

## TWO MENINGITIS CASES CONFIRMED IN CROSS PLAINS

CROSS PLAINS — The following story was taken from the Cross Plains Review, concerning two cases of meningitis reported in that city.

Two cases of meningitis have been confirmed in Cross Plains. Stricken were Duane Hutchins and Billy Pope.

Dr. Carl J. Sohns, public health officer in Cross Plains, offered the following statement, in part, after the two cases were confirmed.

"It is well to consider that this (the two cases) does not constitute an epidemic, but everyone should be familiar with the major symptoms in order to promptly get any questionable case to the family physician. The person with fever and headache, feeling very ill, nausea, vomiting and neck and back pain and stiffness should be examined by the family physician. If there has been contact with a known meningitis case, the physician should know this."

Hutchins, 10-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Alvin Hutchins, entered Hendrick Memorial Hospital last Friday. Mrs. Geo. Hutchins, his grandmother, reported Monday that he is doing as well as can be expected although he still has fever and headaches.

Pope, 6-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Pope, was taken to an Abilene hospital for the same ailment Tuesday of last week. He was dismissed on Monday.

## Bill Dyer, Longtime Clyde Resident, Dies in Fire At His Home Sunday

CLYDE — William Q. (Bill) Dyer Jr., 61, was pronounced dead at the scene about 10:15 Sunday after firemen carried him from his burning home. Officials ruled death was caused by asphyxiation.

According to Clyde Fire Chief Eston Shelnut, neighbors heard no cries for help, although they knew Dyer was at home. Two firemen donned masks and went into the house and brought Dyer out. He was still gasping for breath, Shelnut said.

Damage to the house was medium, with one room completely destroyed and smoke damage throughout the remainder of the house. Mrs. Dyer was at work at the time of the fire.

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Tuesday in the First Baptist Church, with Rev. Glenn Ward, Cherry Heights pastor, officiating, assisted by Rev. Riley Fugitt, pastor of the First Baptist Church. Burial was in Mount Hope Cemetery, near Anson, under the direction of Bailey Funeral Home.

Born Sept. 20, 1920 in Anson, he married Mary Jeanne Elliott Sept. 26, 1941 in Anson. He was a parts man for Ford Motor Co. in Baird and Abilene for about 20 years, but had been disabled for the past two years. He had been a resident of Clyde for 20 years. ## School Tax Rate To Remain The Same

CLYDE — The Board of Trustees of Clyde Public Schools adopted the budget for the 1972-73 school year at a special meeting on August 15.

The budget for the coming school year calls for total expenditures of \$500,749.00. This is a new high for budgeted expenditures; however, receipts from sources other than local tax will be available to cover the increased expenditures.

The local tax rate will remain the same as the 1971 rate. The rate will be \$1.50 per \$100.00 assessed value which is based on 30 percent of actual value.

## RECORD FIRST DAY ENROLLMENT TOTALS 275 STUDENTS AT EULA

### Putnam Increases Baird - Cross Plains Lower

EULA — Supt. Mac Coppinger announced this week that Eula Rural School enrolled a record 275 students for the 1972-73 school term. This is 25 over last year's first day enrollment.

Classes began Monday morning at the school. The addition of new students was due to new resident mov-

ing into the school district during the summer. More and more people are getting away from the larger cities and moving to rural areas, which will in time, up the percentage of rural communities in school enrollment. The past few years, enrollment in rural school has been rather low, due to decrease in population.

Eula school is one of the rural schools in Callahan County that has withstood consolidation. Many other schools have long been discontinued and are now only memories. The Eula school has always had a strong foundation in community support, which has been the key to its long success.

Putnam Rural School, also reported an increase in their first day enrollment. Registration day and the first day, Aug. 18th, brought in 59 for the first day of classes. Supt. R. W. Reynolds state that this is six students over last year's first day enrollment.

The Putnam community has continued its strong fight to keep this rural school, and has successfully done so. Supt. Reynolds reports that eight teachers are on the staff at Putnam. One new teacher was added this year, Mrs. Evelyn Hughes of Baird.

Reynolds also reports that the school tax was lowered this year from \$1.40 to \$1.20 in Putnam Rural School District. The district saw an opportunity operate on a smaller budget, which is rather a unique thing in this day and time.

The Baird School was only four students under the predicted number of 380 enrollment for the 1972-73 school year. A total of 376 registered for Monday, Aug. 21, the first day of classes. High school students totaled 137, and Supt. Bill Gunn stated that this was the largest number since he had been with the school, the past four years. There are 29 senior, 39 juniors, 31 sophomores and 38 freshmen.

Grade school and junior high registered 239 students - 25 first graders, 36 second, 30 third, 31 fourth, 28 fifth, 23 sixth, 34 seventh and 34 eighth.

Supt. Gunn stated that the first week had gotten off to a smooth start, and from all indications the school is in for a very successful year.

Cross Plains school reported that the first day enrollment was down: 19 student from last year's record. 431 students enrolled for the first day of classes, with 175 of these in high school, and 256 in the lower eight grades and kindergarten.

Cross Plains ranks 2nd to Clyde for student enrollment. Baird ranks third, Eula fourth and Putnam fifth. Clyde school will begin August 28 for their first day of classes. To date, 1,141 students have registered in four of the five schools in Callahan County.

Various activities will now be underway through the county, as the football season will be starting soon. The school spirit will once again come alive for our young people, and members of the faculty. It is our place as parents to co-operate and show our support to feed this spirit and keep it alive.

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## Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 7 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 16)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article I of the Texas Constitution be amended by adding a new section to be known as Section 3a, to read as follows: "Section 3a. Equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin. This amendment is self-operative."

amendment to the constitution shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide that equality under the law shall not be denied or abridged because of sex, race, color, creed, or national origin."

## Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 8 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 1)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 4. The Governor elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State at least five years immediately preceding his election."

He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature.

Section 23. That Article IV, Section 23, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified. The four-year term applies to those officers who are elected at the general election in 1974 or thereafter. Each shall receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, to reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Section 4. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and certain statutory State officers."

## Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

NUMBER 12 ON THE BALLOT (SJR 29)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 33, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows: "Section 33. The accounting officers in this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant or check on funds of the State of Texas, whether in the treasury or otherwise, to any person for salary or compensation who holds at the same time more than one civil office of emolument, in violation of Section 40."

State soil and water conservation districts, from holding at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any election, general, special or primary in this State when otherwise qualified. State employees or other individuals who receive all or part of their compensation either directly or indirectly from funds of the State of Texas and who are not State officers, shall not be barred from serving as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts; provided, however, that such State employees or other individuals shall receive no salary for serving as members of such governing bodies. It is further provided that a non-elective State officer may hold other non-elective offices under the State or the United States, if the other office is of benefit to the State of Texas or is required by the State or Federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States, except as a notary public if qualified by law."

Section 2. That Article XVI, Section 40, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public and Postmaster, Officer of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States, and retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and the officers and directors of soil and water conservation districts, unless otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States, or retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and officers of the

NUMBER 3 ON THE BALLOT, (HJR 41)  
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE  
LEGISLATURE OF THE  
STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI,  
Section 61, of the Texas Con-  
stitution, be amended to read  
as follows:

"Section 61. All district officers  
in the State of Texas and  
all county officers in counties  
having a population of twenty  
thousand (20,000) or more, ac-  
cording to the then last preced-  
ing Federal Census, shall be  
compensated on a salary basis.  
In all counties in this State, the  
Commissioners Courts shall be  
authorized to determine whether  
precinct officers shall be  
compensated on a fee basis or  
on a salary basis, with the ex-  
ception that it shall be manda-  
tory upon the Commissioners  
Courts, to compensate all jus-  
tices of the peace, constables,  
deputy constables and precinct  
law enforcement officers on a  
salary basis beginning January  
1, 1973; and in counties having  
a population of less than twenty  
thousand (20,000), accord-  
ing to the then last preceding  
Federal Census, the Commis-  
sioners Courts shall also have  
the authority to determine  
whether county officers shall  
be compensated on a fee basis  
or on a salary basis, with the  
exception that it shall be man-  
datory upon the Commission-  
ers Courts to compensate all  
sheriffs, deputy sheriffs, coun-  
ty law enforcement officers in-

cluding sheriffs who also per-  
form the duties of assessor and  
collector of taxes, and their  
deputies, on a salary basis be-  
ginning January 1, 1949.

"All fees earned by district,  
county and precinct officers  
shall be paid into the county  
treasury where earned for the  
account of the proper fund,  
provided that fees incurred by  
the State, county and any  
municipality, or in case where  
a pauper's oath is filed, shall  
be paid into the county treasury  
when collected and provided  
that where any officer is com-  
pensated wholly on a fee basis  
such fees may be retained by  
such officer or paid into the  
treasury of the county as the  
Commissioners Court may di-  
rect. All Notaries Public, coun-  
ty surveyors and public weigh-  
ers shall continue to be com-  
pensated on a fee basis."

Sec. 2. The foregoing consti-  
tutional amendment shall be  
submitted to a vote of the  
qualified electors of this state  
at an election to be held on the  
first Tuesday after the first  
Monday in November, 1972, at  
which election the ballot shall  
be printed to provide for vot-  
ing for or against the proposi-  
tion: "The constitutional  
amendment to require the  
commissioners court in all  
counties of the state to com-  
pensate all justices of the peace  
on a salary basis."

AUSTIN — For the first time in three years, the number of families with dependent children on welfare rolls declined last month.

There are 1,555 fewer AFDC recipients than a month before, the State Department of Public Welfare reported.

Welfare Commissioner Raymond W. Vowell attributed the reversal to a number of factors, including tighter controls on AFDC program eligibility, vocational training and expanded day care programs to help mothers get to work.

The decline was the first in AFDC caseload since July, 1969. Dropoff was from 447,967 recipients to 446,412.

A steady increase in recent years has been attributed to liberalized eligibility standards as ordered by federal courts and altered federal regulations. In late 1970 and early 1971, AFDC rolls swelled at a rate of 10,000 to 12,000 recipients a month. Growth slowed significantly in recent months.

Vowell directed caseworkers to return to the practice of holding personal interviews with AFDC applicants and recipients, verifying income, child support, domicile, household composition, and other factors affecting eligibility and the amount of assistance granted.

A massive recertification effort also has been ordered by which AFDC cases are being checked individually to determine whether a family situation has changed so as to affect the monthly assistance payment. A new policy also has been instituted requiring applicants to provide documentary evidence of child eligibility by birth or baptismal certificate or hospital record.

Fraud detection efforts have been stepped up, and 130 of 205 suspected cases have been referred to local prosecutors or grand jurors.

PWD REORGANIZED — A far-reaching reshuffling of Parks and Wildlife Department divisions was ordered by new Executive Director Clayton T. Garrison.

Garrison named six new directors to head statewide divisions under a new structure.

The new directors are James E. Dickinson, 30, finance; Stetson G. Reed, 39, law enforcement; Robert J. Kemp Jr., 46, fish and wildlife; Paul E. Schlimper, 32, parks; Clayton G. Rutter, 38, engineering; and Bobby E. Bradley, 37, administration. Richard A. McCune will remain as director of information and education.

Garrison said the reorganization as a "move to get back to the basic responsibilities of the department." Each of the six new divisions will be the headquarters unit for administration of all field activities. PWD personnel will report to appropriate directors and divisions in Austin.

HIGHWAY CONTEST FINALIST NAMED — Five State Highway Department foremen and construction supervisors are finalists for this year's Lady Bird Johnson award for highway beautification work.

They are Milton C. Campbell of Rails, Cullen Luttrell of Sonora, Herbert H. Smith of Rusk, Melvin E. Bayless of LaGrange and Rinaldo Rivera of Falfurrias.

Mrs. Johnson will make the awards October 11 at the Lyndon B. Johnson State Park near Stonewall. First place winner will receive a cash award of \$1,000, and the runnerup will get \$500. An additional award of \$500 will go to the newspaper writer who does the best job on highway beautification coverage and an identical gift will go to the best radio-television effort in the field.

OFFICERS CREDITED — Additional auto insurance reductions may result from intensive law enforcement efforts that curb accidents, Southwestern Insurance Information Service said recently.

On the other hand, if enforcement efforts slacken and accident frequency rises, benefits of the recent 11 per cent rate

cut (effective September 1) will be lost, the association said.

Police chiefs and sheriffs received a special commendation from the insurance group for efforts to reduce accidents last year -- and a request that they continue to concentrate on

speeders, drunk drivers, and those without proper licenses.

PAY RAISES SOUGHT — Gov. Preston Smith and Sen. John Tower are pressing the federal pay board to approve 6.8 per cent pay raises for state employees effective September 1 as voted by the legislature.

The pay board voted to retain a 5.5 per cent ceiling on raises, but Smith and Tower claim an exemption for the 67,000 state employees under the "catch-up" provision.

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# CALLAHAN COUNTY HISTORY

By T. R. HAVINS  
The following article is the second in a series written by T. R. Havins, about the early history of Callahan County. Be sure to remember the book that will be released Sept. 1, about Belle Plains.

A lone white Texan, Daniel G. Watson, appears to have been the second English-speaking visitor in Callahan County. Along with several Indian companions, Watson scouted Pecan Bayou in the early spring of 1844 under orders from President Sam Houston of the Republic of Texas.

A year previously Houston and chiefs of numerous tribes had signed a treaty of friendship near Waco, but the roving Comanches were not present. The president's order to Watson was an attempt to persuade the Comanches to come to a second meeting in 1844.

Watson received verbal orders from the president February 15, 1844, and left Washington on the Brazos in company with John Conner, a Delaware scout, who knew the Comanche language and could act as interpreter for Watson.

The two men traveled up the Brazos until March 1, when they found an old Comanche woman and a small girl at an Indian camp near the river. Two days later, in company with the old woman and child, they headed northward and reached a Keechi village at modern Graham.

Keechi tribesmen led them to believe they would find the

Comanches on Pecan Bayou. They turned southward and crossed the Callahan Divide to the stream. They found no Indians but discovered numerous camp grounds that had been deserted for weeks. At this time they were immediately north of the point where State Highway 36 crosses the stream.

On advice of John Conner, the party turned northward toward the Clear Fork of the Brazos. Sometime during the second day they met four Comanche braves who were returning from Mexico. The warriors informed Conner that one of their tribe was on the Clear Fork at that time. The two groups then decided to turn southward toward the Colorado.

After traveling an undetermined distance, they again reached Pecan Bayou, but the exact location is obscure. One of the Comanches spent two days searching for his fellow-tribesmen, while the others remained in camp.

On March 21 two Comanches known to John Conner arrived in camp and informed Watson that their young men were so widely separated it would be impossible to reach the council grounds near Waco at the time specified by President Houston.

After receiving this information, Watson and his party returned to the Keechi village on the main Brazos. From that point Watson and Conner journeyed down the river to Torrey's Trading Post and reported to their superiors at the council grounds.

### JUST A FEW PLAIN FACTS

I am writing as a lifelong citizen and taxpayer of the City of Baird, Texas. I am not trying to step on any one's toes any more than I would my own. I think that the citizens of Baird have a pretty good City Council. These men have a big job to do, and a lot of responsibility. I also know they cannot please every one, and if I want to cuss them, I will go down to their meetings and do it face to face.

The City of Baird has the lowest rates on water, electricity and garbage that I know of any where in the State. This is something for citizens of Baird to be proud of. In the 1940's Baird didn't have one-fourth enough water for the people, the Baird Lake was built in 1949 and since it filled up with water, Baird has had plenty of water for people to use. The lake was built with 30-year Bonds, it will be paid for in 1979 then the Water District taxes will stop and the Lake will be turned over to the City of Baird. Then the City of Baird will not have to buy water from the Water District.

Streets and Alleys and Ditches: I will agree they are in pretty bad shape. About 75% of this is the peoples fault, and about 25% the City's fault. People putting in culverts, drainage pipe, etc., to fix their driveway or fill up the ditches with culverts and drainage pipe about 1/3 big enough to carry the water, so water will cross the road from one side to the other causing wash-outs in streets, also trash is put in ditches, this causes ditches to stop-up. I think the City should pass an ordinance that any one putting in any kind of drainage in ditches to be done with City engineering specifications and

be large enough to carry the water at that particular location. This would eliminate lots of street work and expense.

To keep streets up will cost a lot of money, especially the shape they are in at present. It will mean a new maintainer for the job, also an experienced grader operator, and the City can't hire an operator for nothing. These men are in demand and draw good wages, but these men are pretty good engineers on grading work, and is worth much more than a man with no experience. I think to get the streets up in shape and maintain them, the citizens are going to have to help finance this work through some kind of tax.

I think the City should have some building codes, such as plumbing, electrical, also building permits and a zoning ordinance to protect people with nice homes from some shack being moved in or built next to them that will ruin the value of their property. I have worked in some 15 towns the past 11 years, from a population of 600 to 30,000 and have observed the operations of these towns. The biggest part of these towns have codes and regulations that we work by - most of these codes are national codes.

Baird also has one of the best Volunteer Fire Departments of any small towns in the State of Texas. The Dept. has a full 30-man Department, most all young men of Baird. This is one of the biggest assets of the City. These men are the ones, with the good equipment furnished by the City, that holds the key rate on Fire Insurance. If it were not for the Fire Dept. and equipment, Fire Insurance would be so high people could not afford to carry it. The men of the Fire Dept. put in lots of time on training and keeping up equipment. The men get lots of criticism that they don't deserve. I know, I was a member of the Fire Dept. 33 years. These men make mistakes just like any one else, but they should be commended for their good works.

Keeping the City clean I think if some of the good citizens would keep some of their property clean there would not be so many blind corners in the town. Keeping the vacant lots clean is another problem. Some lots are owned by people who live out of town. This is a problem in most small towns. There are a good many lots that owners are unknown. If taxes on these lots are not being paid, they should be put up for tax sale.

This is just one man's opinion, and I guess I am as much to blame as anyone.

Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 65 to read as follows:  
"Section 65. Wherever the Constitution authorizes an agency, instrumentality, or subdivision of the State to issue bonds and specifies the maximum rate of interest which may be paid on such bonds issued pursuant to such constitutional authority, such bonds may bear interest at rates not to exceed a weighted average annual interest rate of 6%. All Constitutional provisions specifically setting rates in conflict with this provision are hereby repealed." This amendment shall become effective upon its adoption.  
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to vote of the qualified electors of this State at the general election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "To set a six percent (6%) weighted average annual interest rate for bonds issued pursuant to constitutional authority presently having a specified interest ceiling."

General Election November 7, 1972

Section 1. That Article VIII, Section 2-b, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:  
"Section 1-b. (a) Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes.  
(b) From and after January 1, 1973, the governing body of any county, city, town, school district, or other political subdivision of the State may exempt by its own action not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from all ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. As an alternative, upon receipt of a petition signed by twenty percent (20%) of the voters who voted in the last preceding election held by the political subdivision, the governing body of the subdivision shall call an election to determine by majority vote whether an amount not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) as provided in the petition, of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or over shall be exempt from all ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. Where any ad valorem tax has heretofore been pledged for the payment of any debt, the taxing officers of the political subdivision shall have authority to continue to levy and collect the tax against the homestead property at the same rate as the tax so pledged until the debt is discharged, if the cessation of the levy would impair the obligation of the contract by which the debt was created."

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that various political subdivisions of the State may exempt not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed value of residence homesteads of all persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from ad valorem taxes under certain conditions."

General Election November 7, 1972

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 2 to read as follows:  
"Section 2. (a) When the legislature convenes in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent resolution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. The legislature shall appropriate money to provide an adequate staff, office space, equipment, and supplies for the commission.  
(b) The commission shall study the need for constitutional change and shall report its recommendations to the members of the legislature not later than November 1, 1973.  
(c) The members of the 63rd Legislature shall be convened as a constitutional convention at noon on the second Tuesday in January, 1974. The lieutenant governor shall preside as a chairman of the convention if elected. The convention shall elect other officers if deemed necessary, adopt temporary and permanent rules, and publish a journal of its proceedings. A person elected to fill a vacancy in the 63rd Legislature before dissolution of the convention becomes a member of the convention on taking office as a member of the legislature.  
(d) Members of the convention shall receive compensation, mileage, per diem as determined by a five member committee, to be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and Chief Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals. This shall not be held in conflict with Article XVII, Section 33 of the Texas Constitution. The convention may provide for the expenses of its members and for the employment of a staff for the convention, and for these purposes may by resolution appropriate money from the general revenue fund of the state treasury. Warrants shall be drawn pursuant to vouchers signed by the chairman or by a person authorized by him to sign them.  
(e) The convention, by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, may submit for a vote of the qualified electors of this state a new constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections, or may submit revisions of the existing constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections. Each resolution shall specify the date of the election, the form of the ballots, and the method of publishing the proposals to be voted on. To be adopted, each proposal must receive the favorable vote of the majority of those voting on the proposal. The canvassing of the votes, and the reporting of the returns shall be as provided for elections under Section 1 of this article.  
(f) The convention may be dissolved by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members; but it is automatically dissolved at 11:59 p. m. on May 31, 1974, unless its duration is extended for a period not to exceed 60 days by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members.  
(g) The Bill of Rights of the present Texas Constitution shall be retained in full."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the convening of the members of the 63rd Legislature as a constitutional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of submitting to the voters a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution."

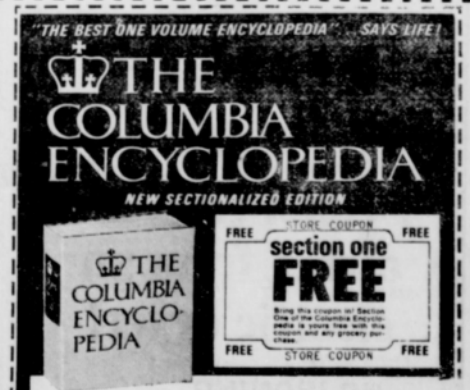

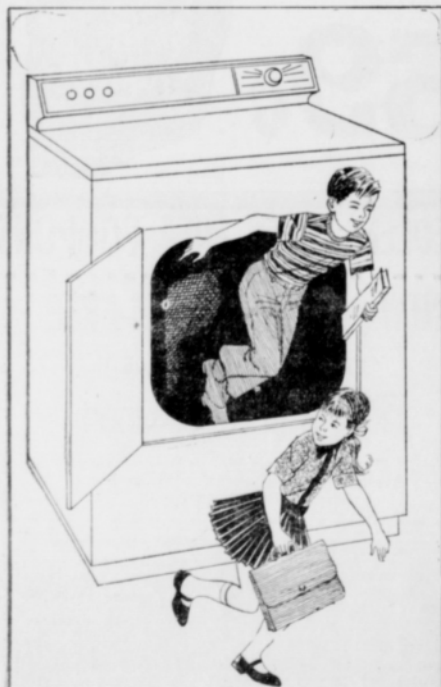
