Taxpayers whose values have increased, as stated above, must be notified at least 20 days before the Appraisal Review Board meets. The A.R.B. is a three-member committee appointed to hear the protests of taxpayers who disagree with the appraisal given their property.

Although all taxpayers have the right to appear before the A.R.B., Carlye said she feels most problems can be solved if taxpayers first visit with the appraisal district

staff as they can answer most questions that a taxpayer may have concerning how the figure determined.

HOWEVER, taxpayers who ant to protest before the A.R.B. must file a written

protest at the appraisal district office and must have evidence to support their claim, according to state property tax law. The A.R.B. will meet at

the courthouse to hear protests July 8.

### you would climb the windmill tower and hang the beef twenty feet or more from the ground, this would keep it until it was all used up. The only thing was someone had to climb the tower and cut off a piece of beef. For something sweet we would first cut off some old broom handles and head for the cane patch and prepare the cane to be taken to the syrup mill. This we did by stripping all the leaves off the stalks of cane, then cut it down with large knives and load it on a wagon and head for the syrup mill with gallon buckets to put the syrup in. The mill was pulled by one mule

that traveled in a circle day after day.

Each family had about one hundred laying hens to furnish the eggs and to raise small chickens for fryers. When the corn was ready to gather we would gather, shuck and shell all by hand, then go to the corn mill and have it ground into corn meal. This gave you meal to make cornbread. It took three to four cows to furnish plenty of milk and butter for the family.
