Recently I discussed in my column research data on modifying strippers to reduce the bark content in cotton. The data shows that by reducing the bark, grades, etc. are increased and ultimately the value. Of course, a certain percentage of the crop will be left in the field. In order to determine the feasibility of the research, several producers across the Panhandle are going to do tests where the cotton is harvested by conventional and modified stripper. The first test was completed on Friday, October 31, at Edmonson. The results, I can say, were very encouraging and surprising.
Why a surprise? Because even though at this early harvest date, there wasn't any barky cotton, the test showed an increased turnout of $18.9 \%$ to $20.4 \%$ on the modified. This resulted in cheaper ginning costs and ultimately returned to the producer $\$ 3.87$ per acre. This figure, remember, does take into account the increased field loss.
Plans are underway to implement one of these tests on Don Brown's farm. We are waiting until mid-harvesting season, speculating that barky cotton will be a problem at the time. If you would like to see the results of the test at Edmonson, please give me a call at 823-2343. I wil mail you a copy upon request.
