

 Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Persons left home on Friday, May 18, pulling the travel trailer for a trip through the Northwest, across the East part of Colorado, the West of Nebraska, into South Dakota, where they left the trailer in a park at Custer.

They made side trips, first to Mount Rushmore Memorial, the Crazy Horse Memorial, the Badlands, rode the aerial tramway to the foot of Mount Rushmore, then a helicopter ride around the Memorial.
 They left Custer and traveled across Wyoming to Yellowstone

Park, visiting the Bill Cody Museum in Cody, an outstanding western museum. Drove through a snowstorm in the Big Horn Mountains, and found much of Yellowstone Park either closed or just opening. Made Fishing Bridge Trailer Park on the day it opened, where we spent four nights and the first morning awoke to four inches of fresh snow, but did make the circle in the Park, visiting Old Faithful Geyser, the Mammoth Hot Springs, Yellowstone Lake, a beautiful mountain country pretty well snowed in. Possibly the prettiest scenery was in the Grand Teton National Park, where we again rode a tram to the snow-covered top of Mount Rendezvous, a 2½ mile trip with total ascension of over 4000 ft. After leaving the Grand Tetons an unexpected drive through Wyoming Dairy Country, seeing thousands of Holstein cattle and lurching at a cheese factory. Then across the corner of Idaho into Utah spending the night in Brigham City and the next morning a drive out to the site of the meeting of the railroads from the East and West in 1849 with the Interior Department putting on

the ceremony of driving the Golden Spike. Then into Salt Lake City and of course a tour of Temple Square, attending an organ recital in the Mormon Tabernacle, then on Sunday morning Church Service (for the tourists) and hearing the Temple Choir. A visit to the Great Salt Lake, and the country's largest man-made hole in the ground, the Kennecott Copper mining operation. Then South to Kanab, Utah, to Glenn Canyon and Page, Arizona, making a tour of the generating plant at the bottom of the dam, then to Flagstaff, where we again parked the trailer for visiting and a little fishing in Oak Creek Canyon, where we barely caught a mess of rainbow trout. Then on to Albuquerque, where we had a short visit with O. C. and Betty Love and their two small granddaughters, then to Littlefield where we spent the night with an old friend, Mrs. Alma Calvert Purdy, whose husband, Sisco Purdy, passed away on May 17.
