- Core, rinse and drain lettuce; chill in lettuce crisper or disposable plastic bag. Remove outer green leaves for serving cups. Cut remaining lettuce lengthwise into halves; place cut-sides down on board and cut into bite-size pieces. Lightly mix chicken, green pepper, capers, pimiento and mayonnaise. Add cut lettuce; toss lightly. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Heap into lettuce cups.

## Shirttail Sermon

Each person on this earth who has heard the good news of Jesus Christ has been forced to decide whether or not he will get right with God. Continual warnings from God's Word leave us to excuse when we treat lightly His command to forsake sin and to live within His will.

In the fifth chapter of Daniel in the Old Testament, a mighty king discovered that one cannot

live continually without God and in sin, and hope to escape the day when his life is weighed in the balances.

Belshazzar, the king of ancient Babylon, lived under the constant threat of invasion from the Medo-Persian empire directly north of his kingdom. The Biblical account finds him involved in a drunken orgy on the very day that he should have been carefully protect-





