## Students Urged To Apply For Private Scholarship

Graduate, Undergraduate, and College-bound Students in need of supplemental funding for college are urged to write to the Scholarship Bank for information on private scholarship sources.

The Scholarship Bank is a non-profit foundation which works with private foundations, the U.S. Department of Education, and financial aid offices to assure the high school and college students already attending college receive information on private aid sources. Funds are normally

awarded on such basis as academic standing, major, financial need, and even on a student's willingness to consider a special research project.

It is estimated that over 500 million dollars in private aid money will be distributed next year, or roughly one-fourth of all available aid. Funds for Undergraduate students range from \$1,000 to \$20,000 per student, with most scholarships renewable yearly. Graduate level grants are also available with values up to \$25,000.

National Organizations are funding women 25 and older who are returning to school to continue their education. Older female awards range from \$500 to \$20,000.

## School Trustees Approve Improvement Report

The Turkey-Quitaque Board of Trustees on November 14, 1988, reviewed and approved, in regular session, the Annual Improvement Report supplied by Superintendent Wilburn Leeper. In keeping with the guidelines, this information has been given to the Valley Tribune for publication. Due to the length of the report, it will be presented in a series.

### TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

ORGANIZATION, MANAGEMENT: Facility Adequacy, District Goals and the Impact of HB 72

GOAL FOUR: The organization and management of all levels of the educational system will be productive, efficient and accountable.

The student population in the lower grades has remained consistently near twenty-two enrollment. Because of state regulation class size, a continuous strain exist in an attempt to provide available classrooms in case enrollment goes above twenty-two. Currently, two classes are divided to meet the class size requirement and fully meets our needs. However, because of the uncertainty of enrollment, the school district must review needs for classroom space. There is a need to review needs for additional space for music rooms, remedial labs, and upgrading special education areas.

The school district buildings are fifteen years old and remain well maintained -- both grounds and buildings. The outside appearance is indicative of a school which takes pride in its people and community. A new Vocational Agriculture animal barn was constructed (by the students) and will be functional for the 1988-89 school year. Land upon which the barn was constructed was purchased for animal farm project use. Fifty trees have been planted to separate the view of the animal farm from the main school plant.

FINANCIAL CONDITION  
GOAL FIVE: The financing of public education will be equitable to all students in the state. The property values for the school district are based upon an agriculture economy and is not expected to increase.

There is some oil exploration being conducted in the area but at this time, the exploration remains outside the district boundaries. The tax rate is currently set at \$.80 and appears to be adequate with careful financial management and the state funding increases. Divided classrooms to meet the 22-1 ratio will require increased funding in the future. The current debt service tax rate is currently set at \$.15 and the school district indebtedness will be paid off in 1990. When the debt service matures, funds will be released to provide programs, personnel, and construction. A review of the district construction needs will be made during the 1988-89 school year. Next week: Parent/Community involvement.

Approximately 15 percent of the calories of the average American diet comes from protein. 12% is the recommended allowance level. What may be surprising to some is that proteins are not the most efficient source of energy.

There's no evidence that extra protein intake enhances athletic performance, supplies extra energy or increases muscle mass. Only proper training increases the size of a muscle. An athlete may take if he or she is large enough and the training is intense enough to add one pound of pure muscle a week.

"This cotton Network will also allow us as cotton buyers the ability to purchase cotton from every gin that is on the Network. This is how it works, our computer will scan lists of cotton from these gins and if we see some we want to buy or bid on, the printer makes a re-cap of the list and by placing this re-cap in our Fax phone, the home office will receive the valuable information in a matter of seconds.

Last year, this office purchased about \$7,200,000 worth of cotton in a 4 to 5 county area. We should exceed that amount this year with this computer system. There is just no limit to the value of information concerning the cotton industry. We also receive up to the minute grain markets.

Buyer for Consolidated Cotton, Carol Stephens, will be happy to show the system to area farmers that may not be familiar with it. "We are very proud of the computer system, we can be much more productive as well as competitive now, because every bit of updated cotton information is available to us within seconds," she said.

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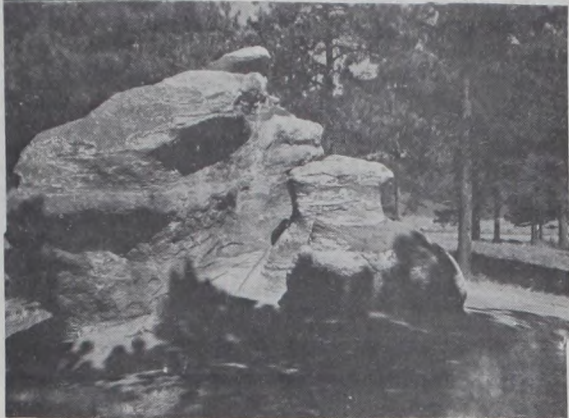

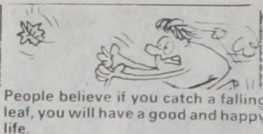
