Sure you know how it is going to end but the telling of the story is what is important to the person telling it. They are trying to leave you with a bit of history that no one else can tell you. The older one gets the more we live in the past and the times when we were quite active and of course it was a totally different era to what everyone is coping with today but when we really sit back and listen to the older generation, we are the ones to profit from their stories. If nothing else, it will help us to be more compassionate to them as we learn why they are the person they are today. Everyone is a mixture of all the experiences that they have faced in their lifetime and no two people are exactly the same. Not only are we separate people, we have lived in different places, different times, seen different happenings and met different people. This all makes us each and everyone a very unique person. So the next time that someone wants to tell you something --- LISTEN -- you just might learn something. After all how much time do we waste in a day? We might as well sit back, listen and enjoy what time we do have!



Immunization Clinics For November







Terrific Turkey Tips by Emily M. Thoms

by Emily M. Thoms Thanksgiving is on the way and turkey lovers can look for-ward to mounds of gravy, mashed potatoes, and of course the fea-tured attraction. Following a few simple turkey tips will ensure a succulent turkey for the holidays. In order to make this a less traumatic event, there are some steps to follow. First, decide how many people will be served, this will help determine what size bird is needed. is needed.

"One pound of meat should be ample for one person unless you want leftovers," advises Dr. Sarah Birkhold, Extension poultry spe-cialist, "Then, estimate one and beforement ensures"

half pounds person." Knowing how much to buy alle-viates some anxiety for harried shoppers facing cases crammed

shoppers lacing cases crammed with frozen turkeys. There is no doubt that the freezer section in local grocery stores will be overflowing with turkeys for Thanksgiving. Turkey lovers can watch for reduced prices as the holiday approaches, she says. Tenderness? Birkhold dis-

misses the myth that hen turkeys

provide the most tender meat. "It doesn't matter, tom or hen, tenderness is all the same," says Birkhold. For those people who are going to battle the frozen food section looking for the perfect gobbler, make sure that the turkey is pur-chased no less than three days before before Thanksgiving. This should leave enough time for

should leave enough time for "It will take a 12 to 15 pound It will take a 12 to 15 pound frozen turkey two and a half to three days to defrost. Estimate 24 hours to defrost five pounds of turkey. All defrosting should be done in the refrigerator, never at room temperature," says Birk-hold. If frozen turkey does not say

hold. If frozen turkey does not cause a mouth-watering sensation, Birk-hold suggests trying a fresh turkey. Fresh turkey should be purchased one or two days before Thanksgiving. As insurance for a savory bird, place an order with the butcher in advance the butcher in advance. Another option is the self-basting turkey. This option is less

time-consuming since the bird is already spiced, set with oils and ready for the oven. An unbasted bird requires the

watchful eye of the chef, con-stantly checking to see if the uncovered turkey has shriveled to

a crisp. In order to avoid dryness, cook the turkey uncovered while basting with natural juices continual-ly. When 15 minutes of cooking time remain, cover the bird with either the pan lid or a tinfoil tent. These tips will help it remain tasty and tender. Once the bird is selected, cooks

should make sure they remove the neck and giblets from both neck and body cavities, then thoroughly rinse the inside and outside. The oven should be pre-heated at 325° for an unstuffed or stuffed

turkey. Cooking time for an 8 to 12 pound unstuffed turkey is about

"After dinner, leftovers must be refrigerated promptly. By food safety guidelines, you have about two hdurs to serve and refrigerate the turkey," says Birkhold.

Leftovers can provide satisfy-ing snacks, but be sure to reheat the turkey to 165°. Gravies should be brought to boiling when reheat-

by Mary Elizabeth Pigg I can still remember the old, dusty smell of Aunt Wilma's house on the day she died. My father had told me that she was going to die, and that we should be happy. I didn't under-stand him then like I understand him now. I had seen Aunt Wilma's pain and realized how different she was becoming as the cancer grew. Dad considered Aunt Wilma not only as an aunt but also a mother. His eyes showed it everytime he was around her. I remember staying at her house; those hot July afternoons when she bought us candy; Sunday lunch at her house; and caramel popcorn balls on Halloween. She was not only generous, but she was a lady. Everytime she walked her head was held high, and in church, she always had a fashionable dress on. Aunt Wilma was respected because of her hard work and her ability to do anything. Never once in my life did I hear "I can't" from that woman.

Aunt Wilma's death was on a Tuesday at 2:00. I remember my face turning cold and pale when Katherine told me. Everything felt empty without her. At the funeral services, I wasn't very emotional because I had cried the night before. Everyone kept saying that they were sorry. I could never understand them saying that, they didn't do anything. I still miss Aunt Wilma, but I've had to learn to live with it.

This was one of the most memo-rable times in my life. It's when I found out that heroines can die.
