Transferred

Bobby K. Hanna, Soil Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service, was transferred to Deming, New Mexico, as a District Conservationist, effective October 1, 1973.

He has been a member of the Lubbock County Field Office staff since November, 1967. He had previously worked with the Soil Conservation Service at Tahoka before transferring to Lubbock.

Through the Lubbock County Soil and Water Conservation District, Hanna has assisted farmers and ranchers in applying needed conservation practices on their land. He has also given assistance to urban and suburban landowners with various conservation problems which have arisen on their small tracts.

He was born and reared on a farm near Turkey in Hall County. He is a graduate of West Texas State University with a B.S. degree in animal husbandry. Hanna was a member of the Intercollegiate Livestock Judging team for three years at West Texas State University, finishing as high individual in beef cattle judging, and third high individual in the entire contest in the 1963 International Livestock Judging Contest, Chicago, Illinois. He is a member of the Soil Conservation Society of America.

Loan Interest Rate Is Being Raised

The loan interest rate in the U. S. Department of Agriculture's farm storage and drying equipment loan program is being raised to reflect increased borrowing costs of money to Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC). The interest rate will be increased from 6.0 percent to 8.75 percent, per annum, computed on a daily basis.

In addition, the amount of down payment required by borrowers is being raised from 15 to 30 percent because of the accelerated pace at which on-farm storage is being added. The changes became effective for loan applications filed on or after September 17, 1973.

The changes are designed to maintain program activity at a level which will more nearly reflect the current storage situation rather than the situation that has prevailed over the past several years, and they should result in a reduction of federal government expenditures in fiscal year 1974, the department explained.

Under the farm storage and drying equipment loan program farmers can secure CCC loans to finance on-farm storage and drying facilities needed for grain and other commodities. Record use was made of the program during fiscal year 1973 when 41,046 loans were made for \$156.6 million representing more than 313.5 million bushels of storage capacity.

Storage and equipment loans have been available since 1949.

Since 1947 and until his appointment as State Executive Director, Mr. Spreen has served as District Director for ASCS for the South Texas area which includes the Rio Grande Valley.

Bob Bullock Visited Here Last Week

Bob Bullock, former Secretary of State and now a candidate for State Comptroller, campaigned in Quitaque last Wednesday. Bullock, 44, is the first Democratic candidate to announce for state office.

Born in Hillsboro, Bullock received his bachelors degree from Texas Tech in 1955 and earned his law degree in 1958 from Baylor Law School.

He served two terms as a member of the Texas House of Representatives, Chief of the Anti-Trust and Consumer Protection Division of the Attorney General's Office and Chief Legal Counsel for the Governor.

Most noteworthy, however, was Bullock's tenure as Secretary of State of Texas. There, he worked hard to clean up campaign financing in Texas and developed a fair and economical elections system.

After serving as Secretary of State for 16 months, Bullock entered into the private practice of law in Austin. He is a veteran of the Korean Conflict and married to the former Amelia Hooks of Itasca, Austin realtor. They have two children, Lindy, 21, now Mrs. Steve Robinson, and Bobby, jr. 14.

During his tour, Bullock said, "Texas taxpayers are losing \$82,500,000 in tax dollars each year because some retailers are pocketing the state and local sales taxes they collect instead of reporting it to the Comptroller."

"Frankly, I think it is ridiculous to talk of taxing food and medicine when ten percent (10%) of the sales taxes now being paid by our citizens is not being recovered by the State."

"As Comptroller, I will work to see that the taxes we now pay are not lost to some unscrupulous retailer because of faulty collection procedures by the State."

Social Security Representative
Q. I'm working full time and so is my husband. We have three children under 10. I want to know if our children could get social security payments on my earnings record under the same rules that apply to their father's earnings?
A. Yes, they can get payments if either you or your husband becomes entitled to social security payments or if one of you should die after working long enough under social security.
If a child becomes entitled to benefits on the record of one parent, he may receive monthly checks even though the other parent continues to work.
