Hall County Parade to Highlight Activities Saturday

The annual Hall County Parade will be held on Saturday, September 20, 1986, beginning at 11:00 a.m. The parade will start from the Junior High School on Main Street, go around the square and then head back to the Junior High.

The categories for this year's parade are Organizations, Commercial, Civic Clubs, Antique Cars, Individual Horse Riders, Riding Clubs, Bike Riders, Motorized Vehicles (3 & 4-wheelers, dune buggies, golf carts, etc.) Clowns and Implement Dealers. Three prizes, trophies and ribbons, will be awarded in each category.

The Parade Committee, composed of Marion Bryant and Marsha Thompson, co-chairmen, Pat Ferguson and Barbara Cabler have announced that the response to the parade has been good. The committee would like to see more Antique Cars, Riding Clubs, Clowns and Individual Horse Riders participate in the parade. If you or your organization would like to be in the parade, please contact Marsha Thompson at 259-2512 after 5:00 p.m. Bike riders and motorized vehicles do not need to register if it is an individual rider; only if it is entered in the Organizations, Commercial or Civic Clubs categories.

Each entrant MUST have a number in their category in order to be judged. If you fail to register and get a number at the

registration area on the Junior High Parking Lot, the judges will not judge your entry.

Thirty minutes following the last entry (bicycles and motorized vehicles) passing the reviewing stand, the prizes and awards will be announced and distributed. These announcements will be made from the reviewing stand.

Following the parade and awarding of prizes, a free hot dog lunch will be served across from the First Bank and Trust. The Memphis State Bank and the First Bank and Trust are hosting this event.

Plans are complete for the annual Hall County Picnic and Old Settler's Reunion which will be held September 20-21. This year will be special as the county will be observing the Sesquicentennial celebration.

Valley Continues Winning Streak

The Valley Patriots hosted the Happy Cowboys Friday night, September 12, and the two teams were 1-0 when they met. Valley took the cake all through the game. Valley had a 53-0 win over

Claude the week before, and Happy had a 36-0 victory over Bovina.

Kirk Saul threw an 85-yard pass contacting Matt Barrett in the first period of play and Scott Saul kicked the extra point, ending the quarter with a 7-0 score.

Freddie Ruiz of Valley took a 25-yard pass from Kirk Saul in the second period of play and Scott Saul kicked the extra point. Jesse Sosa of Happy received a 16-yard pass from Middleton for six points and the kick failed. The second period of play ended with a score of 13-6.

Kirk Saul completed a 54-yard run for more points, the PAT failed, and at halftime the score stood at 20-6 with Valley on top.

In the third period of play, K. Saul contacted M. Barrett with a 63-yard pass. The kick failed. Thomas Rodriguez took off on a 17-yard run that netted six points more for Valley, and the extra point try failed. At the end of the third period, Valley was top man with a score of 32-6.

Ruiz received a 30-yard pass from K. Saul in the last period of play to score another touchdown and again the extra point try failed. After scoring 18 points in the second half and holding the Cowboys scoreless, Valley finished with a final score of 38-6.

Valley got 20 first downs to Happy's 1; in rushing, Valley gained 221 yards to Happy's 107; in yards passing, Valley got 327 to Happy's 88. Total yards gained for Valley was 548 and Happy was credited with 195. Valley attempted 21 passes, completing 14 of them, while Happy completed seven of 16 aeriels. Valley intercepted two passes and Happy intercepted one. Valley punted only one time and Happy had two punts. Valley recovered three fumbles and Happy recovered two. The Patriots were penalized ten times and Happy four. Valley lost 80 yards in penalties and Happy lost only 45 yards.

Statistically, Saul carried the ball five times for 327 yards and one touchdown. Smith had 10 carries and gained 28 yards. Scoggins carried six times for 51 yards. Rodriguez carried eight times for 43 yards and one touchdown. Barrett caught ten passes for 257 yards and two scores. F. Ruiz caught three passes for 61 yards and two touchdowns. Lane Myers caught one pass and gained nine yards.

Valley goes to McLean Friday night, September 19, with kickoff time at 8:00 o'clock.

The extra point was not made and that rounded off the scoring for the afternoon, Valley 22, Happy 0.

direction of Lawrence Hendrix at quarterback. Jason Smith picked up some good yards on a couple of runs. Garrett Mills caught a pass for 20 yards. He almost caught another one for a touchdown. Billy Williams was also able to produce yardage in the second half.

The coach was pleased with both offensive units. The blocking by the first unit was more than adequate. The line is led by Stephen and Manuel Silva, Chad Powell, Cal Farley, Scotty Tucker and Henry McNary. The first defense also performed adequately.

Noah Gray came in and did a good job of directing the offense from the quarterback position and added several key runs to the scoring drives.

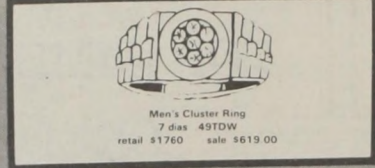

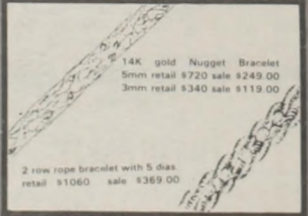

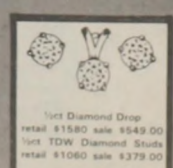

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
GENERAL ELECTION
NOVEMBER 4, 1986

PROPOSITION NO. 1
ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 15 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among the counties in which the property of the railroad is located for purposes of property taxation, and would delete the requirement that the Comptroller participate in making the allocation. To comply with both statutory and constitutional law, the apportionment currently is being made by the State Property Tax Board in conjunction with the Comptroller.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to provide by general law for the apportionment of the value of railroad rolling stock among counties for purposes of property taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 2
ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment that would replace the constitutional requirement that the subject of a bill be expressed in its title with a mandate that each house of the legislature adopt rules of procedure that would require the subject of each bill to be expressed in its title in a manner that gives the legislature and the public reasonable notice of that subject. Determining compliance with the rule would be the responsibility of the legislature. Cur-

rently, a law is invalidated if a court finds its caption is defective. The amendment would provide that past and future enactments may not be held void on the basis of an insufficient title.

The amendment also would eliminate the suggestion that the state's laws be revised every ten years, and instead would provide for continuing revision of state laws.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
"The constitutional amendment requiring each house to include in its rules of procedure a rule that each bill contain a title expressing the bill's subject, and providing for the continuing revision of state laws."

PROPOSITION NO. 3
ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 73 proposes a constitutional amendment that would permit the Legislature to authorize any county, city, town, or other political subdivision to use public funds or credit to pay insurance premiums on nonassessable life, health, or accident policies. Due to the prohibition in the constitution against the lending of credit and granting of public money, political subdivisions currently are prohibited from becoming shareholders in associations such as mutual-insurance companies, in which policyholders are shareholders. A nonassessable mutual insurance policy does not allow a company to raise capital by assessing the policyholder an extra amount on a pre-

mium. This amendment will allow mutual insurance companies and stock companies to bid for life and health group policies of political subdivisions. Public liability will be limited to the payment of premiums specified in the contract.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment allowing political subdivisions the opportunity to engage in and transact business with authorized mutual insurance companies in the same manner as with other insurance companies."

PROPOSITION NO. 4
ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment that would repeal the prohibition against branch banking by state banks and would allow state banks and national banks domiciled in this state to establish and operate banking facilities at locations within the county or city where they are domiciled. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to permit a state bank or a national bank domiciled in this state to engage in business at more than one place if it acquires a failed state bank or national bank domiciled in this state.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide that a bank may offer full service banking at more than one location within the city or county where its principal facility is located, subject to limitations and restrictions provided by law."



MORE BED AND BREAKFAST

I am excited about the interest in Bed and Breakfast lodging places in the county.

Last week a representative from the American Bed and Breakfast Association in Maryland called me. Somehow she found out we might be interested in this. (We may not be as isolated as we think—news sure travels fast!)

She was very helpful and told me that the state of Maine has made a video about how to organize Bed and Breakfast, since they wanted to bring tourism to some of their small inland areas which did not have motels. She also told me about Bed and Breakfast—Texas Style, which is in Dallas.

I contacted both of these places. The Tourism Department in Maine will send us their video at no cost as soon as it is available. (They have three copies and all are checked out at the time.)

Bed and Breakfast — Texas Style is a booking agency which registers and inspects B&B places for a fee and receives a percentage of the fee for guests they book. Those of you here might or might not choose to become a member of this.

In checking with the State Comptroller's office, I found that a sales tax would have to be collected and sent in quarterly. A Hotel/Motel License is required but only involves an application and no fee.
