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



The 1985-86 school year is underway at Valley School and students at all grade levels seem eager to get started. The new state law which limits the starting of school before Septem-ber 1 has created a one-week extension to the summer vaca-tion and caused a number of school activities to start before school started.

school started.

The Texas legislature completed its regular session this summer and confirmed almost all its previous actions which were written in House Bill 72. One of the rules created by the bill has to do with student absences. The absence rule was in effect last school year and some students were affected adversely by its mandates. Parents and students are reminded just how much harm can be done to the student if they go beyond the limits of the rule. The rule states that a student may not be given credit for a class if the student has more than five days of unexcused absences during a semester. If such absences go beyond the five days he/she will fail the subject or grade. An "excused" absence is one which causes a student to be absent from school due to illness, death in the family, or is somehow related to an illness in the family. Except for very unusual circumstances, all other absences will be excuted with a support of the suppor absences will be counted unex-

To insure that students re ceive credit for excused absences, each child must bring a note from home or doctor naming the reason for missing school.

Beginning this October, all students across the state of Texas who are enrolled in the eleventh grade class will be required to take an exit level test. This is a basic skills test in math and language arts that must be passed before these students receive a diploma their senior year. Seniors graduating this year will not take the test but all future eleventh graders must take the test and pass as a condition of graduation.

The Commissioner of Education commented this past sum-mer that his best estimates concerning the number of stu dents expected to fail the test would be about 25 percent statewide. Students who fail the test will have another opportunity to retake the test next Spring and then again next year.

Enrollment figures at Valley are very near last year's enrollment number. Total students enrolled this year for all grades is currently 314 for an average class size of just over 24. There are 223 enrolled in grades kindergarten through eight and 91 in high school. The largest class in school is first grade with 29, school is first grade with 29, followed by kindergarten which has 28 students. The smallest class in school is the eighth grade which has 19 students while the eleventh has 20 students. All other classes range in size from 23 to 26 students.

If normal trends continue, the total school enrollment should climb to about 325 in October and then decline in the Spring.

Student insurance has been purchased to properly cover every student enrolled against accidents at school or for any school activity outside of normal


