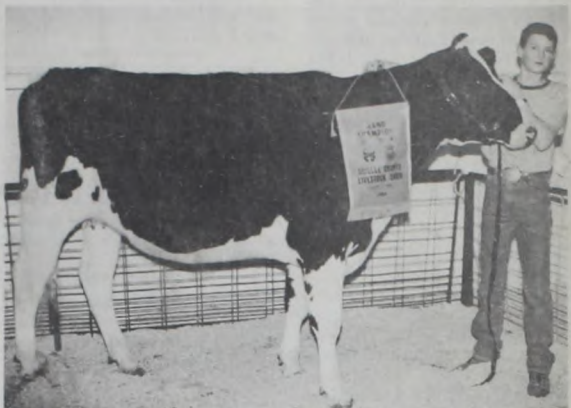
February Immunization Clinics Available

Immunization Clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for February. Protection is against Polio, Diphtheria, Lock Jaw (Tetanus), Whooping Cough (Pertussis), Measles, Rubella, Mumps and HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B).

The Texas Department of Health is charging money to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

Immunization may be received at Memphis on February 13, 1996 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Texas Tech Health Clinic, 1800 North Boykin; at Childress on February 8 from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1 p.m. until 4:30 p.m. at the Texas Tech Health Clinic at 801 Commerce or at Clarendon on February 20 from 10 a.m. until 4 p.m. at Texas Department of Health Office at Medical Center, 70 Highway North.

Immunization may be received in Tulia at 219 S. E. 2nd, Texas Tech Health Center on February 7, 1996 from 8:30-11:30 a.m. & 1-4:30 p.m.; on February 14 from 8:30-11:30 a.m. & 1-4:30 p.m.; on February 21 from 8:30-11:30 a.m. & 1-4:30 p.m. and on February 28 from 8:30-11:30 a.m. & 1-4:30 p.m.

Briscoe County Junior Livestock Show Held At Vance Price Memorial Center

The Briscoe County Livestock Show was held at the new Vance Price Memorial Center on January 25-27, 1996. This makes the first time that the show was not held in Silvertown. The 1996 show included 21 steer, 6 dairy heifer, 18 beef heifer, 11 lamb, 91 prospect hog, and 111 market hog entries, that were exhibited by Valley FFA, Silvertown FFA, and Briscoe County 4-H members from the Valley and Silvertown Schools. The show day ended with a premium sale that totaled over \$43,800 dollars.

Judge Jim Tucker of Wellman named Teal Bennett's Hamp Hog Grand Champion of the Prospect Show. Kim Woods' 185 pound Cross Hog was named Reserve Grand Champion of the Prospect Show.

Megan Jeffcoat's 214 pound Hamp Hog which was named Breed Champion Hamp; was selected as Grand Champion of the market Hog Show. Judge Jim Tucker named Jess Year's York Hog as Reserve Grand Champion of the Market Show.

(NAPS)—Millions of adults and children are allergic to their household pets, especially cats and dogs.

Now there's help in the form of a high-filtration vacuum cleaner. A study conducted by doctors at the University of Virginia found that the GS 90 allergy vacuum, manufactured by NILFISK A/S, can actually decrease the level of airborne allergen in homes with cats.

The study, published in the American Review of Respiratory Disease, examined the impact of two different "allergy vacuums" on the airborne particles generated by house cats that most commonly cause allergic reactions.

Using two types of vacuums—one with a water-filtering system and the other a Nilfisk GS 90 HEPA (High Efficiency Particulate Air) filtered vacuum—researchers found an increase in airborne cat allergens when using the water-filtration vacuum. Conversely, the HEPA-filtered vacuum effectively reduced the number of allergens in the carpet and caused no increase in airborne particles during vacuuming.

Youth Sports Injuries

Sports may be hazardous to the health of our youth.

"Of the 30 million young people involved in organized sports, 10 percent of them will suffer a sports-related injury," said Dr. Albert Hergenroeder, head of adolescent and sports medicine at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

According to Hergenroeder, many new injuries occur as a result of past injuries that are not detected or properly rehabilitated. Athletes often suffer loss of strength, flexibility and endurance as a result of injuries that are ignored and not treated.

"The best way to prevent injuries is to rehabilitate old injuries," he said. "In addition, watch for the 'stars'. An athlete who is successful at a high level is more likely to return to competition before he is fully recovered."

Sports with the highest number of injuries include football, softball, gymnastics and girls' cross country running.

"Winterizing" For Exercise

'Tis the season to bundle up if you are headed outside to exercise. "People can continue outdoor exercise during the winter months if they take precautions," said David Brennan, an exercise physiologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

While outdoor exercisers in moderately warm climates may have to make only minor adjustments, people working out in cold-weather states need to make equipment and clothing changes to avoid hypothermia and falls on slippery terrain.

Brennan suggests the following: Dress in layers of clothing, using long-sleeved T-shirts and jackets. As your body warms up, you can shed a layer or two and still be comfortable.

Cover your head and ears. Heat easily escapes through the head if the head is not covered.

Wear athletic shoes with a jagged tread to get better traction on snow-covered roads and trails.

Drink plenty of water. Even in cold weather, the body can lose a lot of fluid through sweat.

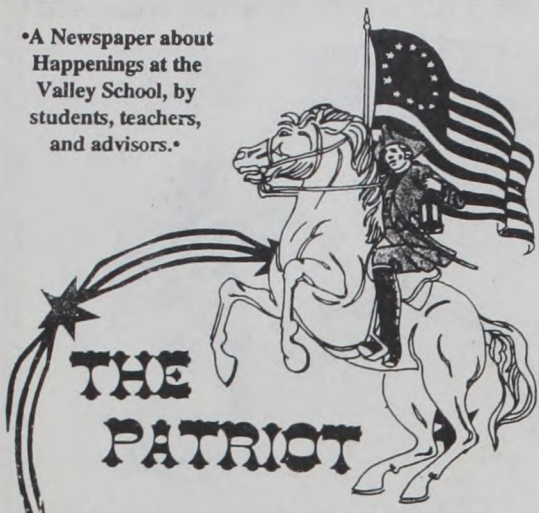

Cold-Weather Starting Tips

(NAPS)—Cold weather is one of the worst enemies of the small engines that run outdoor power equipment. But hard-starting can be preventable.

Begin with the fuel. Many people don't know refiners vary gasoline blends according to the seasons. For example, in summer they alter the formula to reduce volatility (the rate at which it evaporates). In winter they change it again, to help with hard-to-start engines.

Also, gas tends to break down in storage. Drain the fuel tank before putting away a piece of equipment, then fill up fresh when you take it out again.

To prevent deterioration of gas, storage containers should have tightly fitting caps. Allowing fuel to be exposed to air can lead to gum formation, octane loss and moisture pick-up, which all contribute to hard-starting and poor engine performance.

LENTIL SOUP WITH WALNUT PESTO

- 1/2 cup chopped California walnuts
- 1/3 cup grated fat-free Parmesan cheese
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh chives or parsley OR 1 teaspoon dried thyme
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1/2 cup nonfat yogurt
- 1 cup lentils
- 2 cups chicken broth, no salt added
- 2 1/2 cups water
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 1/2 cup chopped carrot
- 1 cup fresh tomato salsa
- salt and pepper to taste, if desired

To make the pesto, in a food processor combine the walnuts and Parmesan cheese and process until the walnuts are finely ground. Add the herbs, garlic and yogurt and process until smooth and blended. Cover tightly and refrigerate until serving. Makes about 3/4 cup of pesto.

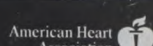
Rinse the lentils well, and drain them. To make the soup, in a large saucepan combine the lentils, broth, water, onion, carrot and salsa. Bring to a boil over high heat then reduce the heat, cover the pan, and simmer gently about 40 minutes, until the lentils are tender and the soup is thick. Season with salt and pepper to taste, if desired. Top each serving of soup with about 3 tablespoons of walnut pesto. Serves 4.

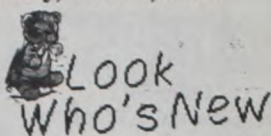
Roy's brother, Earl and Shirley Coker of Springville, Utah and his sister, Dorothy and Homer Dobbins of Durango, Colorado were there also.

TDA To Help Ranchers Sell Cattle To Mexico

With discussions underway between the U.S. and Mexican governments to institute a loan guaranty program for Mexican cattle raisers to buy U.S. cattle for restocking depleted herds, the Texas Department of Agriculture is working to ensure that Texas cattle producers are ready to take advantage of the massive sale, Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry said today.

"Whether or not a loan guaranty program is finalized between Mexico and the United States, Mexican cattlemen are replenishing their herds, and I want them to buy as many of those cattle from Texas as they can," Perry said. "Australia and New Zealand are also seeking to restock Mexican herds. But I expect the Mexicans will want to buy from us because we have superior genetics, and, as their next-door neighbor, we can offer the best deal on hauling expenses."

To facilitate sales to Mexican buyers, TDA is working with cattle organizations and producer associations throughout the state, including Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers, Texas Cattle Feeders, the Texas Beef Council, Independent Cattlemen, the Pure Breed Cattle Alliance and the Texas Farm Bureau.

"We have prepared an information packet for producers who have not conducted business internationally before," Perry said. "The package will be sent to all industry groups for their members, as well as to any individual fenceholders who call us seeking help on sales."

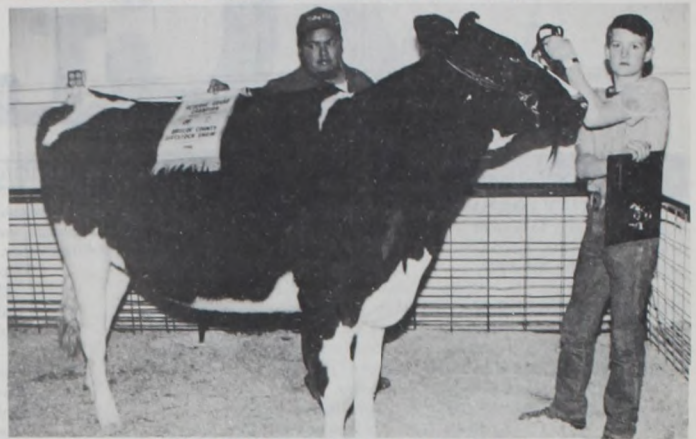
