

The Scholarship Bank is a nonprofit foundation which works with private foundations, the U.S. Department of Education, and ancial aid offices to assure the high school and college students already attending college receive

Funds for Undergraduate students range from \$1,000 to \$20,000 per student, with most scholarships renewable yearly. Graduate level grants are also available with values up to \$25,000.

National Organizations are funding women 25 and older who are returning to school to continue their education. Older female awards range from \$500 to \$20,000.
