Valley Takes District; Plays In Bi-District Friday

The district competition in football came to an end Friday night in the game between the Valley Patriots and the Roscoe Plowboys, when the Patriots took a 30-0 win. The Patriots got off to a good start and did everything right in the first period.

The Plowboys were held to only one first down and 51 yards total offense in the first half.

Matt Barrett, who has played an excellent season as receiver, added 109 yards Friday night and this puts him at the top of the Texas Class 1A single-season record with a grand total of 1,310 yards.

Quarterback Kirk Saul tossed three touchdown passes and tied the national single-season touchdown pass record, which stands at 30. This makes three records Kirk has set thus far. He completed 18 of 28 passes for 225 yards in the game. Two of his tie-passes were made to Matt Barrett.

The Patriots have played all season with the pass as their main goal of scoring because of their smallness in size and weight of each player. They came up against another passing team in Roscoe Friday night and they had to rely on their runners (with one of their main runners having had knee surgery and being out of the game). Valley rushed for 185 yards and two first downs,

which surprised the opponents. Saul played it cool and didn't throw his first pass until well into the third possession. It took just six plays to go 80 yards for the first Valley six. Brandon Smith scored the TD on a 14-yard run and Scott Saul kicked the extra point. On the next possession, Brandon raced 79 yards for his second TD. The kick failed.

Saul threw his first pass to Barrett in the second quarter and Barrett took it in from two yards out. Time was running out and the Plowboys were faced with a fourth-and-five from their 19. An attempt for a first down failed and the ball was left on Roscoe's 23-yard line, and with time remaining for one play only, Freddie Ruiz took a pass from Kirk Saul and, dodging the opponents, took it into the end zone with no time left on the clock.

Barrett made his record play on a 20-yard reception well into the fourth period. Saul threw the 18-yard pass, sailing it wide, but Barrett caught it on a fingertip reception and kept one foot inbounds for the score.

Statistically, Valley got 19 first downs to six for Roscoe; the Patriots rushed 29 times for 185 yards while their opponent rushed 41 times for 114 yards; Valley passed for 225 yards to the Plowboys' 15; the Patriots received five penalties for a loss of

45 yards while Roscoe received three penalties for a loss of 25 yards; Valley punted more than usual Friday night, with three for an average of 28.6 yards, and Roscoe punted three times for a 41.3 yard average; the Patriots lost no fumbles but the Plowboys lost two of two.

The Patriots begin a series of playoffs Friday night when they meet Bronte at Post in a bi-district game, with kickoff at 7:30 p.m.

The players are to be fed at the Chaparral Steakhouse and Barbeque in Post after the game, and the Chaparral asks fans to stop if possible before the game to eat so everyone can be fed before it is too late after the game. It is located on Highway 84 as it comes into Post from Lubbock. There is an ad elsewhere in the Valley Tribune.





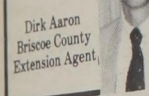

Recently I discussed in a column research data on modifying strippers to reduce the b content in cotton. The data shows that by reducing the b grades, etc. are increased ultimately the value. Of course certain percentage of the c will be left in the field. In order to determine the feasibility of research, several producers across the Panhandle are going to do tests where the cotton harvested by conventional modified stripper. The first test was completed on Friday, October 31, at Edmonson. The results, I can say, were very encouraging and surprising.

Why a surprise? Because even though at this early harvest date there wasn't any barksy cotton the test showed an increase in turnout of 18.9% to 20.4% on the modified. This resulted in cheaper ginning costs and ultimately returned to the producer \$3. per acre. This figure, remember, does take into account the increased field loss.

Plans are underway to implement one of these tests on D Brown's farm. We are waiting until mid-harvesting season to speculate that barksy cotton will be a problem at the time. You would like to see the results of the test at Edmonson, please give me a call at 823-2343. I will mail you a copy upon request.

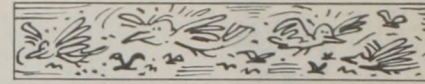

WTU Customers Paying Less For Electricity

Residential customers of West Texas Utilities Company are paying less for electricity during November than the average price being paid by customers of other investor-owned utilities in Texas.

The monthly report by the Public Utility Commission of Texas shows that WTU's standard residential rates are \$36.80 for 500 kilowatt-hours, compared to an average of \$38.53 among the state's eight investor-owned companies, and \$64.00 for 1,000 KWh, compared to an average of \$70.

Highest rates in the state are charged by El Paso Electric, whose customers are paying \$49.69 for 500 KWh and \$92.86

for 1,000 KWh.

The PUC report shows that WTU's rates have declined 11.4 percent since November 1985, while the average decline among all utilities in the survey, including rural electric cooperatives and municipals, was 8.8 percent.

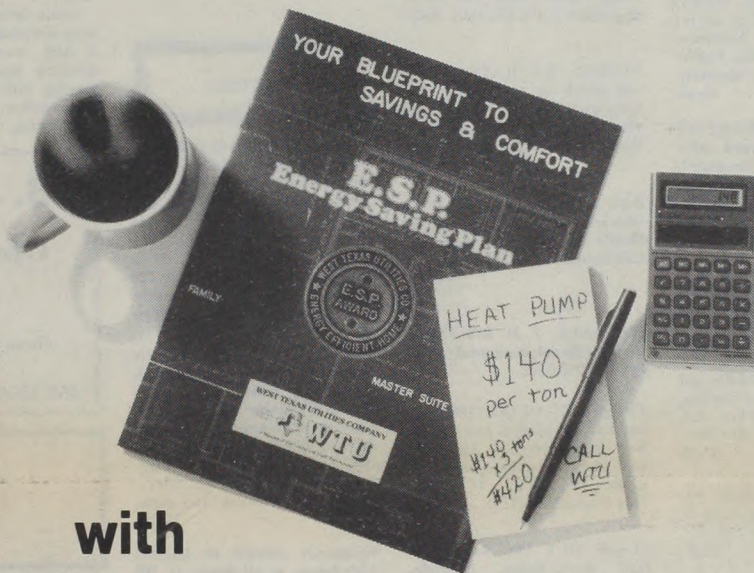

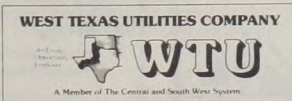

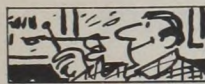

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OVERCOMING BRONCHITIS

Bronchitis is an inflammation of the bronchial tubes, the air passages that extend from the windpipe into the lungs. The inflammation may be caused by a virus, bacteria, smoking or the inhalation of chemical pollutants or dust. Brief bouts of acute bronchitis often evolve from a severe cold. Chronic bronchitis is characterized by a chronic or recurrent mucus-producing cough that lasts three or more months and recurs year after year.

Acute bronchitis that results from complications of a cold or flu is best treated by bed rest, drinking plenty of fluids and staying indoors during damp, cold weather.

Suffering from a series of

acute bronchitis attacks, smoking heavily or inhaling contaminated air for prolonged periods may result in chronic bronchitis. Because chronic bronchitis can be life-threatening, it should receive professional attention, no matter what the underlying cause.
